Mobile X-Ray Unit To Be Here 2 Days Early In December

A \$25,000 mobile x-ray unit will arrive in Cross Plains December sixth to seventh to make chest x-rays of members of the Cross Plains Association of charge for all persons over 15 years of age as a means of detecting the presence of tuberculosis. The unit is being brought here by the Callahan County TB Association, of which Mrs. W. P. Brightwell is president. After spending two days in Cross Plains the unit will move to Baird for a three day stay, being there on the eighth, ninth and tenth. Any person, whether a resident of Callahan county or not, over 15 years of age is invited to avail himself to this opportunity to have a free chest x-ray. Mrs. Brightwell, TB Association, an organization financed by the annual Christmas seals, feels that early detection of tuberculosis disease can be readily cured. People of this territory are urged to keep in mind the dates the unit will be in Cross Plains—December sixth and seventh—and to pass the word along.

Word has been received in Cross Plains of the death in Japan of Private Haskell J. Brown, Jr., of San Saba. The deceased was a grandson of R. J. Edwards and a nephew of Mrs. Earl Pyle of Cross Plains. The young man's body was found in a drainage ditch on October 29 on the island of Kyushu, Japan, according to a War Department message received by his parents. Circumstances of death were unreported. Private Brown enlisted in the army in July 1948. He was a member of B Battery, 62nd Infantry Battalion, and had been in Japan one year. The youth's parents received their last letter from him several days ago. It had been written October 22.

Local Voters Favor Status Quo Tuesday

The proposed amendment to permit women to serve on Texas juries received 27 votes, to 107 against. Other proposals were voted down by even greater majorities here.

Crippled Buffaloes To Meet Rising Star November 11th

A football rivalry of long standing will be renewed Friday afternoon of this week when the Cross Plains high school Buffaloes tangle with coach Ray Nunnely's highly-touted Wildcats.

Undefeated in conference competition since 1947, and by virtue of their lop-sided victories over every team played this year—including the class A Comanche Indians—the Wildcats are top-heavy favorites. Bill Shield and Paul Huntington of the Cross Plains coaching staff are conceding no quarter though, and declare their young athletes will endeavor to make a scrap of it.

The Rising Star offense headed by Buck Gibson and Don Criswell has not been held in check all season, and with a week's rest is expected to prove unusually potent. The Wildcats idled last week as Cross Plains was severely extended to win over the up-and-coming May Tigers. No less than six of the Buffalo starters came out of the May game with bruises and sprains which will doubtlessly prove a handicap against the Wildcats.

Cross Plains holds a 11 to six advantage over Rising Star since league competition began with a tie in 1929. Generally speaking, each school has enjoyed winning cycles. In 1933 Cross Plains started a four year cycle of victories, which after a one year interruption in 1937 began another cycle of three years duration. Then after idling in 1941 and losing to Rising Star in '42, the Buffaloes began another winning streak which carried through three years. The Wildcats won in 1947 and '48 and appear headed to the third year of a three year victory cycle of their own. Until now Cross Plains has never lost two years in a row. Local fans are already looking forward to next year though, and predict that Cross Plains football fortunes will then again begin to bud and blossom into full splendor.

Local Girls Beat Eastland 2 Times Here Monday Nite

Coach Hubert Kelley's Cross Plains high school basketball girls scored a double victory over Eastland here Monday night. The local "A" string lasses overwhelmed Eastland 32 to eight, and the Cross Plains "B" team upset the Eastland second stringers 18 to eight.

The Cross Plains girls have showed marked improvement during the past week of practice and are expected to again develop into one of the fastest sextets in this section of Texas. Under Kelley's direction Cross Plains has had for a number of years spectacular girls cage teams, and the coming season gives promise of being a repeat performance.

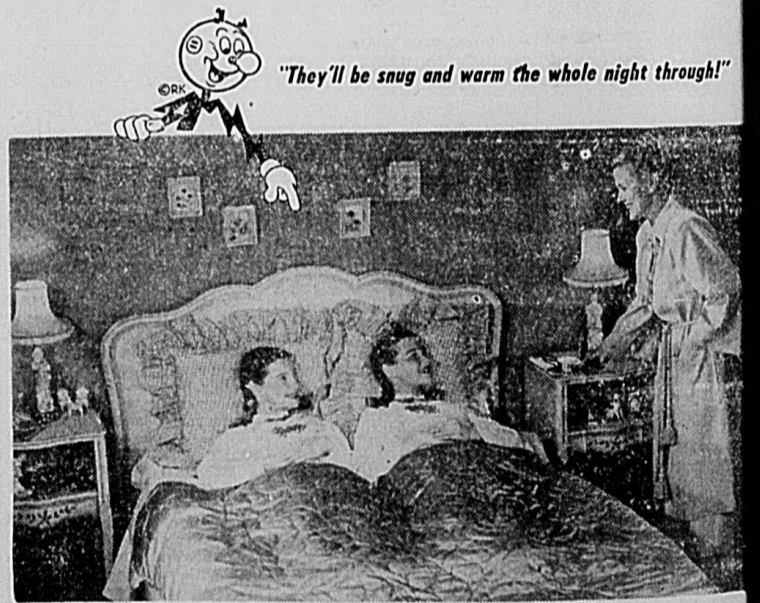

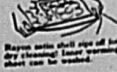

Cross Plains high school Buffaloes defeated the May Tigers six to nothing here Friday night in a district 11-B game. Bobby Dillard raced 10 yards through the line for the touchdown, after a sustained drive had carried to that point. The conversion attempt was fumbled and went for no avail.

Monopolizing the ball most of the game, the Buffaloes held a decided advantage throughout most of the contest, however, as the first half ended the visitors were on the herd's seven yard stripe. Daniel McClure Named Gold Star Boy in Callahan County for 1949

Daniel McClure, 4-H Club boy from Eula, has been named Gold Star Boy for Callahan County for 1949. Daniel or Buck, which is the name most people know him by, has been in club work for four years. During these four years he has carried on demonstrations with beef cattle, swine and poultry. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Austin McClure of the Eula community. Buck's main project during the past year has been with swine. He won a gilt in the Sears program in May of 1948. He did an excellent job of feeding and caring for his gilt and when she farrowed her first litter in March this year, there were ten pigs. Buck had his farrowing shed fixed up so good and did such an excellent job of managing these pigs that he raised and sold all ten of his pigs.

When these pigs were 56 days old they weighed a total of 437 pounds or an average of 43.7 pounds per pig. This was good enough to win him first place in the heavy litter weight contest against competition from four counties, Haskell, Taylor, Jones and Callahan.

At the recent Callahan County Fair Buck had a nice pen of three hogs from this litter that won second place. The judges said he had done such an excellent job of feeding that they were too fat. He sold these three and one more like them for \$280. Daniel kept good records and showed that it cost only \$68 to feed out these four hogs on a self feeder with home grown grains. In addition to making this money, Buck sold litter mates of these hogs at weaning age for the following: two pigs for \$30; two

pigs for \$50. A little later on he sold another gilt out of this same litter for \$20. He then had one more gilt that he sold for \$40 when she weighed near 200 pounds. This made a total of nine pigs that he sold out of this litter and he gave one back to the Sears program for another boy to use. This makes a total of \$420 that he has grossed on this one litter of pigs and he now has another litter from his sow that contains seven gilts. In addition to this he has made \$42.50 in prize money that he has used to buy equipment to further his swine demonstration.

During 1949 Buck has been active in all 4-H Club activities. He was a leader in planning the picnic at Cisco Lake. He was a member of the County 4-H Club Livestock Judging team that judged in the district contest at Stephenville.

In addition to his 4-H activities Buck has done most of the farm work on seventy acres of land this year. He learned a lot about terracing when he carried the rod for the terrace lines that were run on this land. He goes to Eula high school and is a member of the basketball team there.

Other awards which Buck won for his outstanding 4-H Club work in 1949 are the County Meat Animal Contest Medal and the Achievement Award.

At the present time in addition to his swine demonstration, Buck has chickens and capons as demonstrations also.

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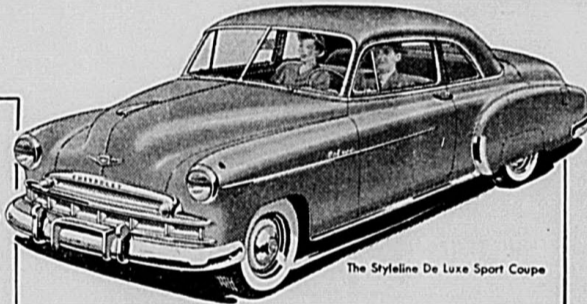

THE CHAPEL YOUTH BUILT—Ten years old Nov. first, the Little Chapel-in-the-Woods at Texas State College for Women has been the scene of 691 weddings, a number of baptisms, and weekly interdenominational worship services. Built primarily as a place of individual prayer and meditation, the Chapel is constructed of native limestone. Art work, including the stained glass windows, was done by more than 500 TSCW students. From its plain Celtic cross to its multi-colored stained glass windows, the Chapel is not only of the twentieth century but of the Texas landscape. It was the first true stone masonry building of any moment to be built in Texas since 1870.

A fee of twenty five cents will be made for each plate. Proceeds are to go to the church.

For the first time in history Cross Plains schools are to have a homecoming. The big event is set for November 24, when the Coleman Bluecats come here with "Soc" Walker's thundering herd.

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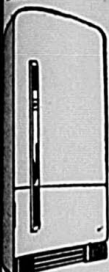

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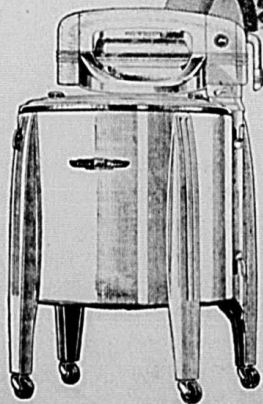
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
