

#### **VETERANS Question Box**

Q—When is National Service Life Insurance considered lapsed? A—It is lapsed when a veteran

fails to make a payment of pre-mium within 31 days from the date it was due.

Q—If I don not receive National Service Life Insurance premium notices or receipts promptly, should I continue to send my premiums? A—Yes. You also should clearly

A—Yes. You also should clearly identify your payments by giving your insurance policy number, but if that is not available, you should give your rank, organization and your servire serial number.

Q—If I filled a change of address with the VA hospital or regional office where my claims folder is on file, will the same change be made on my insurance records?

A—No. Change of address for purpose of compensation or pension is not a notice of change of address, should be executed by the insured to potify the Insurance Service in the appropriate Branch Office.

Q—When may a veteran decide.

Q—When may a veteran decide whether he will pursue training under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (GI Bill) or under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act?

A—After eligibility has been established under both laws.
