Dr. Cox Gives Advice On Care Of Diseased Gums

The fact that dental decay is likely to occur in the mouth of the average person, despite proper home care given the teeth, does not lessen the importance of brushing the teeth and massaging the gums daily, nor does it minimize the need for advising and inspection of the teeth twice a year by the family dentist. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that the lack of these measures gives added power to germs that attack the enamel of the teeth and the gum tissues. "If, despite the proper application of such procedures, decay is suspected or teeth are injured in any way, the thoughtful person will seek the dentist's office promptly for the necessary corrective work," Dr. Cox said.

### DO FALL CHORES NOW SAYS GROTE

Get ready for winter cover crops. Home grown fertilizers in the form of vetch, clover, oats, rye, barley, etc. are cheaper and better for home orchard. Get your supply seed, phosphate, inoculating dust, etc. ready while the supply is adequate.

### Poison Trees Now

In pean groves where there is foreign timber to be destroyed, now is the time to apply poison solutions to get rid of the undesirable trees. From now on until September 1 is the best time for doing this work because the growing season of the trees is over and they will die sharper the axe and cut through the bark, overlapping each cut. Pour in 1 tablespoon of the poison solution for each six inches of cut made. The tree will pass on to the tree heaven in a short time. This is the formula to use: 1 1/2 gal. water, 2 lbs. sal. soda, 1 lb. lye, 2 lbs. white arsenic. Heat the water to boiling point and add the sal. soda first, then the lye slowly. Add the white arsenic last, and when all the solids have been dissolved, remove from fire.

If livestock are in the area where trees are being poisoned, it is best to remove the animals for a period of 10 to 14 days. During this time sap is likely to be running from the cuts in the trees, and if this is oozing sap is licked by livestock, death may result. As soon as the period of sap oozing is over, there is little danger of injury to livestock.

### Latest On DDT

DDT is still a very new story particularly in connection with feed and food crops.

For household and livestock insects, DDT is the best insecticide that has been found, says A. H. Grote, Jr., County Agent. But, in general entomologists are going slowly on recommendations until they know more about how the insecticide reacts on different plants under different climatic conditions.

For houseflies, mosquitoes, fleas, roaches, bedbugs, and lice, DDT is deadly. When DDT fails to control these insects, such as houseflies, the trouble may be that too low a percentage of the insecticide is being used in the spray. A five percent mixture should be used to kill houseflies, and the spray must be applied thoroughly on the walls of the house.

Several precautions must be practiced by DDT users. When spraying vegetables and truck crops, such as cabbage or sugar beets, the crop residue should not be fed to livestock. For stored grain insects, three percent dust may be used, if the grain is not to be used for food. In spite of extensive investigation, the use of DDT on fruits is not yet recommended. It should never be used on animals in an oil solution. With DDT, as with any other in-

City Water Situation Is Greatly Improved; All Storage Full To Brink. Parched pastures and suffering crops throughout the Cross Plains territory were rejuvenated this week as a general rain blanket of Callahan and adjacent counties.

Precipitations which fell here last week measured slightly less than an inch, and then again Monday morning heavy skies began dripping S. F. Bond, local weather-observer, had measured an inch more of rain Monday afternoon, and with a wet weather "front" prevailing was predicting even more moisture before the weather breaks.

Peanut crops throughout the Cross Plains territory were beginning to suffer appreciably, and another week of dry weather would have spoiled rain for hundreds of acres. It is felt, however, that whatever damage the crop may have suffered will be quickly repaired by this week's rain.

Local producers were smiling broadly Monday afternoon, and those who last week were predicting five and to headed yields were much more liberal in their forecasts.

Although the recent rains have not yielded as much stock water as might be desired, they did greatly relieve the situation, and at least five farmers who had been hauling water for 10 days are temporarily, at least, relieved of this responsibility.

In Cross Plains the water situation had become dangerously low, however, Monday all storage facilities were filled to the brim, and two wells are being pumped to maintain full tanks.
