



Because the contents are exican Colleges and Universities readers. Churchill's letter is reproduced hereunder.

"I read in the March 3 issue about the large bird sighted Christi, Mrs. Wanda Hammon on the La Reata Ranch. I would assume that this was a Golden Eagle, which has a wing spread of approximately six and onehalf feet.

> "There are only two kinds of eagles in this area of North America — the Golden Eagle and the Bald Eagle. I checked into the scholastic book "Birds of America" and do not find a Red Eagle mentioned. Sometimes the Golden Eagle is caled the Ring-tailed Eagle, Black Eagle, Moutain Eagle, Grey Eagle and Brown Eagle. The Bald Eagle, our national symbol, has been called the Whiteheaded Eagle, the White - headed Sea Eagle, American Eagle, Black eagle, Grey Eagle and Washington Eagle.

> "I think it would be interesting for Americans to know more about their native birds and mammals. For a guide to birds there is a very in expensive book recently put out by the Golden Press of New York entitled 'Birds of North America'. It is in paperback and would be easy to carry with your binoculars into the field. I am enclosing a Xerox copy of

> the page concerning eagles. "Incidentally, the Golden Eagle does a good job in controlling rodents and rabbits. There is a study being conducted at the present time to ascertain if, and if so, to what extent the Golden Eagle preys on newly born lambs or pronghorns. This study is being conducted by the Audubon Society and the Cattlemen's Association. One of our most wasted forms of tax money goes for so called predator control. Man is the worst predator and needs controlling far more than the native animals.'
