Mrs. Florence Low, extension specialist in home management of Texas A&M College, says that re-search recently made indicate-data suds don't clean. Washing tests showed that some of the sudless solutions removed soil in dish-washing better than other with plenty of foam.

The cleaning ability of any detergent depends largely on two things; first, how well it dissolves soil and second, on how much it aids water in getting the soiled articles wet so that dirt can be carried away quickly and thoroughly.
