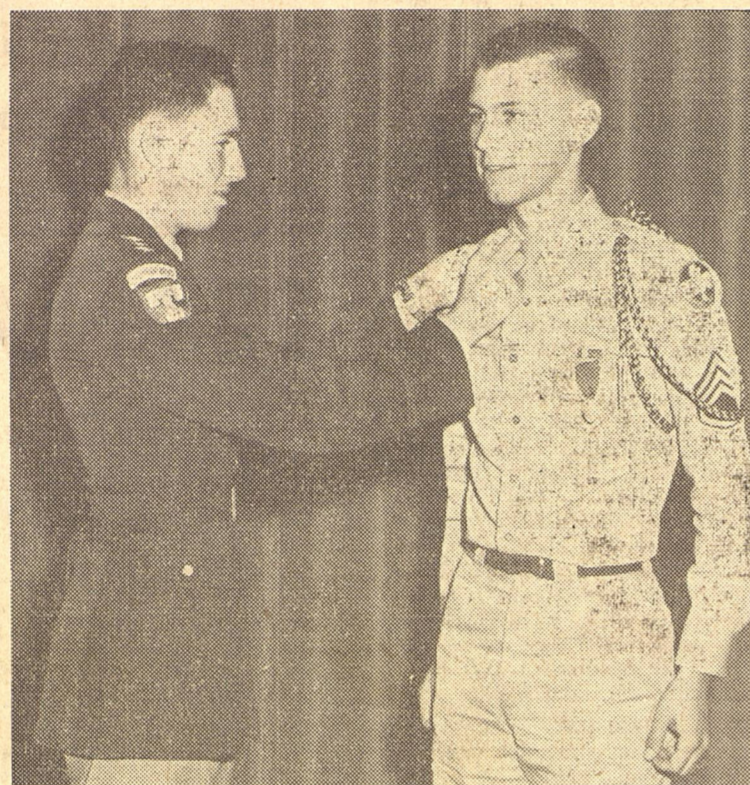

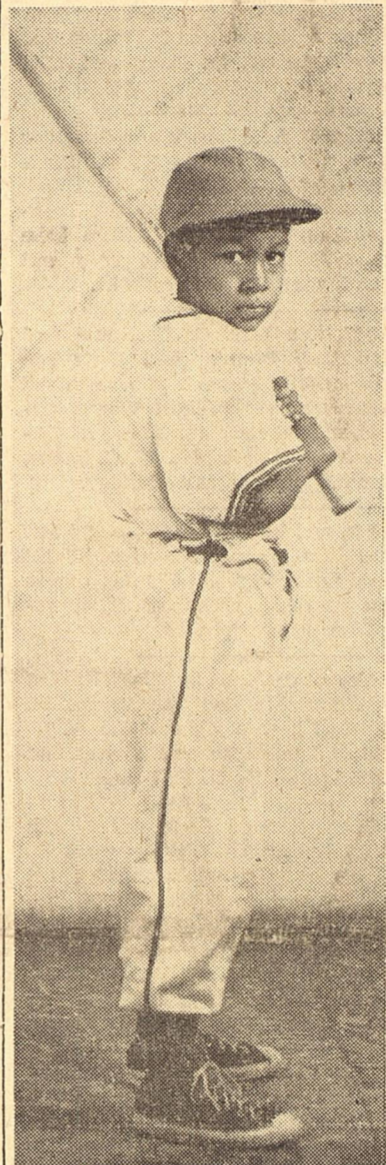

You get a program of warfare like this started and I believe mankind will be so busy survivin the grass and weeds his weapons will rust.

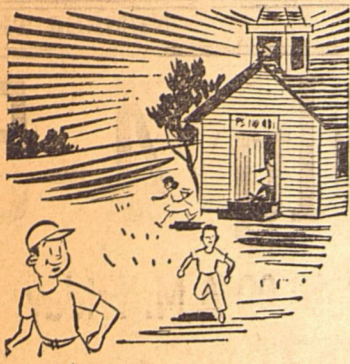

HEALTH NOTES

In the past, medicine and public health have concerned themselves largely with the health and disease problems of youth and middle age said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. We have neglected our aged population and have waited upon the devastations of time before extending aid to the old.

Our population each year includes an increasing number and percentage of older people. In 1950 in the United States, it is estimated that there are 11,000,000 persons over sixty-five years of age as compared to 3,000,000 in 1900. In absolute numbers, aged persons among us have almost quadrupled in the last 50 years, whereas the proportion of early persons to the remainder of the population has merely doubled.

Dr. Cox stated that preventive medicine, private medical care, and social service have assisted in extending the life span. As encouraging as this fact may be, there is an accompanying tribulation: the aged are subject to the chronic diseases which, because of destroyed tissue structure, are especially weakened. Heart disease, cancer, diabetes, and other long-term-illnesses resist the physician's most skillful attack and are notably disabling and lethal.

To insure health and peace of mind to our old people, preventive and curative medicine and social service can contribute techniques of prevention and care. These techniques should properly include the early discovery of beginning disease processes through periodic examinations that begin in early life and continue for one's remaining years. By such means many cases of chronic disease, with all their agony and sure fatality, might either be prevented or, through the substitution of different living regimes, be rendered tolerable.

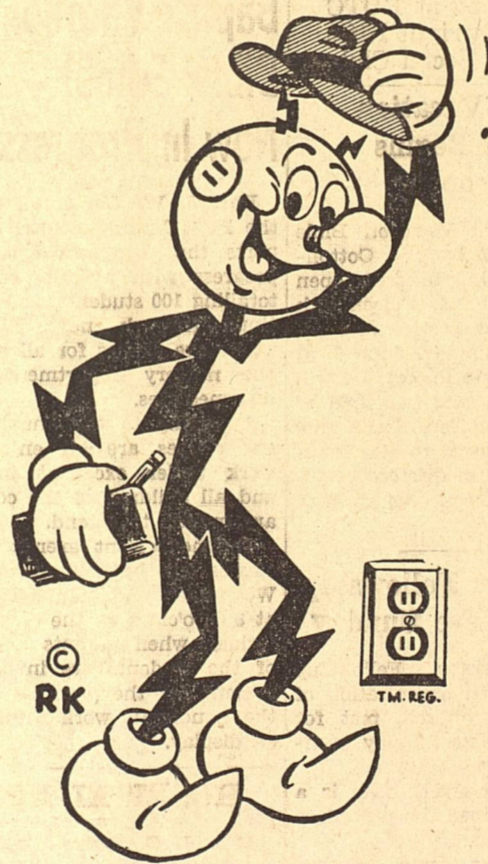

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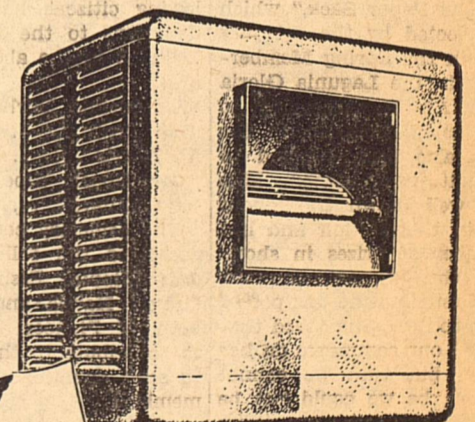

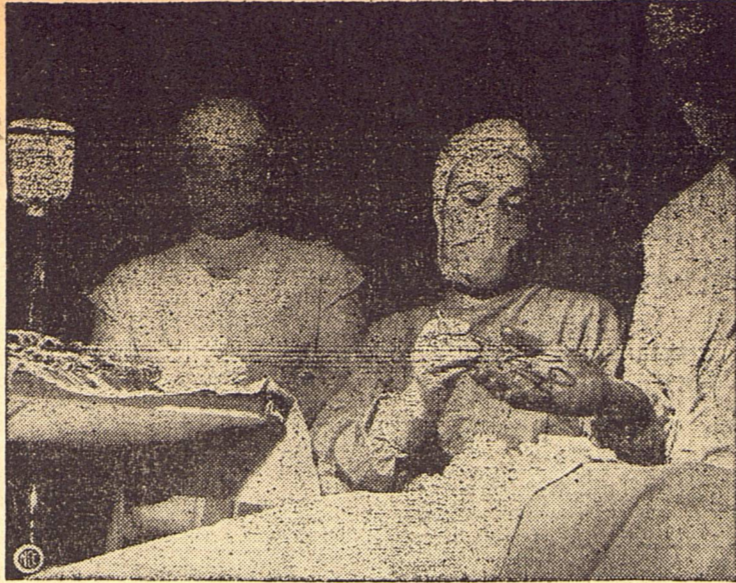

PMA Office At Baird Gives Information On Castor Bean Program For '52 Crop

Have you considered planting a crop of castor beans on your farm this year? Perhaps the following information on the Castor Bean Program will be helpful to you in deciding if you want to plant this crop in 1952:

1. We have been assured that machinery for hulling castor beans will be installed at some location within the county, provided a suitable building can be obtained. We feel confident that we will be able to locate a suitable building, and that we will have a place to hull and market castor beans in Callahan County this year.
2. One or more Stripper Harvesters may be made available for custom use in harvesting castor beans after frost. Several improvements have been made in this machinery since 1951.
3. Land that would produce good peanuts, cotton, or grain sorghum,

may also be expected to produce a profitable crop of castor beans.

4. Castor bean growers are assured 10 cents per pound or the market price, whichever is the higher, for their hulled castor beans. This guaranteed price is included in the contract.

5. Castor bean seed are now available at this office for sale to farmers at 15 cents per pound. At the average seeding rate, the cost for seed to plant an acre of castor beans is \$1.50.

6. To date, 52 Callahan County farmers have contracted to plant approximately 930 acres of castor beans. This is about three times the acreage planted in the county in 1951.

June 15 is the final recommended date for planting castor beans. If you are interested in growing castor beans, we would appreciate the opportunity to explain the program in detail.

Q—I bought a home with a GI loan. I'm going back into military service, and I don't think I'll be able to meet my full payments. Is there anything I can do to reduce them to fit my income?

A—Discuss your situation with the holder of your mortgage. If your total income while in service isn't enough to keep up your regular payments, you may make arrangements with him to pay as much as you can. The amount you are able to pay will be postponed until you are discharged. At that time, you should make arrangements with the lender to pay it back.

Q—I expect to complete law school this spring under the GI Bill. May I enroll in a bar review course, also under the GI Bill?

A—No. A bar review course usually is a review of what you learned, rather than an advancement or progression to a higher level of knowledge. Under VA's post-cut-off-date regulations, additional training must be a progression to the next higher level.

Q—A friend of mine failed to report for a physical examination in connection with his VA compensation claim. Will his compensation be cut off?

A—Unless he has a good reason for failing to keep his appointment, his compensation will be suspended. When he eventually reports, retroactive payments may be made, if he presents evidence clearly establishing that his disability existed to compensable degree during the intervening time.

Q—I hold GI insurance and pay my premiums monthly. Would I save any money if I started paying them once a year, in advance?

A—Yes. You would save three percent by paying your premiums annually. Of course, you'd also be saving the government money in reduced bookkeeping costs.

Some 30,000 Texans Will Die This Year As Result Of Heart Disease

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox has forecast the death this year of some 30,000 Texans due to heart and blood vessel diseases. Twenty thousand will be men, and at least half the total figure—both men and women—will be less than 70 years old.

The problem of worn-out hearts, thickened blood vessels, and kidney disorders is an old line, he asserted, but said the longer length of average life isn't the whole reason for the great numbers of heart disease deaths.

To prove that point he quoted these figures: Of the 30,000 Texans that cardiovascular (heart and blood vessel) diseases will kill in 1952, about 15,000 will be less than 70 years old, 700 will be in their 30's, 2,000 will be in their 40's, 4,500 in their 50's, and at least 7,000 in the 60's.

Since 1941, the male death rate has exceeded the female rate by something like 70 per cent, the health officer said. For those 75 and over the risk of death from heart disease is a fourth again as great for men as it is for women. These ever increasing deaths to heart, kidney, and blood vessel disorders have been observed for the last 30 or 40 years.

"If a statewide heart program is to develop," he declared, "it will be necessary that there be provided a professional coordinating committee that will council on program procedures and give necessary directions on essential medical services."

He credited the American Heart Association with successfully influencing fund appropriations, and for formulating a heart control program for the nation.

Social Security Representative To Be At Cisco, June 12-26

E. Glen McNatt, Field Representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco at 2:00 p.m., on Thursday, June 12 and 26. Persons wishing to file retirement claims or survivor's claims under the Social Security Act are invited to call at that time.

McNatt in a statement made today, called attention to the importance of the social security card and stated that it is each worker's responsibility to keep possession of his card. Getting a duplicate is simple but it takes about a week or 10 days to verify the number and issue a duplicate. If the job seeker has lost his card, he may miss a chance to go to work during this week or 10 days.

Over 100 million cards have been issued nationally since social security began 15 years ago. Another five million will be issued this year, including those going to self-employed persons and persons in other recently covered groups.

Young people starting on their careers or vacation jobs will need cards soon. Mr. McNatt suggests that these young folks might follow the example set by workers now reaching retirement age. They have carried cards for about 15 years, and many of them still have their original cards. They recognized that their cards had a definite value to them, and now in their older years it is paying off.

Applications for social security cards may be obtained at the local post office. Completed applications should be mailed to the Social Security Administration, Post Office Building, Abilene, Texas.

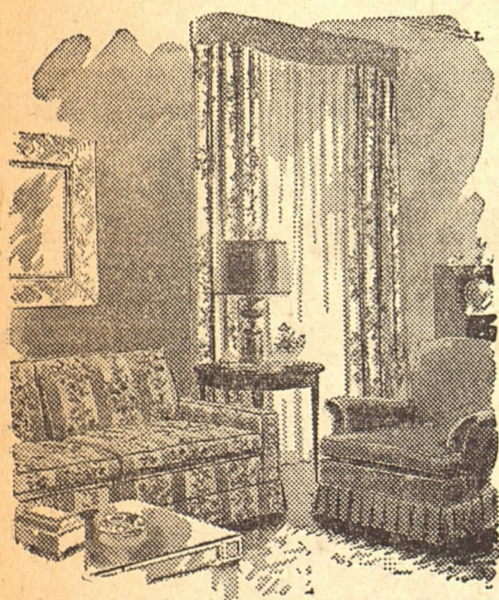
