Disease

"X" Disease Right now the veterinarians are trying to solve a problem with "X" as the unknown factor. "X" is a 'cattle disease that was first re-ported in New York nearly ten years ago. Later it began cropping up in other states around 1943. At the latest count it is in about 30 states according to Dr. W. C. Banks, extension veterinarian of A&M. "X" deem't seem to affect our

A&M. "X" doesn't seem to affect any-thing except cattle. And according to a recent survey made in the southeast, it was found that nine beef animals were infected in one dairy animal. The most severely affected animals die from the di-sease. This survey also showed that 31 percent of all animals in 26 herds were infected, and 59 percent of the affected animals died. One of the common things among pregnant. "Timals is a-bortions."

Symptoms of the disease include a watery discharge from the eyes and nose, and later on, as the disease develops, the animals ap-petite fails, it loses condition, and becomes depressed. The skin gets thick, wrinkled, hard and leathery and lestone sometimes appear on and lesions sometimes appear on the muzzle or in the mouth. This "X" disease may be con-fused with pink eye, cobalt de-ficiency, dallis grass poisoning or

scables by the stockmen. But for the veterinarian who knows the disease, it's not hard to diagnose. It may hit the herd anytime of year, but is more likely to occur in the late winter and early spring months, says Dr. Banks. Its cause is not known, and for this reason there iant any known treatment for the disease. No drug treatments have been effective for control. Just about the only thing the stockman can do is feed a good balanced ration and keep the herd in clean barns. Sanitation, good feeding and quarantine of new animals in the herd are about the only control measures there are. Den't Grew Grubs

only control measures there are. Don't Grow Grubs Two million Texas cattle are slaughtered every year, and over one third of these are grubby cattle. A more direct loss to the farmer is feed. He has to feed his cattle about 15% more than usual just because of grubs. The fall and early winter is the best time to treat cattle for grubs for this is the time of year the grubs man ture and fall off the animal to the ground, says C. A. King, ex-tension entomologist of A&M. The stockman has three choices

the ground, says C. A. King, ex-tension entomologist of A&M. The stockman has three choices of controling grubs-dust, spray, or dip. If you use the first method, dust the backs of the animals thoroughly with one part 5% ro-tenene and two parts tripoli earth or tale. You can use a jar with holes in the lid for the powder and just rub the dust into the hair with the fingertips. For a spray, mix seven and a half pounds of 6% rotenene in 100 gallons of water. Wet the backs of the animals at least 250 pounds pressure. Both lice and grubs can be controlled in a dip containing one pound of 5% rotenene and 10 pounds of switchle sulphur in 100 gallons water. It'll take two dips 17 to 21 days apart, and dip frist about 10 days after the grubs are first seen in the back. Here's another way to picture grub losses. 
When I was a boy in Memphis, Tenn., I met Capt. Dabney M. Scales, a hero of the Confederate

Not long ago, interesting details of his zervice were encountered in an old book. Captain Scales was attending the

Captain Scales was attending the United States Naval Academy when the Civil War broke out. He re-signed and became the -youngest officer in the navy of the Con-federacy. He served on the famous raider, the Shenandoah, which cruised the seven seas, seeking Union vessels. One day, south of Australia, they over-took a ship which was flying the British flag but they thought this was a ruse. The vessel was halled and proved indeed to be British-and then the Confederates learned an amazing thing. The war was over and had been for eight months! Because a federal court held that

marketed in the southeast of states. Prices remained unchanged on both farmers' stock and shelled peanuts in all areas. Support values prevailed on farmers' stock, while shelled No. 1 Spanish moved

in the southwest. in the southwest. Peanut meal advanced \$2.50 to \$3. a ton for the week. South-western mills quoted meal with 41 per cent protein at \$67 to \$68 a ton in carlots. Peanut oil sold a little higher at 20% to 21 cents a pound for prime crude

for prime crude. Commodity Credit Corporation made some sales of farmers' stock peenuits to Texas and Oklahoma crushers this week.

Texas and Oklahoma favored a higher quality product. Recent tests have run largely around 72 percent sound mature kernels. Warm humid weather east of the Mississippi slowed picking. In the Virginia-Carolina section, long exposure to unfavorable conditions has caused some discoloration of peanut shells. Although farmers had about completed digging in that area, not more than 15 per cent of the peanuts had been pick-ed from the vines. About 85 to 90 per cent of the erop had been marketed in the southeastern states.
