CITY ENACTS NEW ORDINANCE

September Brings Million \$ Rain In Instalments

MOISTURE TOTALS FOUR AND HALF INCHES FOR MONTH

Late Crops And Pastures Are Chief Benefactors But Tanks Also Aided.

With four and one-half inches of rain already received here during September, the outlook for Fall harvests is now much brighter than a few weeks ago, and a drought which cost thousands of dollars to farmers and stockmen remains only an unpleasant memory.

S. F. Bond, local weather observer, reported Tuesday night that he had recorded precipitations this month as follows:

Sept. 3	1.04
Sept. 12	.81
Sept. 13	1.29
Sept. 14	.95
Sept. 15	1.31

Late feed will now mature more abundantly and fields can now be sowed to smaller grains, offering a strong likelihood of some early pasture for stockmen. Peanut crops and pasture lands which had begun to suffer terribly as a result of the protracted drought are greatly revived and are among principal benefactors of the September moisture.

In some localities quite a bit of stock water was caught, however. West of Cross Plains eight and 10 miles, the need still exists for a "gulley washer", a rain that will replenish tanks, now far below their normal level.

Within the city of Cross Plains many householders are smiling broadly over the prospects of fall gardens. Lawns have already greened noticeably and the city water supply caught up a reserve, which had been impossible for the past two months.

BURKETT CALVES TO COMPETE AT DALLAS

A. I. Edwards, vocational agriculture teacher from Burkett, has reported that the Burkett Future Farmers of America chapter will be represented by two entrants in the junior division of the livestock show at the State Fair of Texas, when the 61st anniversary of the Fair is held this year in Dallas from Oct. 5 to 20.

The two Burkett entrants will be Tye Brown and Leroy Williams. Brown, who has been feeding calves for three years, showing at all major Texas shows, will enter a calf that will weigh approximately 1,100 pounds. Williams, who has been feeding calves for four years, was owner of the calf that last year won the reserve championship of the Abilene show, and one of his entrants also won the registered Hereford prize offered by the Feeder-Breeder group of Colman for the best dry lot-fed in the county. His entry in the State Fair will be a 1,000-pound calf.

The 1946 Fair's junior livestock show will for the first time have a separate program from the adult showing, enabling junior exhibitors to have exclusive use of pens, show rings and other facilities while their show is in progress. Date for the holding of the junior exhibit has been set for Oct. 5 to 8. Divisional superintendents named for the show are: G. C. Gibson, dairy cattle; George W. Barnes, Texas A. & M. College, beef steer division; T. L. Leach, Texas Technological College, sheep; and T. M. Regenbrecht, assisted by Dallas assistant county agent J. H. Jennings, will supervise the swine division.

Sabanno Man Brings In First Peanuts; Yield Below Normal

Jack Dunlap, who farms in the Sabanno community, brought in the first load of peanuts of the season September 12 to be sold in Cross Plains. Four Cross west of town, brought in the second load. B. J. Montgomery, who buys for the Crosswood Shelling Company, purchased both loads.

Dunlap's load graded 73, which is considered an average grade for peanuts grown in this section, and brought \$2.70 per bushel. Top grade is 78 and peanuts grading that will bring \$2.88 per bushel. The Dunlap yield was approximately ten and one-third bushels per acre, which is about 40 to 50 percent below last year's average.

Peanut hay, however, is expected to turn out as much as last year and good beef hay, undamned by rain, will bring about \$30.00 per ton, opening price.

Montgomery estimates that more acreage in the Cross Plains section has been planted to peanuts this year than last and he believes that, generally, the yield will average 20 bushels per acre. He points out that the crop is unusually late this year, due to dry spring and late planting but believes recent rains will materially increase growth of the peanut and also will necessarily retard maturity. He does not expect peanuts to start coming in for sale until around October 10.

Growers expect to reap a profitable year from peanuts, notwithstanding the drought that for weeks threatened to ruin the crop. Farmers just hope fall rains will be late enough for peanuts to be gathered and hay disposed of, before starting.

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JUNK CAR BODIES & RUBBISH MUST BE BEHIND FENCES

Purpose Is To Maintain The Natural Beauty Of Town; No Ugly Rubbish Depots

Complying with sanitary regulations and endeavoring to maintain the general beauty of the city, the City Council in regular session Tuesday night passed an ordinance regulating wrecking yards and prescribing how the premises about them are to be maintained.

The ordinance was drafted for the city of Cross Plains by the Texas League of Municipalities, and is a copy of a model statute enacted a number of years ago by the city of Yorktown.

All wrecking yards within the corporate limits of the city of Cross Plains were recently cleaned up and old unsightly bodies hauled to the dump grounds. Owners of the places have willingly cooperated with city officials and assured that their premises will be kept neat and orderly.

The new ordinance is intended to prevent unsightly collections of abandoned machinery and rubbish of every description from being stored within the city limits. The new statute appears hereunder:

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE OPERATION OF PLACES USED OR MAINTAINED AS JUNK YARDS OR DUMPING GROUNDS, OR FOR THE WRECKING OR DISSEMBLING OF AUTOMOBILES, TRUCKS, TRACTORS OR MACHINERY OF ANY KIND, OR OF ANY OF THE PARTS THEREOF, OR FOR THE ACCUMULATION OF RUBBISH OF ANY DESCRIPTION; PROVIDING FOR A LICENSE AND PRESCRIBING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE TERMS OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CROSS PLAINS, TEXAS:

Section 1. Hereafter any place used or maintained by any person, partnership or corporation as a junk yard or dumping ground, or for the wrecking or dissembling of automobiles, trucks, tractors, or machinery of any kind, or for the storing or leaving of worn out, wrecked, or abandoned automobiles, trucks, tractors, or machinery of any kind, or of any of the parts thereof, or for the maintenance or operation of such place for the accumulation of rubbish of any description, is hereby declared to be a public and common nuisance, being obnoxious and offensive to the inhabitants of the City of Cross Plains, because of its interference with the comfortable enjoyment of life and property by said inhabitants, and is prohibited within the city limits of said city, unless the same is conducted in the manner hereafter stated, following the payment of the license fee hereafter prescribed.

Section 2. Any person, partnership, or corporation desiring to use or maintain any property within the City of Cross Plains, Texas, for any of the purpose mentioned in Section 1 hereof, shall make written application to the City Secretary for a license which said application shall set forth the name and address of the applicant and a legal description of the property or premises upon which said business is to be conducted, and the said city secretary shall have the power either to grant or reject such application. If the application is granted, a license to operate such business shall be issued by said city secretary upon the payment of a fee of \$5.00 per annum. Any license so issued shall expire on January 1 next succeeding the date of its issuance, but may be renewed from year to year in like manner as is provided for the original license.

Section 3. Any person, partnership, or corporation granted a license as provided for in Section 2 hereof, shall keep the premises used in the operation and maintenance of said business in a neat and orderly condition. The property and premises on which such business is conducted shall be enclosed by a tight board fence at least 10 feet high, and said fence shall be kept in a neatly painted condition, and no junk of any character, or parts, or machinery of

Notes From H. D. Agent LORETA ALLEN SIMPLE REPAIR FOR WASHING MACHINES Many washing machine disorders can be repaired at home if a few basic rules of care and simple repair are observed. Loreta Allen, County Home Demonstration Agent, lists some of the most common disorders as follows:

PLANTING TEXAS BLUEBONNETS Texas bluebonnets may be planted in September for blooms next spring. Bluebonnet seed, which are available in most any seed store, will sprout much better if allowed to soak in water 24 hours before planting, says Miss Loreta Allen, County Home Demonstration Agent. After the seed soaks, they should be raked into the soil and watered at once. The young plants will grow during cold winter months, since they are injured only by a heavy freeze, and even then only a few will be killed.

Black pepper is reported to be selling at sixty cents a pound in the open market following elimination of OPA ceiling price. A price of sixty-five cents per pound was paid for white pepper at the same time the report stated.

FARM EQUIPMENT NOW NEEDS VITAL REPAIRS
On Farm and Ranch Needs
Farm and ranch families now are badly needing new equipment, building materials, hardware supplies and fertilizers. Much of what they need during the war has "given out."
Well, production is increasing of most things farmers want, but their still won't be enough to go around. Retail sales in April were the highest ever, according to A. R. Grote. Mail order houses, which serve great many rural families, report that their April sales were sixty-six percent above the same month in 1945. Builders hardware will be available to satisfy only half the "want" this year. Lumber production is going up . . . so is the production of automobiles, but even so production is at least a year short of meeting even the most essential demands.
But the most serious shortage for farmers is the lag in delivery of farm equipment. Manufacturers are far behind on their schedules due to strikes and lack of material. Another trouble farmers are particularly like is the production of work shirts has fallen off lately. About ten per cent while dress shirts have increased about a third.

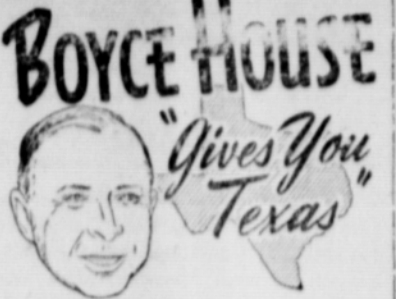

any kind shall be allowed to remain outside such fence; provided, however, that any existing business of this character now being operated and maintained in the City of Cross Plains shall be allowed six months within which to construct a fence of the kind and character required hereby.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 11, 1942

Section 4. The City Council of the City of Cross Plains shall have the power to revoke the license provided for herein at any time for good cause, but only after notice has been given the owner or owners of the business of a hearing to be held not less than ten days after the service of such notice.
