HEARING SET ON PUTNAM ROAD

2 General Elections Face Voters Next Week

J. A. CATON NAMED ELECTION JUDGE AT CROSS PLAINS BOX

One Election Tuesday And Another Thursday; City Hall To Serve As Polls

Two general elections are to be held here next week. The first is set Tuesday, November fifth and the second, Thursday, November seventh.

The Tuesday election will present a ticket composed of the various party nominees for precinct, county and state offices. In addition there will be proposed amendments to the state constitution which voters will be required to either approve or reject.

The Thursday election was necessitated when, due to an oversight in Austin, one of the proposed amendments to the state constitution failed to receive the necessary clerical attention to place it on the November fifth ballot.

Chairman for both elections in Cross Plains will be J. A. Caton, who was appointed by the Commissioners Court. Mr. Caton was out of town Tuesday and could not be contacted by the Review, however, it is felt sure that the balloting will take place in the city hall on North Main Street, for both the Tuesday and Thursday referendums.

Two of the proposed amendments to the state constitution are receiving strong backing in Cross Plains. One is the one known as the "Good Roads Amendment," which would earmark funds paid in by the gasoline tax to be spent in years to come for the same purpose as they are now being used.

The amendment would permit a long range planning program by the state highway department and prohibit tax monies derived from gasoline taxes ever being diverted.

The other amendment receiving strong support in Cross Plains is that to appropriate funds for paying contractors for a building erected on the John Tarleton Agricultural College campus at Stephenville. The building was finished several years ago and has been in use ever since, however, due to a stenographic error in the state capital funds were never appropriated to pay contractors for their work. This amendment is being strongly supported in all sections of the state.

Cross Plains Gets Old Time Trimming Here Friday night

Cross Plains high school Buffaloes suffered one of their most decisive beatings in recent years Friday night, as they fell before the hard running Longhorns from the early school in Brownwood 46 to nothing. The game ended in the twenty third consecutive triumph for the Brownwood eleven, however, one of the victories this year was later charged as a defeat as a result of a player ruled ineligible.

The visitors assumed command of the situation at the very start, on their first offensive play the Longhorns tallied six points with a beautiful run by Lancaster for 37 yards. The kick for conversion was good and from that point on the contest was never close.

Early scored again in the first quarter on a spectacular sprint by Dave Smith, who proved to be a thorn in the Buffalo flesh throughout the game. Again the visitors converted.

The third quarter was played on more even terms with the visitors being held to a single touchdown and robbed of their conversion, attempt by a charging Cross Plains line. The half ended 29 to nothing.

Second half of the game was a more or less repetition of the first with Smith, Lancaster and Jackson sparking the attack. Cross Plains was never able to seriously threaten.

USO STARTS DRIVE FOR CASH TO RAISE CALLAHAN'S QUOTA

Cross Plains Has Been Given Goal of \$248; Frank Cross Community Chairman Here

Cross Plains has been given a quota of \$248 in the current campaign for funds for the USO, according to Frank Q. Cross, who is chairman of the drive here.

Mr. Cross points out that the present quota is one sixth of the amount asked a year ago. The county quota in the current campaign is \$550. J. Lester Farmer is county chairman.

Although a drive for collections has not yet been launched in Cross Plains, Mr. Cross reports that he has already been handed the following contributions: West Texas Utilities Company \$10, Higginbotham Brothers and Company \$25, The Plains Theatre \$10, Citizens State Bank \$25.

Within the next few days a thorough canvass will be made of the business district, and Mr. Cross urges that Cross Plains people cooperate in the campaign, which he points out will be the last made by the USO.

There are still several hundred Callahan county boys in the service, many of whom are overseas," says County Chairman Farmer, "and we must not forget our obligation to them."

The need for additional workers is so sure that all local people are contacted was pointed out by Mr. Cross. Unless there are several persons who volunteer their services there is a strong likelihood that many who wish to give will be overlooked, he opined.

"We need more workers, however, I would like to urge that persons who wish to contribute to this worthwhile cause do not fail to do so simply because someone does not ask them to do so. Contributions may be left at the Plains Theatre."

Precautions Urged To Prevent Spread of Whooping Cough

A warning against whooping cough in West Central Texas was sounded Monday by Dr. David M. Cowgill, Abilene-Taylor county health unit.

In order to whip the child mortality, certain simple precautions should be taken," Dr. Cowgill said.

The disease, he said, can be contracted by direct exposure, and isolation must be universally practiced if the incident is to be controlled.

"The whooping-cough germ is transmitted by droplets expelled in coughing, sneezing or speaking," Dr. Cowgill said.

The first sign is a dry cough which persists day and night. During this period the child patient should not be allowed to attend school or come in contact with other children until three weeks after the appearance of the typical signs of the disease, he advised.

Prevention and control is through use of vaccine and convalescent serum. "To neglect whooping cough may seriously impair the child's future health," Dr. Cowgill warned.

DELEGATION WILL ASK FOR FARM TO MARKET APPROVAL

Men From Here, Cottonwood And Putnam Will Appear Before Hiway Commission

Delegation of citizens from Cross Plains, Putnam and Cottonwood will meet with the Texas Highway Commission in Austin November 8 and present a plan for "Farm to Market" designation for the road from Cross Plains to Putnam.

A letter was received from State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer this week granting the hearing, and backers of the project are now "rounding-up" a representative delegation to appear before the Commission.

If given "Farm to Market" designation the road would be taken over by the highway department and in all likelihood paved.

At present the road is used by at least two rural mail carriers, several school buses, and is the shortest route from Cross Plains to a railroad. Too, if topped and improved the road would provide a much shorter route for traffic from the Bankhead to the 39th Division Memorial Park at Brownwood, a state owned and maintained project.

The delegation called to Austin will not ask for a change in the present course of the route. Only plan will be for state designation, improvement and maintenance.

Wiley Wood Foster Passes Here Sunday At Age Of 101 years

Wiley Wood Foster, Cross Plains' only centenarian, and a resident of Callahan county for 45 years, passed away at the home of his son, J. C. Foster, October 27, at 3:00 o'clock. Born in Jasper County, December 31, 1844, he was at the time of his death one hundred and one years, nine months and 27 days of age. His health had been failing rapidly since last summer and death was attributed to natural causes.

Funeral services were held at the Atwell Primitive Baptist Church Monday afternoon at 2:30 with Rev. W. J. Jackson of Milesboro and Rev. J. L. Collins of Abilene officiating. Burial was made in the Atwell cemetery.

Wiley Wood Foster enlisted in the Confederate Army at Belton as a member of the Texas Cavalry at the age of 16, engaged in numerous battles, was wounded in the side during the battle of Chickamauga and captured twice by the Yankees.

After the first capture he was exchanged for a northern soldier, rejoined his forces and was retaken prisoner. Following the second capture, he was placed in prison at Camp Chase, Ohio where he remained until the close of the war.

Two years following the war he was married to Mrs. Clarissa Crockett, twice a widow. In 1866 in Jasper county, Mrs. Foster was first married to Allen Richardson and to them two sons were born. After his death she married David Crockett, five boys and two girls being born to them. Following the death of Crockett she married W. W. Foster and five boys were born to the union. One son, William Crockett, survives her and lives at Potts, Texas. Mrs. Foster died in 1922 at the age of 92 years. Since her death Mr. Foster has made his home with a son.

In July 1867 Mr. Foster united with the Primitive Baptist Church and was ordained a Deacon in the Antioch church in 1872, which place he faithfully filled during his life. Both Mr. and Mrs. Foster were members of the Lebanon, church at Atwell, where their son, J. C. Foster and nephew, D. C. Foster, are joint pastors at the
