

Hammett Repeats As Philpeco Champion DRILLING SUSPENDED WHILE CORE IS BEING ANALYZED BY CHEMIST

J. V. Howell's deep oil test on the E. I. Vestal tract, two and a half miles Northeast of town, had topped the Elenberger lime yesterday morning and was taking a core of the formation. Drilling will be discontinued until the core has been analyzed by petroleum chemists.

The formation, believed to be the Elenberger, was topped at 3,750 feet. Drilling was immediately halted. It was pointed out that there is a possibility that the lime is not the Elenberger at all but possibly a thin strata of the Mississippi, which is frequently encountered just above the Elenberger. The definitely, the Review was told.

Actual test of the lime will probbly not be made before noon Friday. If the formation shows saturation, acid will probably be applied. Reports from the well Thursday morning were that a small amount of gas had been encountered just as the present lime was topped. It was said to be of small quantity,





An expenditure of \$97,649 is authorized. The project, a joint WPA and state highway program, calls for employment of from 150 to 200 men for one year or more. The highway department will furnish equipment. engineer and superintendent for the project, WPA to furnish workmen.

The project was approved in Washington about one month ago but due to the extensive red tape, issuance of the work order was not possible until Tuesday, when the state WPA office in San Antonio wired Treadaway that it had been

Highway commission approval was given the project June 12. State WPA approval followed immediate State and local WPA officials. county commissioners and other state officials expedited the project, Treadaway stated, as did Congressman Clyde L. Garrett.

Actual work on the project is expected to begin not later than Mor day of next week
