# Possible Invalidity of Remedial Bills Worries Solons

# REFERENCE TO

AUSTIN, March 21. — Possible invalidity of bills being offered in the Texas legislature to replace hundreds of acts already held invalid by the state supreme court was worrying the few members who remained in Austin over the week-

end.

The court decision held that a general law cannot be passed applicable to one city or other subdivisions alone. Most of these bills apply to cities of specified population in past censuses

Curative bills generally are leaving out any reference to a particular census. This makes it possible for other places sometimes to be affected. The danger felt for the corrective bills is the liklihood that the supreme court will next hold that an arbitary population range is not classification but isolation.

A bill passed by the house Friday requires the city, county or district affected to be specifically named Then the bill will have to be a local one and be advertised 30 days. Such bills can affect only a few matters specifically allowed by the constitu-



#### AN IMPORTANT HIGH COURT DECISION

Lawmakers and laymen were given a jolt on the nose as the result of a supreme court decision which held, in effect, that hundreds of local laws passed by the legislature are unconstitutional. Action on all local bills in both houses was withheld pending an investigation of the scope of the decision. There is a reason why: The supreme court held the legislature did not have the right to pass a general law whose application was limited solely to one county or city and never could affect another county or city.
