

GRAIN PRODUCTION IN THIS AREA WILL **BE AROUND NORMAL**

Wheat Expected To Bring \$1.60 Up With Oats To Range Around 83 Cents

Grain growers in this area are onsidered fortunate this season percent drop in production-due to early drouth. An average of 15 to 18 bushels per acre yield is expected ranging around 35 bushels, which s somewhat above normal yield. Harvesting of oats will begin the atter part of this month and wheat round June 10.

Prices on wheat will start at \$1.60 to \$1.70 per bushel and oats re expected to bring 83 cents. Last year wheat sold at \$1.33 and oats brought a 62 cent high for number one grade. Growers in this section planted an estimated 20 percent more acreage to wheat this year

The early drouth that heavily damaged grain crops over a large part of the state had no noticeable effect on wheat in this section, however, oats suffered considerable ields to grazing.

Grain buyers are of the opinion that before the season is over, wheat and oats may be allowed even a higher ceiling price than at present exists, due to extreme shortage of production in other



Some Suggestions for Prevention of Tractor Accidents

Hundreds of farmers are seriously injured every year by tractor accidents. We offer the following suggestions in a campaign to reduce such accidents:

Be sure the gear shift lever is in neutral before cranking the engine.

Always engage the clutch gently, especially when going up hill or pulling out of a ditch.

When driving on highways, or to and from fields, be sure that both wheels are braked simultaneously when making an emergency stop.

Always ride on seat or stand on platform of tractor. Never ride on drawbar of tractor or drawn imple-

When tractor is hitched to a stump or heavy load, always hitch drawbar and never take up the slack of chain with a jerk.

Be extra careful when working on hillsides. Watch out for holes or ditches into which a wheel may drop and cause tractor to overturn.

When going down steep hills or grades, always keep the tractor in gear.

Always stop power take-off before dismounting from tractor. Never dismount from tractor

Never permit persons other than the driver to ride on tractor when it is in operation.

Never stand between tractor and drawn implement when hitching. Use an iron hook to handle drawbar.

Do not put on or remove belt from belt pulley while the pulley is in mo-

When engine overheats, be care-

ful when filling radiator. Never refuel tractor while engine

is running or extremely hot.

When tractor is attached to a power implement, be sure that all power line shielding is in place.




