Directors of the Cross Plains Frozen Food Locker Co. met on Wednesday night. May 17th and of the building to house the plant. L. W. Westerman, Cross Plains, and Gus Black of Atwell were the lowest bidders and will start work immediately on the turn-key job.

Work has already begun on razing of the building on East Eighth street, which will be used in con

When finished, the plant will be 34 foot frontage by 50 feet deep, built of tile with plate glass front. It is expected, barring unforseen complications, that the biulding will be completed within three weeks and ready for installation of equipment, part of which has already been shipped from the factory.

It is interesting to know that before 1939 there were only two locker storage plants in Texas. There are now 201 in the state, with an average of 330 boxes to the plant. Total boxes for the state num 66,381 which serve 65,262 families.

At present there are 121 new plants already approved and under consideration which will materially raise the number of boxes that will be in use by about 13,000.

During 1943, approximately 25 million pounds of food, or an av-


