H. D. Agent's Column

Soil Care
Shrubs and trees which are set out within the past year will need extra moisture. They have grown good roots, but they need water during the summer months. Advice comes from Sadie, extension landscape gardener, specialist of Texas A&M College. She says that experience with planting of native shrubs has shown that the first two years after setting out the plants are the most critical period—after they are hardy enough to stand normal weather conditions.

Contours and small terraces to catch and hold water after every rain will help to keep the soil moist. Shallow cultivation will also help. The use of mulch is an excellent way to hold moisture around trees and shrubs.

Among the good mulches to be found around farm and ranch homes, Miss Hatfield says, are decayed leaves, grass clippings, decayed wheat or oat straw, decayed hay or barnyard fertilizer. Place the mulch two or more inches deep.

An inch or two of sand is sometimes used on tight soils. When the sand or mulch, or both, are worked into the soil next year, they will improve the soil's water-holding capacity.

The growth of favorite flowers, shrubs and trees often can be helped by removing other plants which take up moisture.

Miss Hatfield points out that a light watering does more harm than good, as it causes roots to grow near the top of the soil. A good, slow watering once a week giving the moisture a chance to soak several inches into the ground, is much better than a light watering every day.

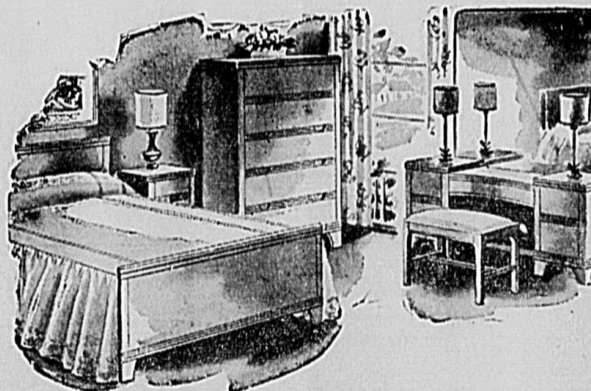

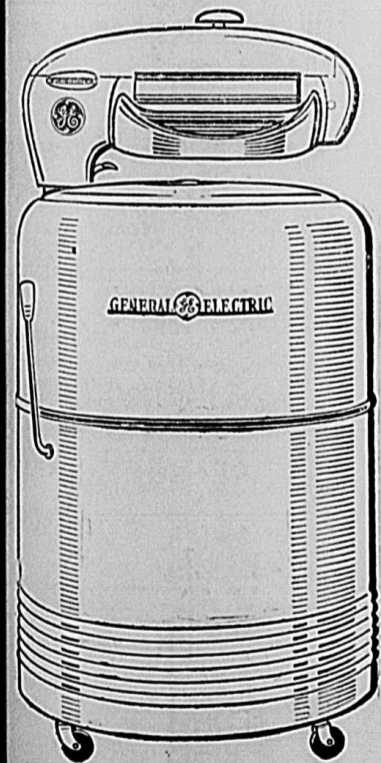
