Texans Are Satisfied With Places Where They Live

AUSTIN, Texas, July 2.—The long-standing rivalry between Fort Worth and Dallas is illustrated by an anecdote they tell about Amon Carter, well-known publisher of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Carter, so the story goes, was in an airplane over Dallas. He looked down and saw the giant flying red horse on the Magnolia building. Turning to a companion, he exclaimed: "Everybody knows Dallas is a one-horse town; I can't see why they have to advertise it."

For, in a statewide survey conducted by The Texas Poll, more people said they would rather live in Dallas than Fort Worth. And not a single one mentioned anything about a horse.

Mind you this was an accurate poll. It included correct proportions of men and women of all walks of life, rich and poor, of all ages, farm and city folks, whites and Negroes, living in all parts of Texas.

Seven out of every ten adults questioned took one side or the other, with the result coming out about four to three in favor of Dallas. Eighteen per cent would express no opinion. Seven per cent said both places were about the same. And five per cent labeled both cities by saying neither was fit to live in.

This was the question: "As between Dallas and Fort Worth, which do you think is the better place to live?"

Now you shouldn't jump to the conclusion, after looking at the above figures, that most people are getting ready to move to Dallas and Fort Worth.

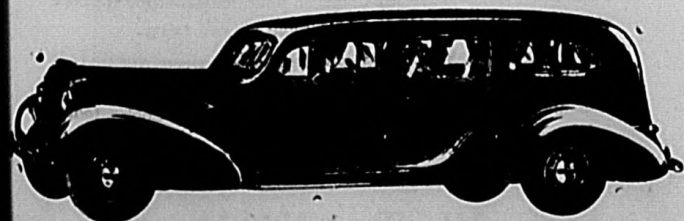

30 YEARS AGO
July 11, 1919

People Who Sweat Should Take Salt Tablets Cox Says

A deficiency of salt in the human system can cause serious consequences, and for this reason Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises every person whose work is such that it causes excessive perspiration to add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water taken during the day.

Farmers, mechanics, carpenters, construction men and all others whose work causes them to sweat profusely are in danger of having their body salt content seriously depleted, and as a result may suffer from heat cramps or heat tag. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat, and when the thermometer hits the high register, the human body may lose as much as 40 to 50 grams of salt during a single day.

In many industrial plants, workmen are furnished and urged to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Many find this a pleasant way of taking extra salt, but others prefer to add the needed amount of extra salt to their food and drink.

"Take your extra salt in any manner that is agreeable to you," says Dr. Cox, "but take it. Heat cramps are very painful and exhausting. They are characterized by cramps in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases there may be nausea and vomiting. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until a deficiency exists; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp." According to the State Health Officer, it is a wise precaution to keep the body supplied with salt, and thus avoid much possible suffering and loss of time from heat cramps.

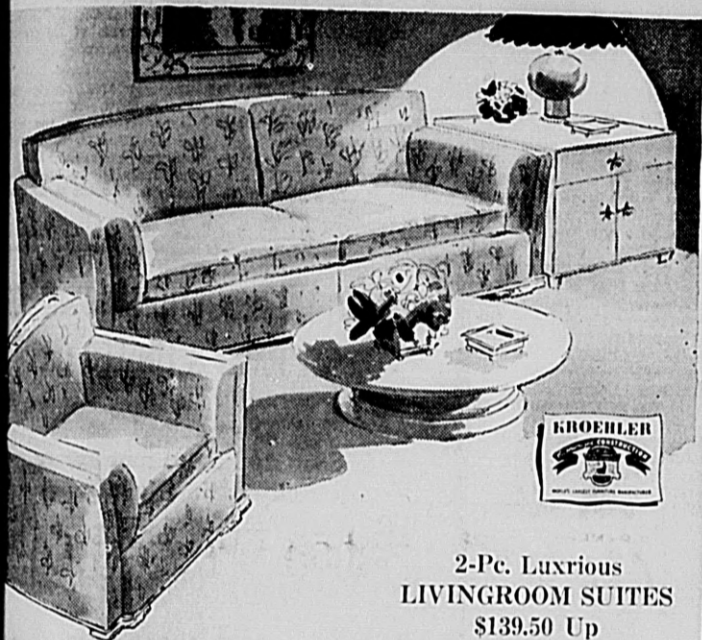

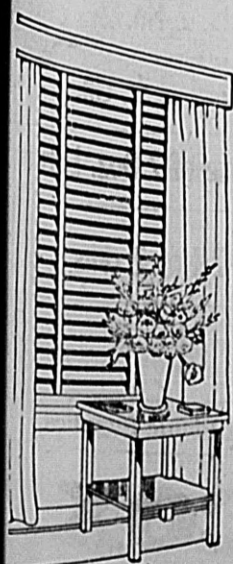

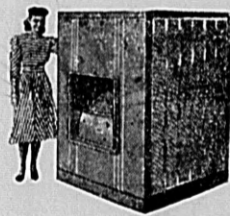

PEANUT PRICES WEAKER

Peanuts sold slightly weaker under light demand during the past week, according to the southwest area office of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration.

Since most mills have completed cleaning and shelling operations for the season, offerings of shelled Spanish peanuts were reported at 16 1/2 cents a pound in the southwest. This week's price averaged around a fraction of a cent below this time last month or a year ago.

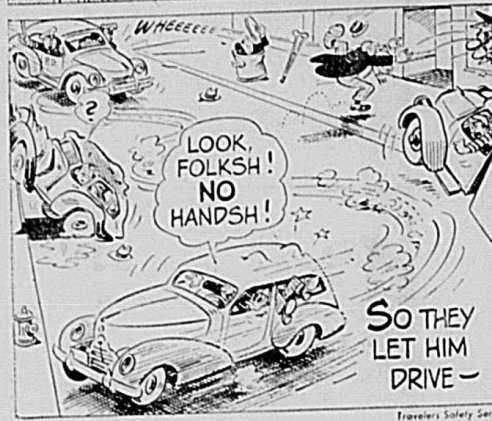
Weather conditions continued to favor the growing new crop in all three of the country's major peanut producing areas. Planting was practically finished in the southwest.

Two and one half acres of the King Ranch strain of Yellow Bluestem grass produced 353 pounds of seed on the J. A. Sikes farms in the Rowden conservation group.
