## Deep Try On McClure Approaching Verdict In Ellenburger Lime

Drilling was progressing yesterday below 3,800 feet on the Eastern States Petroleum Company, Inc., number one W. T. McClure, seven miles north of Cross Plains, in a projected test of the Ellenburger lime. Verdict is expected sometime next week.

Cores taken of the Caddo lime, as well as several younger formations, offer some promise of commercial production and are expected to be given production trials if the Ellenburger fails.

Location of this well is 1,650 feet from the north and 3,968 from the east line of the John Sayers survey. It is in the same general vicinity of the Sunray test drilled on the Aspin acreage early this year.

Miss Dena Lou Cox, Cross Plains high school student and only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Cox of this city, received a letter of appreciation this week from a German stenographer for a coat which she had sent to war ravaged Europe.

By permission of the recipient the letter is reproduced hereunder: "With great joy and many, many thanks I received the pretty coat, and every time I wear it I think of the dear American friends who send us such nice things. I don't believe you can imagine how thankful and glad we are about your plentiful gifts. Your coat fits me

very well and by this I guess that we are probably the same stature and age. I am 25 years old and work as a typist. I live with my mother. My father died after the first World War, when I was a girl of three years, and I have no brothers and sisters. My beloved fiancé died as a prisoner in Russia in 1945.

"Some time ago I began to learn English and I was happy being able to understand your letter (which was in a pocket of the coat). I should be pleased to receive an answer to my lines."

The letter was signed by Elizabeth Wayand, who is a resident of the British zone of occupation.

## SON OF COUPLE KNOWN HERE BADLY BURNED

Brought immediately to a Rising Star hospital, he was a while considered in a serious condition, however, later diagnosis revealed worse burns on the shoulder than other portions of the body and an attending physician said if scarring remained it would be there, other burns expected to heal evenly.

## Drouth Broken Over Week End By Rains Measuring 2 Inches

One of the most severe drouths in recent years appeared broken this week after general rains blanketed the Cross Plains area Saturday and Sunday. In Cross Plains the intermittent precipitations which covered most of two days, measured 1.75 inches, however, north and west of town the fall was heavier.

Farmers were particularly jubilant over the rain as it offered an opportunity to plant small grains in time to possibly afford some late winter grazing. Several grain farmers had gambled on the weather and "dusted" in wheat, oats and barley. Concensus Monday was that the week end precipitation was sufficient to bring up this seed.

The moisture began falling early Saturday afternoon and continued Sunday morning a harder fall covered this entire area. Although most of the water soaked into the earth, some tanks caught appreciable amounts of stock water.

Ranchers report good prospect for winter grass and possibly some respite from burdensome feed bills within a few weeks, particularly if additional rain is shortly forthcoming.

Total rainfall for the year in Cross Plains totals 11.91 inches. By months the precipitations have been as follows: January 21, February 1.07, March .60, April 1.39, May 1.21, June 2.72, July 2.09, August .50, September .40, and thus far in October 1.72.

## Anzac Below 2,200 In Well On Montgomery

Eight inch casing was set to 2,050 feet last week in the Anzac Oil Company's number one S. O. Montgomery, eight miles west of Cross Plains. Drilling was progressing yesterday below 2,200 feet.

Cable tools are being used on the well and plans call for a test of the Ellenburger lime, expected around 3,875 feet, unless commercial production is found at a lesser depth.

McCord and 128 other persons, representing themselves to be resident, qualified electors of Callahan County, Texas, Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 who own taxable property in said Precinct and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, praying that this Court order an election in Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Callahan County, Texas, on the question of the issuance of \$75,000.00 of Road Bonds, which said petition was heretofore filed in this Court; and

WHEREAS, heretofore on the 1st day of September, 1948, the Commissioners' Court passed an order fixing a time and place for a hearing on said petition, to-wit: September 22, 1948, and directed the County Clerk to issue a notice of such time and place of hearing to inform all persons concerned of their rights to appear at such hearing and to contend for or protest against the order of such election; and

WHEREAS, the County Clerk has heretofore duly executed said notice by posting true copies of said order of hearing in three public places within said Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Callahan County, and another copy thereof at the Courthouse door of said County for ten days prior to the date fixed for the hearing, and said notice has also been published in a newspaper of general circulation in said Commissioners' Precinct No. 4, namely "The Cross Plains Review",

one time, on the 17 day of September, 1948, which was at least five days prior to the date fixed for said hearing; and

WHEREAS, this Court, having met at the time and place set for the hearing of said petition, proceeded to hear such petition and all matters in respect to the proposed bond election, and it is found by the Court that the said petition, is signed by a majority of the qualified electors who own taxable property in Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Callahan County, Texas, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that the notice required by law to be given of said hearing has been given; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the hearing held on said date and from the evidence submitted at said hearing, the Court has determined that the proposed improvements would be for the benefit of all taxable property situated in such Commissioners' Precinct No. 4, and that it is desirable and necessary to issue the bonds of such Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 in the amount of Seventy Five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars to construct such improvements, and that said election should be ordered; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court further finds that the amount of said proposed bond issue, together with all outstanding bonds heretofore issued on the faith and credit of Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Callahan County, Texas, will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Precinct; and

WHEREAS, said Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Callahan County has heretofore been legally created by order of the Commissioners' Court passed on January 3, 1936.

"Whether or not the bonds of Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Callahan County, Texas, shall be issued under Article III, Section 52 of the Constitution in an amount not to exceed \$75,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed four (4%) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and maturing at such time, as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed Twenty (20) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof throughout said Commissioners' Precinct No. 4, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said District sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

2. The metes and bounds of Callahan County Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 are set forth in the order fixing the time and place of hearing on the petition for the issuance of bonds which was passed on the 1st day of September, 1948.

3. The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the Thirty-Ninth Legislature.

4. All persons who are legally qualified electors of this State and of this Commissioners' Precinct who own taxable property in the Precinct and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote, and all such electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

OF."

5. The election shall be held at each of the following voting places:

In Precinct No. 6 in Cross Plains at City Hall, with the following election officials:  
J. G. Sims, Presiding Judge,  
T. M. Shuford, Judge,  
W. B. Baldwin, Clerk,  
W. C. Rouse, Clerk.

In Precinct No. 3 in Cottonwood, at School House, with the following election officials:  
H. S. Varner, Presiding Judge,  
R. F. Joy, Clerk,  
W. J. Coats, Clerk.

In Precinct No. 13, in Atwell, at Church Building, with the following election officials:  
D. L. Sessions, Presiding Judge,  
Tipton Wrinkle, Clerk,  
J. P. Purvis, Clerk.

6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the General Laws of this State regulating general elections when not in conflict with the provisions of Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the 39th Legislature, hereinabove cited.

7. Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper published in Commissioners' Precinct No. 4 of Callahan County, for three successive weeks before the date of said election, and in addition thereto, there shall be posted copies of this order at three public places in said district, and one at the

Courthouse door of the County for three consecutive weeks prior to said election.

8. The County Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to post said notices and to cause same to be published as hereinabove directed. Further orders by this Court are reserved until the return of said election executed by the duly authorized election officers, are received by this Court.

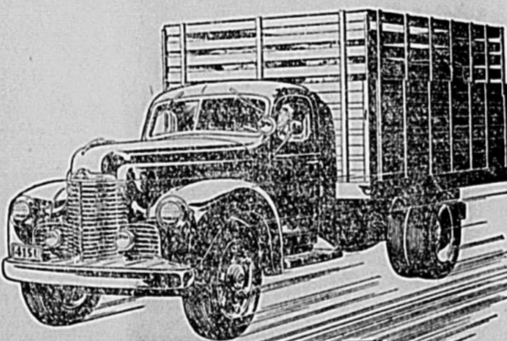

## County Agent's Column

In the special 4-H Club Callahan County gilt show on Saturday, Jimmy Hicks of the Clyde club placed 1st. Other placings were: Robert Collins, Clyde, 2nd; Billy Wolfe, Denton, 3rd; Dale Crawford, Oplin, 4th; and Buck McClure, Eula, 5th. In the open pen of three fat market hog show, Robert Armor of the Denton Club placed 1st, and Winford Gardner of Eula placed 2nd.

Against competition from the best gilts, boars, and pens of three fat hogs from Jones, Shackelford, Eastland, Haskell, and Taylor Counties, Jimmy Hicks placed 5th with his gilt, Robert Armor placed 3rd with his pen of three, and Donald Ray of the Eula Club placed 4th with his boar.

These gilts and boars were won by the boys in an essay contest sponsored by the Sears foundation. The boys received the pigs at weaning age and have done a fine job of developing the pigs.

### Pasture Renovation

Renovation means to repair, make over, rebuild or re to freshness. So when renovation is tied in with pastures, it means rebuilding your pastures to new freshness—giving them a new start. The renovation of old pastures this fall will make more lush grazing and more milk for years to come, says R. R. Lancaster, Extension pasture specialist of Texas A&M College.

Pastures contribute more than one-third of all feed eaten by livestock generally, and more than one-third of the feed furnished by farm pastures is used by dairy cattle. The yield and carrying capacity of poor and weed pastures can be built up by discing or plowing, fertilizing and reseeding either in the fall or spring, or both times.

To keep good pastures at a high production level, fence off one-fourth or one-fifth each year for renovating. Take an old bermuda grass pasture, for instance. You can restore it to new freshness

pretty easily. It might be limed and well torn up by discing or plowing. The next step is to fertilize with 400 pounds of 0-14-7 or 4-12-3. Land that is too poor to grow clover or lespedeza may be seeded to vetch or rye. This provides supplementary grazing while the bermuda grass sod is being renovated. Renovation of pastures pays off in profits from milk and beef.
