The Armed Services will ask Congress for substantial increases in pay for all grades in all services, as soon as Defense Secretary James V. Forrestal approves drafts of pro-posed legislation, it was announced in Washington recently. The joint Army-Navy Pay Com-

The joint Army-Navy Pay Committee, formed last summer to study service pay, has concluded that pay increases are necessary in order to stimulate recruiting, and to find men of high caliber after they are obtained.

"We must be able to compete with private industry for men of the highest caliber," a spokesman for the committee said.

The amount of the increase The amount of the increase re-commended was not disclosed. The committee spokesman said, how-ever, it would be greater than last year's boost which ranged to 50% for enlisted men, 20% for junior officers and 10% for senior of-ficers. ficers.

## Traffic Accident **Prevention Only**

"The only way to avoid the use-less waste of life due to traffic accidents is to prevent the acci-dent," reads a warning issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Of-

dent," reads a warning issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"It is not a question of who is right and who is wrong after the accident has occurred," he said, "And automobile accidents never happen merely because of 'bad uck'—there is a definite cause for every one of them, although it is not possible to determine the precise origin of every mishap.

"Leaders of the safety movement agree that the most fundamental approach to the solution lies in the education and training of the individual. Safety education includes the training of individuals to avoid accidents themselves and to prevent accidents to others. It involves the acquisition of a certain fund of information, the ability to apply this information to concrete situations, and the building up of habits which will make the application of knowledge to situations automatic.

"The dangerous curves and inter-

"The dangerous curves and inter-sections on the highways of Texas are distinctly marked, and auto-mobile drivers can assist greatly in the reduction of deaths from automobile accidents by carefully ob-serving these warning signs.

"Some motorists rely too much on traffic rules and regulations, thinking that if they obey the rules of the road at the time when an accident occurs, no blame can be attached to them. This is not true. The only man who considers him-self blameless in case of accidents, when he was obeying the rules of the road, is the one who did every-thing possible to avoid that acci-dent

"The consequences of automobile "The consequences of automobile accidents are so disasterous that only when we have done everything in our power to avoid such accidents can we consider ourselves, or expect others to consider us, blameless in the case of accident.

"When each individual does all that he is able to do toward avoiding an accident of any kind, then and then only will our traffic accidents be avoided."

#### Veterans' News

The number of World War II veterans in all types of training under federal programs administration reached a new peak of 2,800,000 on November 30, 1047.

The current enrollment is more than four per cent higher than the previous peak of 2,074,000 established on April 30, 1947.

November figures represent new

November figures represent new peaks under each of the two laws providing education and training for veterans. By the end of the month, 2,546,000 veterans were in training under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill), and 254,000 under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) for disabled veterans.

New high levels were reached during November in all of the major training classifications under both laws with the exception of job training under the GI Bill. This type of training declined for the tenth consecutive month.

Most of the GI Bill trainees were studying in schools, with 1,150,000 enrolled in colleges and universities and 651,500 taking work in other schools below the collegiate level. Institutional on-farm training attracted 199,000 while 545,500 were training on-the-job.

948 Program:

The following soil and wate conservation practices have been se-lected by committeemen as the one for which assistance will be offer

6. Leaving on land or turning under a good stand and growth of winter legumes seeded in the fall

The Callahan County AAA office has been allocated \$44,900,00 to be used in 1948 for assistance to farmers in carrying out the above practices. Of this amount, \$5,570,00 has already been obligated for the winter legume practice. The remainder will be divided among the other practices to be carried out during the 1948 program year. Due to the fact that the fund available for assistance in carrying out practices in 1947, it will be necessary that the county committee allocate smaller amounts to each farm in order that. Some assistance will be available to as many farmers as possible.

Just as in previous years, each person who expects to receive payment for a practice carried out on his farm in 1948 must secure a written prior approval from the county office before the practice is begun. Each person requesting prior approval will be advised of the amount of assistance available to him for carrying out the practice, The amount of assistance for each individual and each farm will be based on a policy established by be based on a policy established by

each individual and each farm will be based on a policy established by the County Committee. The Calla-han County AAA office expects to be in a position to start issuing approvals for 1948 approved prac-tices immediately after January 1, 1948.
