AUSTIN .- "Now that winter is here, our thoughts turn to pork roast dinners or perhaps to waffles and sausage suppers. From the standpoint of good nutrition, pork is good to eat. It is rich in protein, fat, and vitamin B, but undercooked or raw pork is also the most common source of a disease called trinchinosis',, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said today. Trinchinosis is caused by a tiny parasite which is found in the muscular tissue of infected animals. When such meat is eaten, the parasites multiply and enter the blood stream, causing fever, intense pain in the muscles and a high white blood cell count. Symptoms of trinchinosis are varied. Their candidate was Allan Shivers (cross-filed), who had 468,319 votes on the Republican ticket and 1,375,-547 on the Democratic ticket.




