Folks who want to vote for General Eisenhower for President, but would also like to have a voice in the election of their district attorney and county commissioners, have a date with a polling booth July 26.

That's the day of the First Democratic Primary, and in order Mount Sanai where Moses got the to vote in the primary-an election set up and financed by the Democratic Party of Texas-each voter must take this pledge:

"I am a Democrat and pledge myself to support the nominees of this primary."

The pledge says nothing about supporting all of the nominees of the Democratic party, and there will be no presidential nominees listed on the primary ballot. No Moral Barrier

Thus there is no legal or moral barrier, as far as the party pledge is concerned, to prevent a person from voting in the Democratic primaries in July and August and voting for the Republican candidate for president in the November general election.

However, there is a legal issue to be considered by persons planning to vote in the July 26 Democratic primary and attend a Republican precinct convention that same afternoon.

Texas Democrats, whose votes are being wooed by the Republicans this year, have this situation staring them in the face:

A new state law provides a penalty of from \$100 to \$500 for anyone convicted of participating in the primary or convention of more than one party on the same day.

At the same time, Texas Democrats who feel no Democratic presidential candidate likely to be nominated will be satisfactory to them and thus are desirous of switching allegiance to the GOP and attending Republican precinct conventions, face the opposition of disenfranchising themselves on the state and county level if they choose to attend a convention July

SHIVERS AGIN AUTO INSPECTION LAW; "SHALL CHANGE IT OR REPEAL IT" He Says

By Ben Kaplan, Press Staff Writer

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed. The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law. His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or re-

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparant that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)

The education and training provisions allow a veteran one and one-half days of training for each ed—up to a maximum of 36 months.

under previous veterans' training aws. Under earlier laws, VA paid tuition and other costs directly to schools, and also paid eligible veterans a monthly subsistence allow-

Although the new law is in effect now, no training allowances may be paid for any period prior to August 20.

The loan provisions of the new GI loan program now in effect for veterans are similar to the GI loan program now in effect for World War II veterans. Some changes have been made, however to protect the interests of homebuying veterans.

The amount of VA guarantee on loan is the same for both groups of veterans. Home loans may be guaranteed for up to 60 percent of the loan, but the guaranteed portion may not exceed \$7,500. Other real estate loans may be guaranteed up to 50 percent, with a \$4,000 top. And non-real-estate loans, such as GI business loans, may be guaranteed for up to 50 percent with a \$2,000 ceiling as to the guarantee. All such loans also may be insured.

VA's direct loan program, now in effect for World War II veterans, has been extended to veterans who served since Korea. Under the program, VA may make loans directly to veterans, but only in certain areas where four percent GI loan money is not available.

GI loan safeguards, written into the new law, apply both to World War II veterans and those with post-Korean service. Among them are the following:

A veteran's property must meet or exceed minimum requirements for planning, construction and general acceptability. This provision doesn't apply to construction started within 60 days of today, nor to houses which have been completed at least a year before they were purchased with a GI

VA may refuse to appraise any dwelling or housing project owned or built by anyone who has attempted to take unfair advantage of veterans in the past. Examples would be substantial deficiences in the house, failure to discharge contract liabilities, or unfair practices in regard to contracts or marketing of the houses.

Also, VA may refuse to guarantee loans made by lenders who have failed to service loans adequately, who have failed to keep adequate loan accounting records, who have shown poor credit judgment, or who have engaged in other practices detrimental to the veteran or to the Government.

In the case of World War II veterans who have returned to active duty, their unused loan entitlement under the World War II GI Bill will be replaced by the same amount of entitlement under the new law.
