It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be desig- 308 Citizen's Nat'L Bank Bldg. nated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the P. O. Box 149 for Appointment animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand. There is no limit to the number and / or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as




