EARLY COMPLETION OF THREE WELLS PROBABLE

The passing of each day brings nearer at hand the completion of a number of wells in the local field, with the greater interest centering on the Harris well. This well is located a few yards from the Vestal No. 1, the initial production of which was about four hundred barrels, coming in as a gusher. The Harris well is nearing the depth of the Vestal and everything seems favorable for its completion within the next few days. Ed Schoffner, who was head driller on the Vestal, is superintending the final drilling on the Harris well, and being familiar with conditions which worked a detriment to the former, is confident that he will bring in a real good producer in Harris No. 1.

The next of interest, the bringing in of which would almost equally benefit Cross Plains, is the Texas-Arizona well drilling on the Adams tract about two miles from Burkett. Reliable reports are current that this well is nearing completion.

The lost tools in the Harve Vestal well have all been recovered, and it is believed that the remainder of the collapsed casing will be removed within the next few days. This well had reached a sand which promised a paying production, and we are informed that a misplaced shot resulted in the accident which has caused the delay in its completion.

The new well by Seman and associates on the Webb tract near the Gooch No. 1, has been placed on the beam and is now pounding away with a daily regularity that indicates "going after something."

GOV. NEFF ORDERS ELECTION JUNE 4

The resignation of senator John A. Russell of Eastland which had been in the hands of Gov. Neff since the adjournment of the last session of the Legislature, was only recently accepted and the Governor has ordered an election to be held June 4th to elect a successor to Senator Russell. Judge Burkett of Eastland is a candidate for the position, and so far has no opponent. Quite a number of able men have been mentioned in connection with the office, among whom are Dr. Coleman of Colorado, Judge Harry Tom King and Hon. Ben L. Cox of Abilene, Jessie R. Smith of Breckenridge.

CLARA SETTLES FOR CASH AND LAND GIVEN BY HAMON

A settlement was effected last week which Clara Smith Hamon relinquished all claim to the estate of Jake L. Hamon, of whose alleged murder she was recently acquitted

by an Oklahoma jury, it was announced by her attorney J. B. Champion.

"An agreement," the attorney said, "has been signed between Frank Ketch, administrator of the estates of Jake L. Hamon, and Clara Smith Hamon, whereby, in consideration of \$10,000 cash, she relinquishes all claim to the estate of Hamon, the agreement recognizing as valid certain rights which the records show are vested in her.

"There are specified royalties and leases in the Hewitt Oil Company in the Healdon oil field of Central County, and other oil interests in Stephens, Center and Cotton Counties, from which Clara Smith Hamon is now drawing revenue. These interests are recognized in documents signed by Jake Hamon."

The attorney said "present revenues" from these holdings were "ample" to take care of his client.

Reports received from correspondents of the Texas Industrial Congress indicate a decided reduction in the cotton acreage, ranging from 20 to 50 per cent, and probably averaging 30 per cent for the state. Cool nights and unfavorable weather have retarded the growth and planting of cotton and the crop is now from a week to ten days late.

Prospects for a good yield of wheat and oats in Callahan county, especially the Bayou section of the local trades territory, have been improved wonderfully by the recent rains and warm weather. Corn is making progress and is up to a good stand in all the Bayou section.

LATEST WELL IN BROWN CO. FLOWING 220 BARRELS

The Kirkpatrick & Lamb well on the A. J. Williams farm sixteen miles northwest of Brownwood came in last week making 220 barrels natural flow with the tools still in the hole.

The sand was penetrated only two feet when the well began flowing and the tools were left in the hole to impede the flow until storage tanks can be erected.

This is the largest well ever brought in in Brown County and the pay sand was reached at a depth of 2,440 feet. Hundreds of oil operators are swarming into Brownwood tonight. The well will be drilled in as soon as storage can be erected.

**PLANTERS OF THE SOUTH
 WILL POOL COTTON**

Leaders in the movement to "pool" the American cotton crop as a means of furnishing a more advantageous marketing arrangement announced at Memphis Tenn., Wednesday machinery would be set in motion to put into effect throughout Southern States the plan for county and state marketing pools, indorsed at a meeting in Memphis the preceding day.

The project as approved would

be known as the American Cotton Growers Exchange and its activities national in scope. Resolutions adopted provide for the appointment of a national advisory committee to be composed of one representative from each co-operating marketing organization established under the plan and the employment of a director to aid in formulating marketing programs.

Twelve cotton growing states were represented at the conference.

Why Do People Die

No scientist, living or dead has been able to explain why any person should die except by accident or violence. They can see no reason for it, except that "it is appointed to every man once to die."

Scientists have discovered that from a moment a baby is born, the forces of life and of destruction begin to fight in the cells of its brain and body. A few immaculate homes in a fine residence district will not safeguard even that neighborhood from an epidemic. Smallpox may originate in an unsanitary home miles away and sweep the city. A polluted water supply or a stagnant pool in a vacant lot may become the source of a typhoid epidemic.

Dust dirt and filth breed disease. Disease hastens decay and death.

Let's banish these enemies of good health and long life. Let's work together for a cleaner and more sanitary city. This is the greatest and most important co-operative effort that we can make for reducing our mortality rate.

There can be nothing finer than the community spirit which demands that we clean up, paint up, and keep it up.

The Young Spurn Advice.

One peculiar thing of life is that when we grow old we cannot make the younger generation take our advice on matters of life. They say: "That may have been all right when you were young, but that was many years ago. Times have changed since then." It would be fine if we could have the younger generation start where we leave off instead of committing the same foolish mistakes that we ourselves have made, and yet it seems that this cannot be.—Dean Shaller
