4 New Wells Promise Relief Of Strain On City's Water Supply

City's Water Supply

Four new wells with an estimated potential of more than 72,000 gallons daily will be pressed into production next week to suppliment Cross Plains' water supply.

2,000 feet of three inch invasion pipe will be laid from the Howard Gary place, a quarter mile East of town, and water piped to the settling and treating reservoir.

City officials are highly optimistic about the new water strike, pointing out that it possesses the best gravel body yet found in this locality, indicating longer life and more abundant production. Any of the four new wells is believed capable of 20 gallons per minute, however, Water Commissioned Edwin Baum chose to be conservative in estimating their total potential at only 72,000 gallons daily.

Particularly gratifying to city fathers was the fact that the new source of water is so near the city's settling basin, requiring less than 2,000 feet of pipe. A shortage in tubular goods has prevented laying lines to more distant sources of water.

Cross Plains water supply has been coming from 14 wells, producing from depths slightly less than 50 feet. The new strike is of approximately the same depth.

"Although we may not be sick, we may be far from being well. There is a great and vital difference between high and buoyant health and the health of the average person, or of one who is only well enough to be out of bed," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said today.

"Unless we have the essentials of health in our daily habits of living, we are as sure to pay the penalty of impaired health, sickness and early death as we are of cause and effect in other situations," Dr. Cox continued. "We should ask ourselves, 'How long den I expect to live?' How long can I retain my efficiency, both in work and play?" 'Do I want to become incapacitated soon after middle life? "

The alternative, according to Dr.

life?"

The alternative, according to Dr. Cox's statement, is to adjust one's program of living to insure the fundamentals of health and thus, barring accidents, keep young and retain active efficiency to an age of 70 to 80, or more.

The essentials of health are simple: sufficient fresh air and sunlight, good food and food habits, regular exercise and edequate rest. Yet, in checking the health of thousands of individuals who considered their health good, it has been rare indeed to find a single person who did not habitually disregard one or more of these essentials. Therefore, no matter how good are noted to health. essentials. Therefore, no matter how good or poor our health, we should check our daily program of living for health habits that are essentially faulty but of which we may be unaware.

"Because it attracts such masses of the population the motion picture theatre is the perfect headquarters for public service endeavors, because if you want to dramatize the need for fire prevention. or for periodic examinations to control tuberculosis, or for conserving fats, you do it through the motion picture theatre.

"The motion picture has a definite place in the lives of the people. School teaches them how to get along with their contem-

people. School teaches them how to get along with their contemporaries. In the theatre they see how to get along with older and younger people. The great problem of the individual is to be with people—it sounds funny, but it is a real problem and those who don't solve it become misfits. Going to the movies has taught more than one person to get along with the one person to get along with the rest of the world."



County Agent's Column

Hit The Hoppers Heavy

Young grasshoppers are now swarming in the ditchbanks, along the fence rows, roadsides, railroad right-of-ways and around the edges of fields and pastures. They have not yet invaded the cultivated croplands.

croplands.

The areas in Texas that have been hardest hit so far are in the blackland area from the Red River Valley Southward to Seguin and Karnes City, and along the Brazos River bottoms from Waco to Bell-ville. The same situation holds true for the many other river and creek banks in this area, where the grass-hoppers cover the vegetation in almost a solid mess.

There will be lots of damage from the grasshoppers in three or four weeks unless something is done about it now. During recent years grasshoppers have been controlled with bran-sawdust-sodium fluosilicate bait poisons, but this

olled with bran-sawdust-sodium iosilicate bait poisons, but this ar farmers have as toxaphene chlorinated camphene), chlordane.

and benzene hexachloride (BHO) to use. Sprayed or dusted along the edges of fields, ditchbanks or fence rows, these poisons give a quicker control and continue to kill longer than the standard bait poisons. And one of the main reasions for this is that the poison is up on the grass where the hoppers are and not down on the ground.

As with nearly all poisons, there are a few precautions to take when dusting or spraying these insectiand benzene hexachloride (BHC)

are a few precautions to take when dusting or spraying these insecticides. It is not a good idea to feed dairy cattle forage that has been treated with these sprays or dusts because there is a chance that the poisons might accumulate in the fatty tissues and later be passed on into the milk and butter.

Beef cattle are not harmed to any extent with small doses of these sprays or dusts on forage, but over a period of time, the meat may become unfit for food. For the same reason, it is not recommended to

reason, it is not recommended to reason, it is not recommended to spray the entire pasture, since grazing cattle, in time, might easi-ily be affected. Dusting or spraying around the edge of the pastures now will get a large majority of the small hoppers that will later invade the pastures, and field crops.

Permanent pastures change from cool, fresh, dark green graging in the spring to a dry, stemmy, dormant condition in the summer. It's fine today, but tombrrow or the next day or sometime this summer, it will be a different story. In the late summer the permanent pasture grasses are not as good eating for the livestock as they are now. Then is the time the cattle want something besides the dry, brittle grass. Then is the time for sweet sudan! Sweet sudan is the ideal grass for temporary summer pasture. It is adapted generally throughout the Texas croplands, and can be planted from spring to early summer, depending upon the moisture. Cross fencing for rotation grazing and for cutting any surplus for hay or silage is well worth while.


