Area Motorists Advised Of Change In Meeting Bus Law

Motorists of the Cross Plains area are being advised by Wayne Ford, superintendent of Cross Plains schools, of recent changes in laws governing procedures when approaching a stopped school bus.

It was also noted that each school bus and every authorized emergency vehicle shall in addition to any other equipment and distinctive markings required by Section 124 of the Texas Motor Vehicle Safety Act, be equipped with signal lamps mounted as high and as widely spaced laterally as practicable, which shall be capable of displaying to the front two alternately flashing red lights located at the same level, and also to the rear. These lights must have sufficient intensity to be visible at 500 feet in normal sunlight. Other modifications, to satisfy vehicle inspections beginning in January 1972, are also required.

Requirements of drivers meeting such vehicles are listed hereunder, as reported by Ford.

Section 104 of the act, on overtaking and passing school buses requires that "The driver of a vehicle upon a highway inside or outside of a business or residence district upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose or receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle in reaching such school bus where it is in operation on a school bus a visual signal specified in Section 124 of the act, and said driver shall proceed until such school bus resumes motion or is signaled by the school bus driver to proceed or the visual signals are no longer actuated."

Also "The driver of a vehicle upon a highway with separate roadways need not stop upon meeting or passing a school bus which is on a different roadway

or when upon a controlled-access highway and the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is a part of or adjacent to such highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway."

Special attention is called to two important changes in this law. (1) Stopping for school buses is required of motorists both inside and outside of cities and towns when the "school bus" is stopped to receive or discharge passengers if there is in operation on the school bus flashing red lights to the front and rear as required in Section 124. (Lights must be in operation for enforcement of the law by police officers.) (2) The motorist after stopping must remain stop-

ped until (a) the bus resumes motion, (b) the bus driver signals to proceed, or (c) the visual signs (red lights) are no longer activated. This provision, if obeyed by the motorist, will provide greater safety for students who must cross the roadway.

Ford stated that they are hopeful that the bus driver will be considerate of the other traffic on the roadway by turning off the warning lights as soon as safety of the students will permit and allow halted traffic to pass the bus before re-entering traffic. This should reduce the possibility of impatience on the part of the motorist and encourage his compliance with this provision of law.

Electrical Shock Fatal To Joe G. Austin, 26

Joe Austin, 26, of Merkel, until recently a resident of Cross Plains, was dead on arrival at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene at 4:05 p.m. Sunday after he came in contact with an electrical wire at the Cal. Tex Feed Lot at Trent.

Austin, brother of Mrs. N. L. Dillard of this city, had made

his home here with his wife and small daughter while employed by a local drilling company until about a month ago.

Funeral was held in Higginbotham Chapel here Tuesday at 2 p.m. with Rev. Claude Hughes, minister of Seventh Day Adventist Church in Abilene officiating. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery.

Born Joseph Garland Austin, Jr. on Jan. 20, 1945, in Abilene, he was a veteran of the Vietnam conflict where he served with the Marines in 1966.

A plant official said Austin was working on a control on a feed bin when it shorted out and he fell in some water and was electrocuted.

Mr. Austin had been employed at the feed lot for about 25 days. Survivors include his wife, Dianne Austin of Merkel; one daughter, Kelly Lynn, of the home; two sisters, Mrs. N. L. Dillard of Cross Plains and Miss Sarah Austin of Abilene.

Bisons Claim First Grid Victory Friday

Cross Plains High School Buffaloes displayed a brand of teamwork not seen before this season and grabbed their first gridiron victory 32-20 over visiting Richland Springs Coyotes Friday night.

The Thundering Herd spotted the Coyotes a touchdown on the opening kickoff, but rallied to take a 12-6 lead in the first period. The visitors gained a 12-12 deadlock early in the second period, but late in the first half Bisons grabbed a 20-12 edge and never trailed afterward.

A bruising ground attack which netted 198 yards, combined with an effective passing game, netting 121 yards on 7 completions out of 12 attempts, kept Richland Springs defenders off balance for most of the game. Buffalo defenders, although at times caught napping, were alert and gobbled up five Coyote fumbles.

Light rain began about midway of the second quarter and lasted almost throughout the contest. Buffalo Field was already soggy from moisture

which fell Wednesday and Thursday. Coyotes saw numerous passes slip from grasping hands, and the moisture also aided in seeing 11 fumbles, four by the Herd.

Opening Tally

Richland Springs' Halfback Nelson Smith began the night's action by returning the opening kick 80 yards for a touchdown. He reversed his field to break clear just pass midfield and outrun pursuing Bisons. An attempted placement was wide to the left, but visitors led 6-0 with only 17 seconds gone.

Buffaloes retaliated with a scoring drive which covered 80 yards. Halfback Rodney Renfro climaxed the march with an eight yard romp into paydirt. A two-point conversion attempt failed leaving the score 6-6 with 4:30 left in the first quarter.

The Herd took a 12-6 lead on next possession which was given to the Buffs on a fumble recovery by Jackie Thomas. It took the local squad nine plays to cover the needed 31 yards. Renfro blasted over left tackle

for the final four yards with 17 seconds remaining in the first quarter. An attempted placement did not succeed.

The Coyotes knotted the score with 7:37 left in the second period as Halfback Paul Staton took a handoff from Quarterback Tommy Teal which covered five yards. Another placement went astray on the conversion try. Possession was gained on the Buffalo 17 when Coyote Kenneth Rankin fell on a Buff fumble.

Bisons Gain Lead

Buff Jerry Fortune gave Cross Plains its third scoring opportunity on a fumble recovery at the Coyote 42. Renfro picked up a key first down, on a fourth and five situation, at the visitors' seven, then three running plays netted little then Quarterback Roger Crawford hit Halfback Ricky Kirkham with a four-yard toss for the tally with 15 seconds left in the first half. Crawford then hit End Donny Dillard with an aerial for the two point conversion posting a 20-12 Buff lead.

Buffaloes padded the edge with two more six-pointers in the second half before Richland Springs could manage a touchdown.

With just four seconds left in the third stanza, Fullback George Wellmaker bucked the final two yards of a 69-yard drive. A pass was incomplete on the conversion attempt. Key play of the drive was a Crawford to Kirkham aerial which covered 30 yards to the Coyote three.

Thomas again gave the Herd possession on a fumble recovery at the visitors' 35. In just four plays the Buffs had another six points making the scoreboard read Cross Plains 32, Richland Springs 12. The tally came on a short pass to Dillard. Conversion attempt failed.

Richland Springs got back in to the scoring action four pass completions covering 36 yards. The payoff toes was from Teal to Smith which covered 20 yards. A two-point conversion attempt failed. Earlier Renfro stopped a Coyote drive on the Buff seven when he smothered a Richland Springs fumble.

Robert Howard, Clyde Smith Co-Authored Book Published

"Red Blades of Black Cathay" is the title of a book recently published which was authored by Robert E. Howard, former Cross Plains writer whose works are now being sought by numerous authors and collectors, and Tevis Clyde Smith of Brownwood, well known in this area and also a writer.

The new volume contains three stories on which Howard and Smith collaborated. The title story appeared in the February-March 1931 issue of "Oriental Stories", and is based on a Norman knight's search for the legendary kingdom of Prester John. The other stories

were previously unpublished, according to Smith. One is a satirical tale laid in the state of New York in the mid-twenties, and the other involves the humorous adventures of a gold miner in the Klondike of 1898.

The book was published by Donald M. Grant of West Kingston, R. I., and is illustrated by David Karbonik. It sells for \$4.

Howard lived most of his life in Cross Plains, where he died in 1936. He created numerous characters and is more widely read now than during his lifetime. Smith was born in Brownwood and still resides there. He has published three histories

of Brown County, a volume of poems, and a book of short stories laid in Mexico, a country in which he has travelled extensively. He became acquainted with Howard in 1923.

4 Local Students In C.J.C. Group Going To New York

The Cisco Junior College Band and Wrangler Belles Drill Team has received an invitation to perform in the nation's most prestigious annual parade, the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City, according to an announcement made by CJC today by Eris Ritchie, Public Relations Director and Band Director for the Cisco college.

The invitation was acknowledged and accepted by Dr. Leland Willis, president of the college, and at the same time Dr. Willis announced the launching of a massive fund-raising campaign to help finance the trip for the two groups.

Four Cross Plains High School Buffalo Band students will be

making the trip with the Cisco Junior College aggregations. Two are members of the band, and two are members of the Wrangler Belles.

Local graduates who are members of the band are Miss Sylvia Graham, daughter of Mrs. Georgia Graham, and Vic Curry, son of E. M. Curry and nephew of Mr. and Mrs. T. O. Powell. Miss Graham is a freshman student and Curry is a sophomore.

Members of the Cisco college's all-girl drill team from Cross Plains are Miss Debbie Dillard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy D. Dillard, who is a sophomore, and Miss Robbi Harmon, daughter of Mr. and

Mrs. W. B. (Slim) Harmon, a freshman student.

The Cisco band and drill team will join a very elite group of only approximately 15 bands from the entire nation in the parade. Ritchie said that the CJC group would probably be the only organization featuring a girl's dance and drill team, and that the Belles will do a featured performance at Herald Square adjacent to Macy's that will be seen by millions on national television.

Ritchie, who is also Cisco Chamber of Commerce president, said, "We doubt that Cisco and Cisco Junior College have ever had or ever will have a more exciting opportunity for

national attention and television exposure to millions than the band and Belles' appearing in this parade will afford.

The whole nation will be looking in on the parade on Thanksgiving Day, and one of the featured things everyone will see will be the Cisco Junior College Band and Wrangler Belles. This of course also represents a true opportunity of a lifetime for the boys and girls in our organizations, and it will be an experience of which they will be telling their children and grandchildren through the years as they view the parade on successive Thanksgivings."

Simultaneous to the announcement concerning the parade

invitation, Dr. Willis announced the launching of a large-scale fund-raising campaign to help the college defray the cost of sending the groups to New York. The school plans to charter a 707 jetliner to transport the group and their sponsors from Dallas to New York, and to house the students in the McAlpine Hotel, across the street from Macy's. They will be in New York City two nights and parts of three days.

It was pointed out that several thousand will be needed to finance the trip, and donations are being sought. Individuals of the two organizations will be asked to assume a portion of their expenses.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Facts Concerning Re-Recording Of Brands In Texas

All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be re-recorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971, according to a new law passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature. Producers will be given a six-month period (August 30, 1971, through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be re-recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such marks and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law.
