

Veterans' News

The number of veterans in an interrupted or discontinued train-ing status increased slightly during November, Veterans Administration

reported. Of all veterans who had entered

Of all veterans who had entered training under the Vocational Re-habilitation Act (Public Law 16) for disabled veterans since the pro-gram began, 32 percent, or 121,700, no longer were in training on November 30, 1947. This number includes 22,400 disabled veterans who have been declared rehabili-tated. Under the G I Bill (Public Law 346), about 43 percent, or 1,915, 400, of all veterans who started training since the beginning of the program, no longer were in train-ing at the end of the month. Only 9,600 of this number completely ex-hausted their entitlement to train-ing.

Veterans Administration during November entered into 1,076 con-tracts and 700 contract supple-ments with educational institutions to provide educational institutions the total number of contracts in force at the end of the month to 11,008. Agreements with job training es-

11,908. Agreements with job training es-tablishments signed during the month totaled—4.481. On Novem-ber 30, 1947, there were 206,811 such agreements in force. At the end of November, 607,146 job training establishments and 40,007 educational institutions were on the approved list of training facilities.
