There are lobbyists, however, who do not appear before committees, but who depend for results on personal persuasion with the members, on old friendships, and at times on the fact that they have been themselves members of either house of congress. This kind of lobbying is the most dangerous kind, because the lobbyist frequently asks the members of congress to vote this way or that way on the ground of friendship and not on the ground of
