Surrender Negotiation Take Place In Little Red School House In France

News was flashed to the world Monday morning at 8:35 to the effect that Germany had surrendered unconditionally to United States, Great Britain, Soviet Russia and their Allies, thus ending a war that had been going on for five and one half years in Europe. The surrender took place in a little red school house in Reims, France, which was the headquarters for Gen. Eisenhower

The surrender negotiations were signed for Germany by Col. Gen. Gustav-Jodi, who was the new chief of staff of the German army. It was signed for the Allied command by Lieut. Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, chief of staff for General Eisenhower. It was also signed by General Ivan Susloparoff for Russia, and by General Francois Sevez for France.

The news flash was received without official confirmation from either General Eisenhower or President Truman. To the general public it needed no confirmation and many thousands celebrated Monday as VE Day.

However late Monday afternoon a release stated that President Truman would make an announcement at 8 a. m. (CWT) Tuesday. It was also stated in London and Moscow that an announcement of V-E Day would be made there at the same hour, and it was at this time that everyone knew V-E Day had arrived.

Promptly at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning President Truman issued his proclamation stating that Germany had surrendered unconditionally. He declared Tuesday as V-E Day.

The local signal designating V-E Day was sounded and soon citizens were gathered at the high school to take part in the program planned for this occasion. A very impressive memorial service and thanksgiving was held, starting at ten o'clock. The climax came during the closing words of the main address, which was given by Rev. D. E. Simpson, when a reading was given to the flag of the United States, and immediately followed by placing of a memorial wreath beneath the service flag dedicating it to the memory of boys who had paid the supreme price in this war.

Business houses of the city were closed for the day, some few of them staying open only a few minutes in the early morning.

This V-E Day was far from being the gay, festive affair that so many had imagined it to be. With the exception of the siren very few unnecessary noises were made. People everywhere wore an expression of reverence and it looked as if a real celebration could not and would not be staged until final victory over the Japanese in the Pacific was announced.

V-E Day was a special day in which to give thanks to Almighty God for His help and guidance in successfully bringing the war in Europe to a close. We should not let down for one minute now, but should dedicate ourselves anew to do all that is in our power to prosecute the war to the utmost in the Pacific.

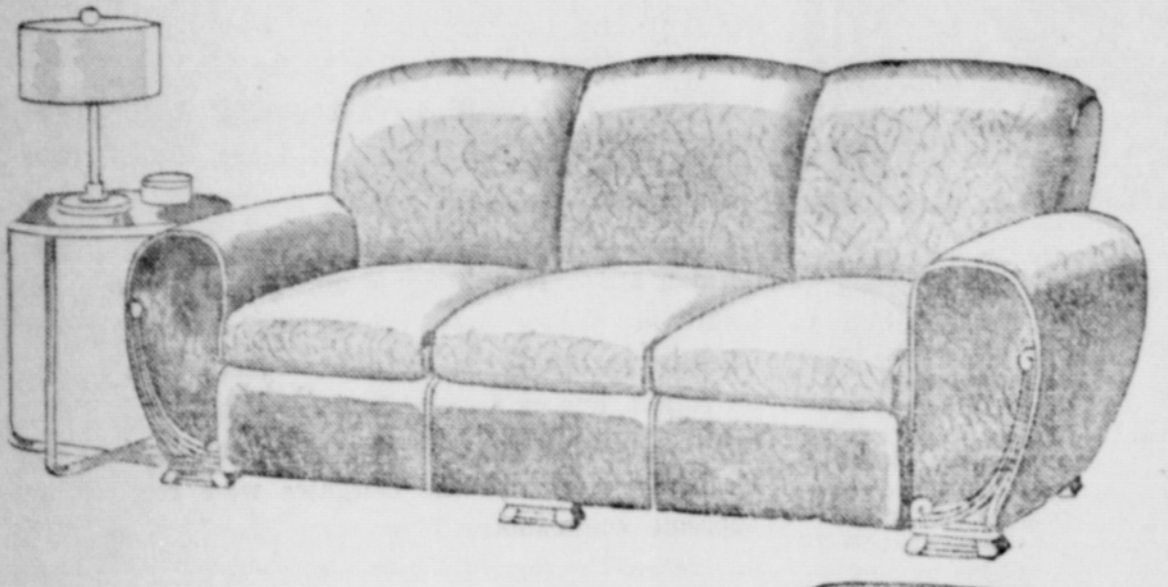

Fresh pineapple soon will be on the market, and since canned pineapple on grocery shelves requires high tools in blue ration points, many Texas home makers, both rural and urban, are expected to can pineapple at home this year.
Sugar loaf and smooth Cayenne varieties imported into Texas from Mexico, seem to be the best for canning, in the opinion of Dorothy WilkerSON, county Home Demonstration agent. It is important to select ripe fruit, since pineapple that is sun-ripened has more flavor and contains more fruit sugar. Ripe pineapple can be distinguished since it is orange colored, and the spines can readily be pulled out.
