



more than 90 miles from her home. They are just names to her. It might be more than she could bear to be escorted before the water curtain to make her bow to the great concourse viewing the Texas Cavalcade, noble spectacle which twice every night re-enats events of that hot afternoon of April 21, 1935, when A. J. Berry and the other Texas heroes overthrew the yoke of cruel Mexico.
