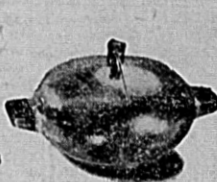

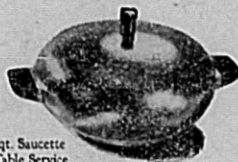

**Man Pleads Guilty To Theft Of Mohair In Callahan County**

Earl Hughes of Brownwood, pleaded guilty before Judge J. R. Black at Baird last Wednesday to theft of mohair and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. Other cases to be brought before the 42nd District Court will be jury cases, Judge Black said. Cases of three soldiers charged with theft of an automobile from Earl Freeman, 20, of Abilene, will top the bill. The defendants are Charles A. Wilkerson, 18, of Illinois; Kendrick Ray Graves, 18, of Tyler; and Donnan C. Hefler, 17, of Heber City, Utah. They are alleged to have beaten Freeman into unconsciousness at the time of the alleged theft, August 24, near Putnam.

**County Agent's Column**

**Land Clearing**

Word has come to the county agent's office that some land clearing work will be started on the Harvey Monk place on highway 80 east of Baird sometime this week. This work will be done with an Allis Chalmers HD-19 tractor. This tractor is the largest type built by this company and stands about eight feet tall. This machine is going to be equipped with a special tree dozer which is supposed to be about the best thing for getting out the tree roots and all. The machine will start to work as soon as it gets here and the owners have invited every one to come out to see how it operates.

**"X" Disease**

Right now the veterinarians are trying to solve a problem with "X" as the unknown factor. "X" is a cattle disease that was first reported in New York nearly ten years ago. Later it began cropping up in other states around 1943. At the latest count it is in about 30 states according to Dr. W. C. Banks, extension veterinarian of A&M.

"X" doesn't seem to affect anything except cattle. And according to a recent survey made in the southeast, it was found that nine beef animals were infected in one dairy animal. The most severely affected animals die from the disease. This survey also showed that 31 percent of all animals in 26 herds were infected, and 59 percent of the affected animals died. One of the common things among pregnant animals is abortions.

Symptoms of the disease include a watery discharge from the eyes and nose, and later on, as the disease develops, the animals appetite fails, it loses condition, and becomes depressed. The skin gets thick, wrinkled, hard and leathery and lesions sometimes appear on the muzzle or in the mouth.

This "X" disease may be confused with pink eye, cobalt deficiency, dallis grass poisoning or

scabies by the stockmen. But for the veterinarian who knows the disease, it's not hard to diagnose.

It may hit the herd anytime of year, but is more likely to occur in the late winter and early spring months, says Dr. Banks. Its cause is not known, and for this reason there isn't any known treatment for the disease. No drug treatments have been effective for control.

Just about the only thing the stockman can do is feed a good balanced ration and keep the herd in clean barns. Sanitation, good feeding and quarantine of new animals in the herd are about the only control measures there are.

**Don't Grow Grubs**

Two million Texas cattle are slaughtered every year, and over one third of these are grubby cattle. A more direct loss to the farmer is feed. He has to feed his cattle about 15% more than usual just because of grubs. The fall and early winter is the best time to treat cattle for grubs for this is the time of year the grubs mature and fall off the animal to the ground, says C. A. King, extension entomologist of A&M.

The stockman has three choices of controlling grubs—dust, spray, or dip. If you use the first method, dust the backs of the animals thoroughly with one part 5% rotenone and two parts tripoli earth or talc. You can use a jar with holes in the lid for the powder and just rub the dust into the hair with the fingertips. For a spray, mix seven and a half pounds of 5% rotenone in 100 gallons of water. Wet the backs of the animals thoroughly with a sprayer that has at least 250 pounds pressure. Both lice and grubs can be controlled in a dip containing one pound of 5% rotenone and 100 pounds of wettable sulphur in 100 gallons water. It'll take two dips 17 to 21 days apart, and dip first about 10 days after the grubs are first seen in the back.

Here's another way to picture grub losses. Enough leather is lost each year to furnish shoes for one million people for a year. The milk flow is reduced around a quarter, but most important of all, is the five million dollars lost by Texas farmers. That's a lot of money to pay for grubby cattle.

**4-H Club News**

A 4-H Club was organized in the Cross Plains grammar school on Wednesday, November 10. About 50 boys came to the organizational meeting and heard the county agent outline the 4-H program and tell of the requirements to be in the club. The boys decided to elect officers for the club. When I was a boy in Memphis, Tenn., I met Capt. Dabney M. Scales, a hero of the Confederate navy.

Not long ago, interesting details of his service were encountered in an old book.

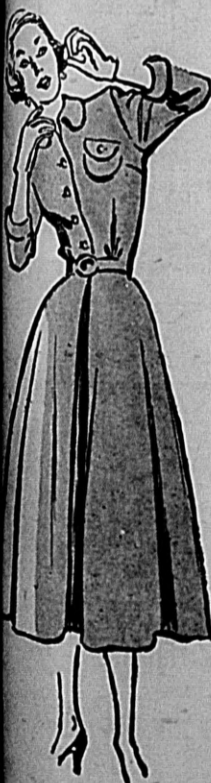

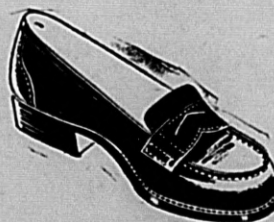

FINE PICKING WEATHER MOVES PEANUTS IN GOOD VOLUME

Farmer's stock peanuts moved to southwest mills in fairly heavy volume during the past week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports through its Production and Marketing Administration.

Mostly good picking weather in Texas and Oklahoma favored a higher quality product. Recent tests have run largely around 72 percent sound mature kernels.

Warm humid weather east of the Mississippi slowed picking. In the Virginia-Carolina section, long exposure to unfavorable conditions has caused some discoloration of peanut shells. Although farmers had about completed digging in that area, not more than 15 percent of the peanuts had been picked from the vines. About 85 to 90 percent of the crop had been marketed in the southeastern states.

Prices remained unchanged on both farmers' stock and shelled peanuts in all areas. Support values prevailed on farmers' stock, while shelled No. 1 Spanish moved slowly at 16 1/4 to 16 1/2 cents a pound in the southwest.

Peanut meal advanced \$2.50 to \$3. a ton for the week. Southwestern mills quoted meal with 41 percent protein at \$67 to \$68 a ton in carlots. Peanut oil sold a little higher at 20 1/2 to 21 cents a pound for prime crude.

Commodity Credit Corporation made some sales of farmers' stock peanuts to Texas and Oklahoma crushers this week.

VETERANS Question Box

Q—I am a World War II veteran and would like to know how to get a concession to operate a stand at one of the VA hospitals?

A—Under Public Law 636, Veterans Administration operates certain NSLI policy a total disability teens with fountain service and a stock of cigarettes, shaving cream, razors and similar items. Therefore, VA no longer lets out concessions.

Q—Can my National Service Life Insurance include coverage for total disability?

A—Yes. For a small additional premium, there may be added to rider which provides monthly payments to the injured while he is totally disabled longer than six consecutive months. Such payments begin with the seventh month of such total disability.

Q—May I assign my National Service Life Insurance to a lender who will lend me money to go into business?

A—No. National Service Life Insurance may not be assigned as payment of an obligation.

Q—I converted my NSLI about a year ago but have since let it lapse. Can my permanent plan insurance be reinstated by the payment of two monthly premiums?

A—No. Only term insurance may be reinstated by the payment of two monthly premiums. In reinstating converted insurance on a permanent plan, all premiums in arrears must be paid with interest.
