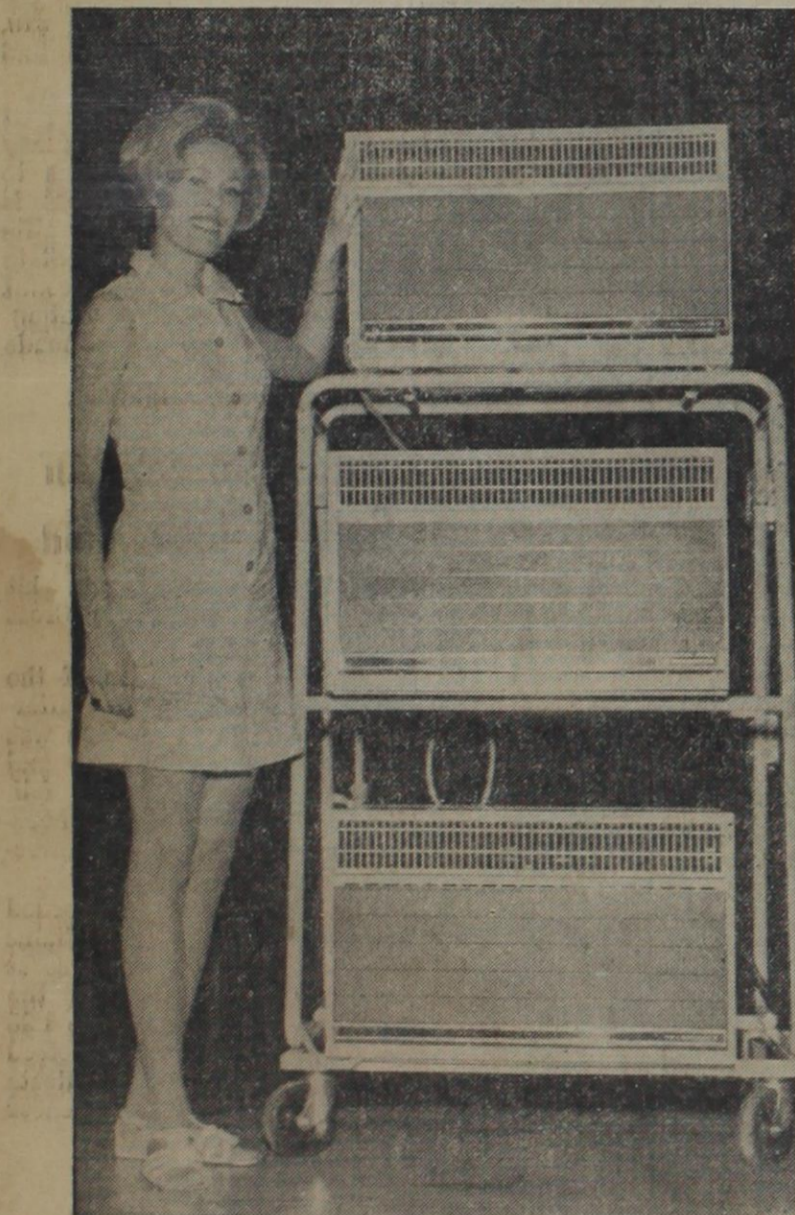
For the eclectic, one must learn to rely on his instinct and judge by the atmosphere of items instead of the periods from which they come. Is the piece airy or somber? Is it simple or

Drillers Win Second, Blank Hamilton 4-0

Cross Plains Drillers, junior teenage baseball team, claimed a second consecutive victory, a 4-0 shutout of host Hamilton Thursday.

Drillers netted one run in the first inning and that margin held up until the top of the seventh when Jimmy Bates clouted a three-run homer. Superb pitching by Calvin Corley through the first six frames and a relief frame by Roger Crawford was backed by sparkling fielding.

First Driller to bat, Jerry Lewis, doubled and Corley doubled him home. Score remained 1-0 until the seventh when left fielder Bates poled the two-out, two-one pitch over the right field fence. Corley and Rickey Kirkham had singled prior to Bates' homer.

Cross Plains collected eight hits and had at least one base runner in each inning in the rapidly played contest.

Corley, the winner, hurled six frames, striking out five and allowing two hits. In his one inning of relief Crawford surrendered a single and fanned two batsmen.

Callahan Dam May Be Ordered Razed

Texas Water Rights Commission issued a show-cause order to Warren H. Elliott of Rochester, directing him to appear before the commission in Austin at 10 a.m. June 21, to show why a dam and reservoir he constructed across Eubank Creek, in the Brazos River Basin in Callahan County, should not be removed.

The Water Rights Commission conducted a study and field investigation after receiving a complaint by West Texas Municipal Water District against Elliott.

After the investigation, the show-cause order stated, the commission determined that Elliott did construct the dam and reservoir without a permit or other authority, and that they are a "public menace and are dangerous to life and property".

On the basis of the hearing, the order says, the commission will decide whether the dam and reservoir should be removed, and whether the commission should take any other action.

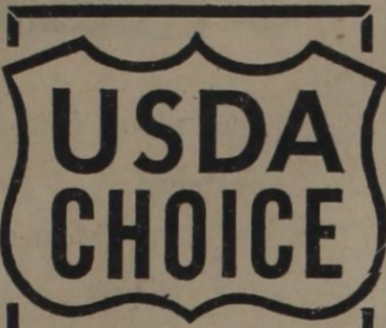

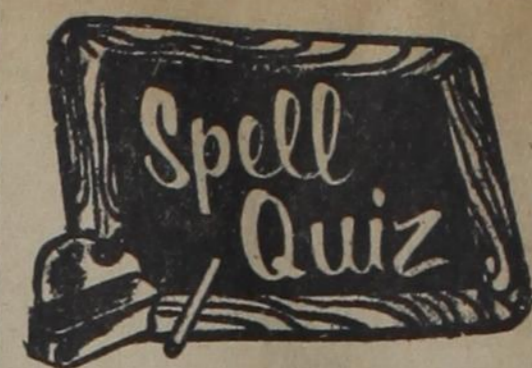
