

In 358 Emperor Julian, although he defeated the Salian invaders, allowed them to establish themselves permanently in Toxandria, the country between the Meuse and the Scheldt. From this time Frankish chiefs and warriors frequently served in the Roman armies; and during the fifth century they rendered valuable service to the empire by stemming the tide of barbarian invasion. By this time the Salian Franks had made themselves masters of northern Gaul, while the Ripuarians were concentrated around Ripuarians were concentrated around Cologne. Under Hiedowig or Clovis, king of the former confederation, the king of the former confederation, the Franks were converted to Christianity, while by his conquests in central Gaul, and by his subjugation of the Alemanni and the Ripuarian Franks, he not only extended his dominions as far as the Loire in the one direction and the Maine in the other, but he laid the foundation of what subsequently developed into the what subsequently developed into the kingdom of France.
