Editor's note: Like everybody else, the Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou is talking about the election, his letter this week reveals.

I've heard a lot of people say they're tired of the Presidential race and they'll be glad when it's over, it's been too bitter, too much in contact with a high voltage line wranglin, too many lies being told, maybe too much truth, too much dissension among friends, too much time wasted, too many radio programs interferred with, too many good murders crowded off the front L. I'll admit the campaign started a little early and the candidates got to the name callin stage too soon and it's gettin a little dull, after all, after you reach the climax and call your opponent a liar, there's nothing much left to say, and if you call him one too early in the campaign you

have to spend the last three weeks just repeatin yourself. All the shock value is gone out of your charges and a man is almost reduced in the home stretch to runnin on his own merits and in lots of cases there ain't nothin more borin than that, regardless of how much merit you got. But on the whole the campaign has been pretty

good. Believe there have been more new ways invented for callin the other fellow a liar than I've ever remembered, more real ingenuity and evidence of some real thinkin in that field, there've been more predictions of disaster than I can remember, more promises of plenty, more concern for the future of the country and more assurances of how to protect it than I've ever encountered. There are people who say democracy is worn out, but when democracy can stand a dog fight like the one we're about to emerge from and keep right on goin, there ain't nothin seriously wrong with it.

And three or four days after the election, after the enthusiasm of one side and the disappointment of the other has worn off and the bets have been collected, things will settle back down and the campaign will be about as interestin as a last year's football game.

I ain't predictin how it will come out, but it might not be a bad idea for both candidates to be givin some thought not only to a victory statement but to a telegram of congratulations to the other one.
