CLEARING SITE FOR CASING-HEAD PLANT IN NORTH BROWN

According to report of the Brownwood Bulletin of last week the oil production in Brown county is holding up at around 900 barrels daily, and this oil is selling at \$2.60 per barrel.

Two first class pipe-lines are bringing about 1,500 barrels of oil to the refineries at Brownwood daily—one line from the north Brown county field and one from the Santa field. It is stated that work in the way of cleaning off the location site for the big casing-head plant in the north Brown county field was about ready to start and that machinery would begin to arrive within the next few days. All wells in the north Brown county field that were drilling previous to the recent cold spell and held up temporarily because of weather conditions, have resumed again and the oil field is now the center of great activity.
