COTTONWOOD WILL HOST HER FORMER CITIZENS MAY 4TH.

All Churches Cooperating In Day Long Services; Dinner On The Ground

High spot of the day will be a basket dinner at noon spread beneath the trees at the Methodist church yard. Services will be held at the regular hours Sunday morning, and then in the afternoon singing will be directed by Rev. Myrick, of Cottonwood. Also scheduled in the afternoon is memorial service with former and present citizens having parts in the program. The memorial service will include a discussion and historical accounts of the cemeteries of Callahan county.

FREEZE CUTS FRUIT YIELDS 25 PERCENT

Fruit crops throughout the Cross Plains area suffered a 25 percent damage as a result of last week's freeze, according to O. B. Edmondson, local vocational agriculture instructor, who made a tour of inspection of orchards in this vicinity Monday accompanied by high school agriculture students.

Edmondson reported that plums appeared to have been hurt more than any other particular variety of fruit. He estimated that there are more than 1,500 acres planted to orchards in the Cross Plains trade territory.

Oil Test On Murphy Tract To Be Deepest Ever Sunk In Area

Oil test now going down on the Murphy tract, seven miles Northwest of Cross Plains, being drilled by the Standard Oil Company of Kansas and the Woodley Petroleum Company was reported below 1,500 feet yesterday and indications were that the test would be the deepest ever sunk in this county when it is completed. Plans call for exploration of the Hickory sand, which lies just below the Ellenburger lime. Geologists expect to top the Hickory in the neighborhood of 5,000 feet.

CITY STRIVING TO HIKE WATER SUPPLY ONLY 3 WEEKS MORE FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS

Efforts to locate deeper well water for the city of Cross Plains again proved futile this week as a 380 foot test drilled on the B. B. Huntington tract in the East part of town tapped a vein of salt water. Plans are to plug back to a depth of about 40 feet where a shallow water will be produced to supplement the present sources.

Water is now being brought to Cross Plains from 14 wells. Equipment at two of these wells was being re-worked this week in the belief that production would be increased. In addition to this means of boosting the water supply, additional shallow wells are to be drilled on the Huntington line, from where a new main is to be laid to the city settling plant.

MRS. H. V. FALKNER RECEIVES INJURIES IN SUNDAY MISHAP

Trustees have labored long and diligently with more than 500 teachers, according to old records now yellowing with age.

As far as could be learned by a Review reporter in browsing through old minutes of board meetings, only two women have ever served as trustees of Cross Plains Independent District. They are Mrs. W. R. Wagner and Mrs. S. P. Collins, who were elected in April 1926. Both ladies were members of the board which authorized construction of the present school buildings on North

OFFICIAL GAUGING SHOWS BAUM WELL MAKES 86 BARRELS

Fire of undetermined origin broke out at the Fagelson-Ingleson discovery well, five miles West of Cross Plains, Sunday morning did a damage estimated between one and two thousand dollars. The blaze was brought under control after having seriously threatened all equipment and oil storage tanks.

Damage will keep the well off the pump for several days, however, no difficulty is anticipated in placing it back into production within a week or 10 days.

The well was given an official Railroad Commission test last week and found to be producing 86.18 barrels of 45 gravity crude. It is located 2,000 feet from the South line and 3,150 from the East of the G. M. Vigil survey 798.

A flurry of leasing and royalty buying set-off by this well about four months ago has virtually subsided, however, it is believed locally that interest will again quicken as development is resumed.

Somewhat of an oddity regarding the well was the fact that 679 feet to the west, the J. E. Fogelson and Mel Ingleson, No. 1 Hilda Wallace, first offset to the discovery, is being completed as a gasser estimated at 12 million cubic feet daily, and that it found no oil in commercial quantities in the Ellenburger.

SENIOR CLASS NETS \$165. AT AUCTION OF BOXES TUESDAY

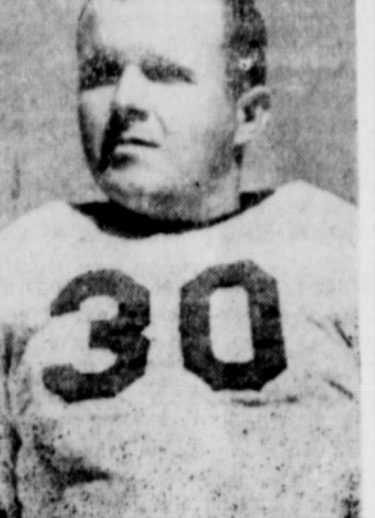

HOWSER OIL TEST MAKING PRODUCER IN RANGER SERIES

Unfavorable Prospects Last Week Change Rapidly On Monday As Showing Found

Outlook for the E. J. Ruwaldt number one L. L. Howser, two miles Northeast of town, which last week appeared gloomy brightened considerably as oil showings were recovered Monday from the Ranger lime series.

A 300 gallon acid treatment was given the well Tuesday afternoon as a clean-out shot, however, a packer placed in the hole failed to shut-off lower water and the desired result was not immediately obtained. Operator was planning yesterday to reset the packer and give the test a larger shot of acid with possibilities for a commercial producer virtually assured.

Production is coming from a depth of 3,390 feet through gun perforations in five inch pipe.

Former Review Editor Writes Of The Late Rev. R. D. Carter, Early Day Pastor In This Area

Editor's Note—The following account of the death of Rev. R. D. Carter, pioneer Baptist minister, written by a son-in-law who was the second editor and owner of the Cross Plains Review. The account reached this newspaper too late for publication in last week's issue.

General services for Rev. R. D. Carter, who influenced the church life of Callahan County in pioneer days, were held from First Baptist church of Anson week, with several early-day workers taking part in the program.

Rev. Geo. W. Parks, 81, of Roscoe, Texas, called to Eastland and Callahan county fields the first of the century made the funeral address; Ben Riebbourg, 72, of Brownwood, discussed the type of minister the deceased portrayed, and acknowledged that Mr. Carter exercised a profound influence on him in his early days as a minister.

John F. Hardsy of Abilene, former pastor of the family at Anson, read the prayer; Spurgeon Reeves of Trinity, son of the Rev. J. D. Reeves, pioneer minister of Jones County, sang a hymn, "The Ninety and Nine"; a hymn by Mr. Carter.

He was pastor at Admiral from 1891 to 1897; at Cottonwood from 1897 to 1908; at Antioch from 1905 to 1907; Eagle Cove from 1891 to 1894; Cross Plains, 1892 to 1893; Pioneer, Eastland county, from 1905 to 1906; Burkett, Coleman county, 1905 to 1907.

Beginning in 1896 he served as missionary of the Callahan County Association and from 1903 to 1905 and a half years in the same capacity with the El Paso Association, where he is known to have organized one or more churches.

His health and the loss of his voice forced his retirement. He was proffered work with the Baird and Cisco churches but he elected to remain in the country which he deemed the best place to rear his large family.

The late R. H. Williams of Abilene, well known as a skeptic in the Cross Plains area, was converted and baptised by Mr. Carter. Rev. Mr. Williams, about the age of Mr. Carter, served many years in the ministry and was pastor of the Golan Baptist church in West Jones county for about fifteen years.

Mr. Carter is recognized as the leader of the forces that made a number of campaigns before putting prohibition in force in Callahan county.

Wiley Tisdale, reared at Cottonwood, former county attorney of Callahan county, and now practicing attorney of the Rio Grande Valley, told friends at the Baird reunion last summer that he regarded Mr. Carter as the most logical and strongest preacher he had ever heard.



County Agent Column

Tommie Milliron Makes Record Feeding Pig

This is Tommie Milliron's first year in the Beta Club and when the club met and organized in September, he wanted to get a pig to feed for his demonstration. On November 8, he and his daddy bought an 8 week old pig from R. G. Farmer for \$7.50. The pig was well on feed when Tommie got him and put it out. For 109 days of 3 1/2 months, Tommie fed a ration of ground speltz, wheat, maize, and hog supplement twice daily. He also fed him skim milk that wasn't used in the house. His pig made an average gain of 1 1/2 pounds daily. He won third place at the Fat Stock Show in Abilene and sold his pig for \$55 per pound at the auction. His net profit was \$48.15 and it cost him 20¢ per pound of gain on his pig. By selling him at the market price, he would have netted \$25 on his hog, and that ain't hay! If Tommie could have fed ten pigs on feed, he would have made a nice profit. Tommie ought to watch and try. Watch ye therefore, and pray always, that ye may be accounted worthy to escape all these things that shall come to pass, and to stand before the Son of man." Luke 21:36.

For grapes, 8 lbs. of bordeaux powder, in 100 gallons of water will control black rot after the blooms have begun to shed and follow up at 2 or 3 week intervals all through the growing season. During May and June 2 lbs. of 50% DPT mix ture into the bordeaux spray will reduce the leaf hoppers and grape leaf folders which are a threat to grapes during these months.

To control curculio and brown rot on peaches and plums a spray schedule must be followed. When blossoms have shed mix 4 lbs. hydrated lime and 1 lb. of arsenate of lead to 50 gallons of water. Repeat the above 10 days after bloom have shed; two weeks later repeat spraying again; two weeks later spray with 3 lbs. wettable sulphur to 50 gallons of water to protect fruit against brown rot, and repeat in 30 days and then again before harvest. You will control most of your peach trouble and produce quality fruit.

Nets \$24 On Pig

A Bayou Club member did a good job of carrying his pig. Carl Mauldin, President of the Bayou 4-H Club purchased an eight week old pig from R. G. Farmer, Enla 4-H member for \$7.50 last November 8.

Carl fed the pig for 109 days for an average gain of 1.3 pounds per day. The ration fed was 90% milo, 5% hog supplement, and 2% mineral twice daily, all the pig could eat. It cost him 18¢ to put a pound of gain on the animal. He exhibited his pig in Abilene and sold him on the market for 29¢ a pound February 29 and realized a profit of \$24.09. Too bad he didn't have a litter of pigs to care for, for a net profit of \$24 per animal is good feeding.
