



Notes From H. D. Agent LORETA ALLEN

1. Balance. The pan and its 6:30. handle should be well-balanced so hat the pan stands steady even when empty. Too heavy a handle makes a tipsy pan that is awkward o use and may cause dangerous spills of hot water and food.

2. Surface. The smoother the pan -that is, the fewer the cracks at oinings-the more durable and easy to clean.

3. Bottom. A flat bottom helps eep a pan steady and means faster eating and more economical use of fuel on electric, coal or wood anges. Pans for use on electric toves should have dull-finished bottoms to save fuel. A dull finish bsorbs heat in contrast to a shiny finish which reflects it.

4. Sides. Straight sides are more economical of heat and also of space in the stove than flaring sides. 5. Handle. Handles of pans and covers should be comfortable to

grasp and insulated against heat. 6. Cover. A close-fitting cover is worthless stock if you wish to get essential for many cooking processes, so buying a pan and cover to-(4tp-36) gether is often worth the extra

7. Thickness. Thin, lightweight sheet aluminum is less expensive MLE or trade: few good fixtures, hot water heaters, electric lighter to handle but also less durwater pumps. - See J. C. 8. Metal. Stainless steel is more durable than aluminnum of the same weight and thickness. It does not darken in cooking alkaline foods as aluminum does, but, once darkit cannot be brightened as aluminum can. Aluminum has the ad evenly so cooks more evenly with


