The plan was to furnish feed at low prices, permit the railroads to grant lowers rates on feed and cattle, and extend credit to ranchmen and farmers.

Simultaneously the Department of Agriculture announced that it would buy 200 million pounds of beef from cattlemen in the dry Southwest. Secretary of Agriculture Benson hoped that this purchasing would remedy the "ruinously low prices" for cattle.
