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

Olin English Tells Of Trip to Canada

Mr. and Mrs. Olin J. English and family, of Rowden, recently re-turned from a trip through the morthern part of the United States

northern part of the United States and into Canada. Particularly in-terested in agriculture of other lo-calities as compared with that in this section of Texas. English pro-vided the Review with the follow-ing account of his trip, highlight-ing farming practices observed elsewhere. His account follows. Around Terrell we saw the first plantation style farming. Owners have large homes and barns and a short distance away will be seen a little cluster of Negro homes. But from what we observed it seemed that Louisiana is by far too swampy, especially the Western part. The Mississippi delta section of this state is excellent farming country. They have wonderful crops of corn, cotton, and acres and acres of walst-high soybeans. All the highway signs in this state read: "Keep Louisiana Green". Having always wondered where "Keep Louisiana Green". Having always wondered where the bulk of the Negro population in the United States resides, let me say, this is no longer a puzzle. They're in the Mississippi delta country in almost uncountable numbers. In many small towns one sees four or five Negroes to one white. Small winding trails though are noticed on both sides of the highway, and the closer one gets to a town the more trails there

are. The Negroes follow these paths going and coming from the stores. Something about the trails reminded us of those to be seen leading to watering tanks in West Texas.

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

Due to the lack of sufficient labor in many localities, some farmers may prefer to buy pre-fabricated bins or grainaries. This year, most of these prefabricated structures are costing about 30 cents per bushel of storage ca-pacity. Regardless of whether the farm-er builds his storage or buys it,

er builds his storage or buys it there are several things to be con-sidered when planning for grain moisture content is neces

storage. Low moldture content is neces-sary for long, safe storage of grain. This is particularly true of grain sorghum which should not test over 12 per cent. Construct a strong, durable building and eliminate cracks and holes through which moisture and insects may enter provide facilities for furnigation where necessary. Rat proof the grain structure and locate it con-veniently on a firm, dry site. Plan an eavy way for moving the grain in and out. Build the structures to they will last for many years. If you already have a storage bin, it will be necessary to prevent the new crop of grain sorghum from being infested with insects from the old stored grain. If the bins are constructed of wood, ap-ply a residual spray to the walls and floor at the rate of two gal-ons of spray per 1000 square feet of surface area. Spray steel bins around the door frames and other places where the insects may be concealed. oncealed.






