Equipment for installation of a castor bean hulling plant to serve the Cross Plains territory was to begin coming in Wednesday. The plant will be located in the A. D. Petty building on South Main Street, formerly used for vetch cleaning. Doyle Burchfield has been designated manager of the concern, and O. D. Strahan has been employed as machine operator. The plant will accomodate growers from other counties, as well as Callahan, it is said by B. B. McPherson, Callahan PMA official.

Burchfield and Strahan were in Brownwood Tuesday where an expert in operation of hulling plants oriented them in procedure of testing and grading castor beans. Prospects for a bumper crop of beans looks somewhat doubtful this year, McPherson said, but if rains come the last of August or first of September crops will be materially benefitted, and some growers can make an average yield.

Calvin Ingram, who operates a farm on the old Cottonwood road, says his acreage of castor beans will average 300 pounds per acre, even with adverse weather conditions now existing. Should rain come he expects to gather a better crop.

It has been proved, Burchfield said, that castor beans in West Texas have paid a higher income per acre than cotton produced averaging one-half bale per acre. Weather conditions improving in this territory, it is believed growing castor beans will prove as profitable as any other crop native to this area, Burchfield said.

A "community night" program will be held at the Cottonwood school building on Thursday evening, August 21. Activities will start at five o'clock in the afternoon with a baseball game between local teams.


