Many articles have been written about outboard boat bottoms, but nearly all deal with how these make writers overlook the problem of the angler, for during the time he has a line in the water he is trolling, or working slowly with oars, or he may be at a standstill. How does the bottom affect the small boat's actions

Inasmuch as boats rock or tip from side to side, the curves or angles that the bottom takes from the keel on out are those that count, when steadiness is being considered. Bottom-type, and width and length are the main things where stability is concerned, but not the whole story. Height of sides and of seats also enter in and so does the flare of the sides. For example, flare can finally check a tip so severe that the chine is no longer acting as a break; a rounded side, on the other hand, will let a boat in a bad tip roll right

Deepth, or weight, or both, to a keel can make a boat steadier. As you see, there are many angles to this tippiness business. And we must remember that some fishermen can always balance their boat while in it-they do so instictively. And

Willard Crandall, boats and motors editor for Sports Afield magazine, thinks that at slow speeds the roundbottom handles better than other types. This does not mean that with a light load a wide roundbottom run-about will out perform a V-bottom rowboat. It means that, generally, round-bottom boats are smoother, steering, make more even turns, respond in all ways more

Flat-bottoms have the advantage of a level floor to walk on, and where you can put gas cans, minnow buckets or anything else. If you drop a plug in a round-bottom, it is likely to roll out of sight under a floorboard, but in a flatbottom

it'll stay put so you can pick it up. Flat-bottoms not only won't tip far in shallows, but they also get stuck there less easily. But it is hard to get one unstuck, for they become fast for the width of the boat-not just at the keel-and they can't be rocked loose as readily as a craft with a round bottom. The V-bottom? Crandall puts it somewhere between the two, a little closer to the flat than to the round.

A feeling of relief flooded Dick as he remembered he had spent most of his money on the necklace Then the thought hit him - the necklace itself was in his pocket!


"Listen fellow," he pleaded, over his shoulder, with the gunman, "I have a Christmas present for my wife in my pocket. Take my money, but leave me that."

#### when what to my wondering eyes Health Officer Predicts More Skin-Chapping Weather Coming Up

Austin-State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox looked at the calendar today and saw chapping weather ahead.

"Two weather changes\_dew point and barometric pressure\_cause skin to chap and crack," the seasonconscious Dr. Cox pointed out. 'Chapping is always more frequent and severe from December through

That is the time of the year when weather forecasts are likely to read: 'low barometric pressure, moist air followed by sudden high pressure and dryness with low dew point." It adds up to real chapping conditions.

Dew point is the temperature a which moisture begins to condense into visible form. It makes a useful index of actual humidity. When it is low, chapping can be severe.

Wind hastens chapping, too, Dr Cox commented, especially when skin is wet. Quick evaporation is the big factor here. Dryness might actually be increased by hot water, soap, or the so-called protective oils, lotions, and creams. A day's injury cometimes takes weeks to heal.

A chapped condition can run the gamut from plain dryness and itching to splits and fissures which bleed and crust.


An artificial humidifier in the house would be a big help, the health officer said, but you could probably get the quickest relief by checking with your doctor.

And if you happen to have psychrometer, an instrument which determines humidity, you'll be able to forsee chapping weather ahead and take precautions. Don't think in terms of "relative humidity," though. That indicates the percentage of atmospheric saturation at a given temperature, and is unreliable because warm air can hold more water vapor than cold air. For example, relative humidity of 80 percent indicates far less moisture at 40 degrees than it does when the thermometer stands at 60 degrees.




