Mr. and Mrs. V. L. Hobby were Abilene visitors Sunday afternoon.

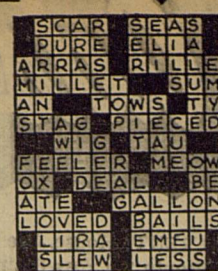
Mrs. Ruth Shirley of Crane visited friends and relatives in Cross Plains over the week end.

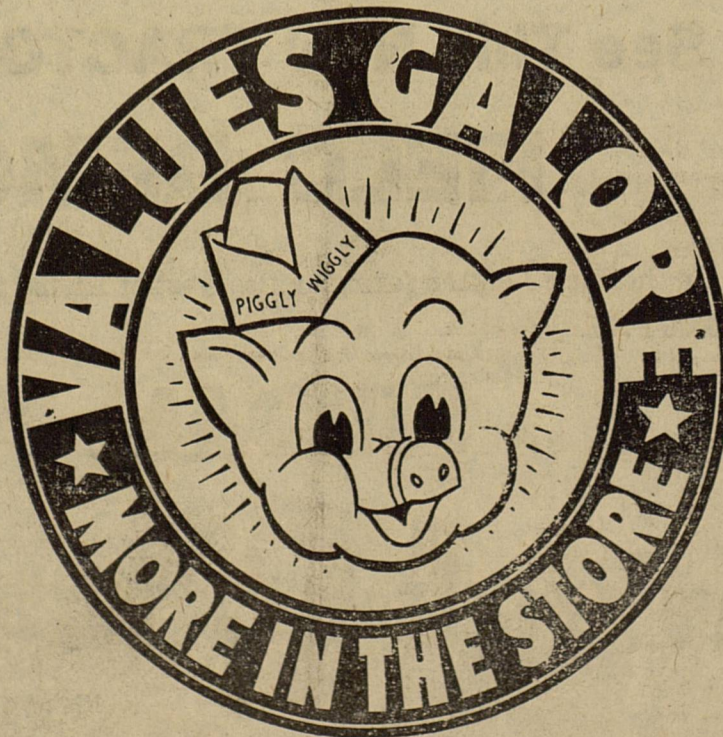
