We extend our congratulations to Post Commander Ralph Pancake and members of the Smith-Slaughter Post of Veterans of Foreign Wars for this excellent affair and feel certain that the citizens of the community join us in this. It takes a lot of planning and hard work to stage an event of this type and from where we sat, it looked as though everything was taken care of. If any part of the picnic could have been improved on, it would have been the parade and this was through no fault of the VFW Post. The parade was nice but the business firms of the city (including the Cross Plains Review) let the boys down by not having more and better floats in the procession. This department promises, here and now, to do our part in the parade next year! Our hat is off to you, Veterans of Foreign Wars, for a job well done.

There was some complaint about the midway attractions at the picnic and Dr. Calvin Gambill explained that since this area was suffering from the effects of the drought, the Post felt that it would be better to have only a small show on the grounds so that a large amount of money would not be taken out of the community. This writer agrees with them 100%. Since midway attractions are principally for the kids we feel that it is unnecessary to have a big carnival at any of the picnics, because kids can be satisfied with a small show. With fewer midway attractions on the grounds, the concession stands operated by various civic organizations have a better chance to fare well in a financial way, making it possible to keep a major portion of the money spent at home.

On another page of this edition, city water users will find an advertisement explaining the water situation here. Mayor S. F. Bond and members of the City Council state that while the city has no serious water shortage at this time, one could develop if large amounts of water were wasted. They are not asking citizens to deny themselves sufficient water for necessary uses but ask that wasteful use of water be avoided. They are not even threatening to ration water, but point out that users will be charged for every drop of water metered... so consumers had better avoid excessive use of water.

Now comes the topic of weather... Frank McCarty has been classified as a false prophet and we feel that the citizens of this area would be justified in "stoning" him like false prophets were treated in Bible days. In defending himself this week, Frank pointed out that he only missed the big rain by 30 miles, since Cisco received a fine rain on July 4th. Speaking of the weather, it seems that Nature has become bawled-up something terrible lately and is mixing torrid and frigid temperatures together to make life miserable for people of this area. Such is life in West Texas!

According to Lee, plans call for facing the front of the station with red brick tile and plastering the rest of the building. Work is now in progress and when completed will add much to the appearance of that section of town.



It was an Ellenburger discovery well five miles southeast of Oplin. There was no water. Oil was flowing through a 14-64 inch choke with 535 pounds on the casing and 165 pounds on the tubing from an open hole at 4,184-96 feet.

The well had flowed oil on a drillstem test at 4,182-96 feet.



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Farmers and ranchers in the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District should have some mighty good fishing in about 12 months. These are a part of a large group of farmers who have taken advantage of one of the services offered by their local Soil Conservation District, cooperating with the Fish and Wildlife Service of the Department of the Interior.

These farmers are the first to receive fish that have been requested through the Soil Conservation District. They received bass, catfish, and blue gill to stock their

farm ponds. These fish placed in a tank that is properly fertilized and managed should weigh from one to one and a half pounds in 12 months. Other farmers who have made request for fish will receive their fish at a later date.

Proper management of fish ponds is essential to good production. An acre of water that has been stocked with the proper kinds and number of fish and fertilized properly will yield 900 pounds of fish per year. That means a lot of good fishing and a lot of good eating.

Fish and Wildlife management is

one phase of good soil conservation—"The use of each acre of agricultural land within its capabilities and the treatment of each acre of agricultural land in accordance with its needs for protection and improvement." If you need assistance with any soil and water conservation problem, use the facilities that are available to you through your local Soil Conservation District. You will find Soil Conservation District offices assisted by the Soil Conservation Service at the following locations: Dublin, De Leon, Rising Star, Comanche and Eastland.

Soil Conservation District News

Farmers in the still dry wind erosion belts of western Texas are standing ready to plant record acreages of wind-resisting grain sorghums and cover crops, the Soil Conservation Service has reported.

Many farmers in the area already were planning large plantings of grain sorghums and sudan grass for wind erosion control as well as for income, but dying stands of cotton throughout the area will mean even more extensive acreages of these crops, SCS field men have reported to Regional Director Louis P. Merrill.

Supervisors of soil conservation districts in the area are teaming with PMA committeemen and other local leaders in plans for an all-out drive for wind erosion control. These leaders are urging the planting of wind-resisting sorghums and sudans to replace the cotton if moisture comes within the next few weeks. If no effective rain comes before August 1, they will recommend the planting of small grains such as rye for winter cover on land subject to blowing.

If there should be no effective moisture before December 1, the

only recourse then will be "control" by emergency tillage, an expensive temporary solution and a poor substitute for seasonal and longtime "prevention" measures.

A few farmers will replant crops if moisture arrives in the next few days, the reports to Merrill say.

The young cotton is dying rapidly in many areas which were hit hard by blowing through the winter. The crop is considered hopeless in Martin and Midland counties. A few plantings were still surviving in the northern part of Howard county which received a good rain in May.

In Coke county even brush was reported dying. In the area of Sterling City to the west some grass was still green. Ranchers throughout the drier western Texas areas have already shipped most of their cattle and sheep to other areas.

Supervisors of the Upper Leon and Brown-Mills soil conservation districts are in the forefront of the drive in their district for strip crops to control wind erosion. Several thousand pounds of guar seed have been introduced for local plantings. Guar is a summer growing legume which may fit into conservation cropping systems in western Texas.

Merrill pointed out that the wind erosion in areas covering as much as seven counties in Western Texas in the season just passed approached the worst conditions experienced farther to the north in the 1930's. Another winter of high winds on unprotected crop and range lands will mean damage that will take many years to repair, he warned.

HEALTH NOTES

It is believed that the majority of adults have at one time been infected by the virus of poliomyelitis, usually without manifestations, says Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. In view of the above it is expected that most of the recognized cases will be among children.

Only a small portion of infected persons are clinically recognizable. When symptoms are manifested, they usually comprise an acute illness with fever, headache, and almost always a characteristic stiffness of the neck and spine. Some degree of paralysis may or may not occur during the first few days of illness.

During the poliomyelitis season the following measures are recom-

mended:

1. Insist upon safe waste disposal so that human excreta is not exposed to disease transmitting vectors.
2. Insist on elimination of fly breeding sources and do not depend upon community wide airplane spraying or fogging machines as a substitute for basic sanitation.
3. Food supplies, including milk, must be protected against contamination.
4. Always demand safe water for drinking or swimming pools.
5. Insist that garbage be kept in covered containers and disposed of by incineration or sanitary fill.
6. Eliminate all insanitary conditions on your own premises.
7. Practice good personal hygiene, with particular attention to personal cleanliness.

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

There is no serious water shortage in Cross Plains at the present time . . . but the existing wells and pumping and storage facilities are now operating at full capacity and city employees are working diligently around the clock to keep the storage supply at its peak.

At the present time the law of supply and demand are equal with consumers using all that is produced daily, making it necessary to pump at capacity in order to keep the storage tanks full for use in an emergency. If local consumption increases there will be a shortage and drastic measures will have to be taken. City officials are not contemplating a rationing program at this time, but warn that meters will be read and bills collected regardless of size. Meters are read around the 15th of each month, and if you have been using excessive amounts of water lately, be prepared for a high water bill. While citizens are asked to refrain from wasting water, you are invited to use all you want to pay for.


