Plans are now complete for the third annual reunion of Callahan county old settlers to be held at Denton, Friday of next week, announce members of the committee in charge. Arrangements are being made to entertain between 4,000 and 6,000 people.

The gathering will be held on the Kendrick place, where it is reported that there are ample shade trees. Seats will provide for old timers by members of the Commissioners Court.

#### Begins At 10:30 A.M.

Program will open at 10 o'clock with the registration of guests by Miss Eliza Gilliland, secretary of the association. A song-fest is scheduled at 10:30 under the leadership of W. W. Everett and Bailey Johnson. Introduction of old timers will begin shortly before luncheon and continue until noon, at which time baskets are to be spread beneath spacious shades. Barbecue will be sold by citizens of the Denton committee, announces Fred Heysler, chairman of the concession committee.

Afternoon program will be resumed with additional presentation of old timers and the election of officers for the ensuing year.

### BEST MID-SUMMER SEASON IN GROUND IN PAST 25 YEARS

With fields and pastures soaked by more than five inches of rain, farmers and ranchmen were smiling broadly yesterday. Many opined that this section now has a better mid-Summer season in the ground than at any time during the past 25 years.

There being no official measuring device, with which to accurately gauge the moisture here, the estimate of five inches was arrived at after interviewing a number of farmers, ranchmen and businessmen and taking the average.

#### Tanks Filled

Stock water supplies, which have long been a source of worry, were replenished by the rains. Most tanks and lakes were filled and ran around after Sunday morning's deluge.

Pastures have already greened, equal to a Spring hue. Lawns and gardens in town were revived and now show no affects of the blistering June and early July heat wave. At Philpico country club fairways are said to be greener than ever before in history of the club, which is 10 years old.

#### Feed Crops Good

Indications are that the Cross Plains trade territory will reap a bumper feed crop. Headed stuff is bending under the weight of bulky tops. Higeria, maize, corn offer unusual promise, declare farmers.

Possibly the only crop to suffer from the soaking rains is cotton. The prolonged cool weather is reported to be conducive to boll weevil activities. It was pointed out yesterday, however, that continued hot weather will greatly curtail damage done by the pests.

### WATSON NAMED JUSTICE; RUN-OFF FOR CONSTABLE

J. C. Watson was elected justice of the peace for precinct six Saturday over Drew J. Hill, incumbent, by a vote of 302 to 193. Watson's name appeared on the ballot, while Hill's votes were all as a result of write-ins.

There being no name printed on the ballot for constable for precinct six, citizens wrote in a number of names, none of which had aspired to the office. Clyde Slaughter and Bert Brown were high with eight votes each.

### O'DANIEL WINNER IN FIRST PRIMARY WITH BIG MAJORITY

W. Lee O'Daniel, Fort Worth flour merchant, made a clean sweep of the gubernatorial race in Saturday's primary election by polling nearly 52 percent of the votes cast over the state, and thereby eliminating the necessity of a run-off. O'Daniel became the first man in the history of Texas to be elected Governor for a first term without a run-off.

Run-off contests were indicated for Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Railroad Commissioner, Land Commissioner, Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals places.

#### Renominated

Renominated on the first primary were Comptroller George H. Sheppard of Sweetwater, Treasurer Charley Lockhart of Snyder, State Supt. L. A. Woods of Waco and Agricultural Commissioner J. E. McDonald of Waxahachie.

Pierce Brooks of Dallas and Coke Stevenson, of Junction, former Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, were headed for the runoff in the Lieutenant Governor's race.

#### Mann and Woodul

Late returns put Gerald Mann of Dallas and Lieutenant Governor Walter Woodul of Houston in the runoff for Attorney General. District Judge Ralph W. Yarborough of Austin was third.

#### Terrell and Sadler

Incumbent C. V. Terrell of DeCatur and G. A. Jerry Sadler of Longview sailed into the runoff for Railroad Commissioner, closely pressed by Highway Commissioner John Wood.

The other run-off races: for land commissioner, Bascom Giles and incumbent William H. McDonald; supreme court, incumbent Ben Crits and W. H. Davidson of Beaumont; judge of the court of criminal appeals, unexpired term, Harry N. Graves and James A. Stephens.

### ONLY RUN-OFF FOR COUNTY WILL BE IN RACE FOR SHERIFF

With run-off contests promised in State Representative, Sheriff, County Commissioner and Constable races, in addition to six state offices, indications here are that political interest will survive through August 27, date of the second Democratic

Omar Burkett and Wayne Sellers, both of Eastland county, will vie in the run-off for State Representative of the 107th floratorial district. Clarence Nordyke and W. A. Peterson are pitted in the run-off for Sheriff. B. H. Freeland and Jeff Clark are county commissioner candidates for the run-off and Bert Brown and Clyde Slaughter seek the Constable place for precinct six.

Burkett led Sellers in the first primary by 224 votes. Burkett tallied 869 votes in Callahan and 2,658 in Eastland as compared with 875 for Sellers in Callahan and 2,338 in Eastland. T. S. Ross, incumbent, and E. M. (Ed) Curry, defeated candidates, polled 1,664 and 1,183 votes respectively.

Nordyke led Peterson in the Sheriff's race by 777 votes. Hugh McDermott and J. M. McMillan polled 513 and 499 votes respectively.

In the County Commissioner's race B. H. Freeland, incumbent, polled 119 more votes than Jeff Clark, who goes into the run-off. George H. Clifton, former Commissioner, garnered 182 votes.

The Constable's race for precinct six was more or less of a lull hazard affair. No candidates had their names on the ballot. In a write-in move, much of which was humorous, nine candidates received support. The two high, however, were Clyde Slaughter and Bert Brown with eight apiece.

"Due to the fact that there will be no run-off in the gubernatorial race, as well as a number of others in which people manifested no little interest, a much lighter vote is expected in the second primary than that cast Saturday, when most every precinct in Callahan county polled close to its capacity strength. In Cross Plains 404 votes were cast, which is the largest number tallied here since the boom days of peak population.

### MISS FANORA NEEB TO FINISH COLLEGE THURSDAY EVENING

Miss Fanora Neeb, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Neeb of Cross Plains, will take her bachelor of arts degree from Howard Payne College in Brownwood in the annual Summer commencement exercises Wednesday night of next week.

In addition to completing her college work in three long terms and one Summer, Miss Neeb has been an honor student throughout her entire college career. She is a member of the Alpha Chi, national honorary society in the field of education. Her first year's work was done in John Tarleton Agricultural College at Stephenville. The remainder was at Howard Payne.

Miss Neeb has been reelected to teach at Denton, in Callahan county, during the approaching term.

### RURAL MAIL BOXES WILL BE IMPROVED

A campaign to improve the condition of rural mail boxes will be sponsored from August first through the sixth by the postal department, announces Willis J. Brown, local postmaster.

Rural route patrons will be asked to paint names on the boxes, see that they are stationed on the correct side of the road and otherwise improved as conditions demand.

It is pointed out that cooperation in carrying out this program should improve rural mail service.

HINTS ON HOME MAKING

Tomato or Love Apple  
The food value of the tomato has not always been recognized. About twenty years ago food and dietary specialists spoke of it as being of little value except as it added color and flavor to a meal.

The tomato both fresh and canned is now known as an excellent source of vitamin C and a good source of vitamin A, B, and G, necessary for growth and development. They are rich in acids—corrective for stomach and intestines. They are tonics, conditioners and natural purifiers. They are effective for the prevention of pellagra. They are valuable for old and young—use them daily. These statements come direct from the food preservation specialist, Grace I. Neely, College Station, Texas.

Selecting Tomatoes for Preservation  
Select fresh, firm, red ripe, sun sweetened tomatoes. Canned tomatoes and tomato juice can be no better than the tomatoes one has to can.

Vine ripened fruit make a better flavored and colored product, but tomatoes ripened off of the vine are about as high in food value as vine ripened. When it is necessary to pick the green tomatoes and let them ripen off the vine before canning, wax over the scar on the end of the green tomatoes with a wax made from melting together water, 2 parts mineral oil, 1 part paraffin, 1 part beeswax; then place in shade to ripen. Tomatoes waxed as above can be kept fresh in good condition for several weeks.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Article XVI, Section 1. Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

"I, \_\_\_\_\_, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of \_\_\_\_\_ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.



**County Agent's Column**

The annual 4-H Club camp for Callahan and Taylor County boys will be held this year, August 8th and 9th in the State Park at Buffalo Gap. A program consisting of softball, swimming and nature study has been planned. Other events on the program include a caponizing demonstration and seed treating demonstrations by Callahan County boys. Rope making and producing clean milk will be demonstrated by Taylor County Club boys.

Club leaders of the ten clubs in Callahan County are expected to attend and invitations are being sent to the 152 club boys of the county to attend this annual camp. A feature of this 1938 encampment will be a barbecue supper Monday night, provided for the boys by service clubs of Abilene and the Callahan County Club of Callahan County.

**Trench Silos:**

There are more than 6,000 trench silos in Texas. There are some 600 trench silos in Fayette county, Texas. In the small country of Germany there are over 200,000 trench silos and the number in every country, state, and county is increasing yearly. Some of the reasons that might be given for the popularity of trench silos is that the feed will not rot. Since the feed stored in a trench silo will keep for ten years, farmers are able to store feed in years like this and keep it until needed in time of drought. There is no damage to feed stored in a trench silo from Weevils, rats, chickens, fire, storm, or floods. One of the main reasons why trench silos are popular is because feed stored in one will go twice as far as feed stored in a stack. A ton of green feed stored in a trench silo still weighs a ton when fed and will last a cow for 80 days. While if the ton of green feed were dried and stacked it would only last one cow 40 days.

Grain sorghums should be cut and stored in a trench silo when the heads are in the stiff dough stage. Corn should be cut when the ears are ripe with the leaves green, if possible. If the feed stored in a trench silo is not mature an inferior quality of silage may result.

Don't make the silo too big. For one cow the silo should be 2 feet deep and 2 feet wide and long enough to hold the required acreage of feed. For two cows a silo 2 feet deep and 4 feet wide might be used. Using this same principal, for ten cows the silo should be about 8 ft wide at the top, five feet wide at the bottom, and four feet deep.

Besides the other men who have been mentioned before that are putting in silos this year for the first time, are to be added, Blain Odum of Rowden, Clyde Johnston of Eula, and R. H. Morriset and Frank L. Martin of Lanham.

Farmers of the county are invited to hear Mr. Cliff Day, president of the Texas Agricultural Association, discuss the accomplishments during the past year of the Texas Agricultural Association, Friday afternoon, July 29th, at 2:30 o'clock in the District Court Room. It is not often that the president of an organization as large as the one he represents can come to counties and talk. Let's all turn out and pick the District Court Room Friday afternoon.

**BROWN COUNTY OIL LEASE IS SOLD TO SAN ANTONIO FIRM**

W. D. Cunningham has sold to the Gilcrease Oil company of San Antonio the 65-acre J. H. Horton lease in the Salt Creek area, north-east of Brownwood, containing the Cunningham No. 1 Horton, a Ranger line producer which was brought in on July 5, together with an 80-acre Pittman & Harris lease, which is a diagonal northeast offset to the Horton. The sale price was not made public.

The acquiring of this acreage by Gilcrease company follows close upon its purchase of ten acres of the J. M. Perry tract containing the Ed Selvidge Nos. 1 and 2 J. M. Perry, producers in the Thrifty area. As in the former deal, the purchasers are beginning immediate further development of their property and are now preparing to move on location for their Pittman & Harris No. 1, 660 feet from south and west lines of that tract and 1,200 feet from the Horton producer.

Gilcrease has also acquired other acreage in the Salt Creek area, and the Gilcrease Oil company No. 1 Newson, a mile and a half west of the Horton No. 1, is now rigging up.

The Gilcrease (Cunningham) Horton No. 1, at the end of its second week has come to an apparent settled production of around 90 barrels a day.
