





### Beware Of Housefly Warns Health Officer

The ordinary housefly is an end my to health, and is one of the agents most commonly responsible for the spread of disease throughfor the spread of disease through-out the nation, according to DT. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Typhold fever, dysentery, and many other intestinal diseases can often be traced to the common housefly as the carrier of infection.

be taked to the common housefly as the carrier of infection. Speaking in this connection, Dr. Cox advised: "Be sure that your windows and doors are tightly screened so that stray files will not endanger the health of your family. Keep files away from food, drink, and utensils used in the pre-paration of food. Make sure, if you live in rural districts, that outside privy vauits are tightly covered so as not to permit the entrance of files. Infections from this source can be picked up by files and spread to human beings through contact with food, drink, and utensils. Keep all gates for files and sure and the helping your community in its work of controlling communi-cable diseases and preventing un-necessary illness."

Dr. Cox said that the State Health Department would furnish upon request a pamplet outlining safe and practidal methods recom-mended for use in fly control.




