Bisons Win Second Grid Bout Saturday

Cross Plains Buffaloes ruined the Rising Star homecoming Saturday night by grabbing a 23-16 win over the host Wildcats. It was the second win of the season for the Thundering Herd which evened the season record at 2-2.

The Bisons blew an eight-point lead then battled back from a two-point deficit to post the triumph, the first in three years over the Wildcats who dampened Cross Plains homecoming a year ago.

Cross Plains unleashed a slashing and pounding ground attack, the best thus far of the season. The passing game was limited, but accurate enough to keep Wildcat defenses honest.

Not a single Buff aerial was intercepted, a malady which has plagued the Bisons in prior contests.

Buffaloes Score

Cross Plains received the opening kickoff and moved for a touchdown. It took nine plays for the Herd to hit paydirt with Fullback George Wellmaker crashing across from one yard out with eight and a half minutes left in the initial quarter. Quarterback Roger Crawford hit Ricky Kirkham for the two-point conversion.

Five minutes later Rising Star had tied the game. The Wildcats scored on a four-yard pass from Quarterback Tommy Linney to Back Gary Wilson.

Kim Joyce plowed through for the deadlocking two-point conversion.

75-Yard Gallop

A penalty pushed Buffs back to the 15 after receiving the Wildcat kick, but two plays netted a first down at the Herd's 25. Halfback Rodney Renfro then circled end behind good blocking and outran pursuing Wildcats remainder of the 75 yards. The conversion attempt failed, but Cross Plains owned a 14-8 advantage with 2:10 left in first quarter.

Rising Star retaliated marching 60 yards to the Cross Plains two before being halted by toughening Buff defense. The remainder of the second quarter was taken up with mild threats by both teams.

Rising Star Leads

Hosts came back from intermission refreshed and tallied on opening possession. Wildcats marched 68 yards in 17 plays, with key being a 20-yard pass to End James Underwood. Linney crossed the double stripe from two yards out on fourth down, and he put the Wildcats ahead 16-14 on the two-point conversion with four minutes left in the third period.

Cross Plains quickly countered after playing defense for eight minutes. Halfback Jerry Fortune returned the ensuing kick 25 yards to the Buff 45. Renfro and Fortune each got three and a Crawford pass found Kirkham 11 yards downfield. Renfro got 15 yards in three carries and Wellmaker netted 13 in two carries. Renfro then covered the final 10 yards with one second left in the third canto. Conversion attempt failed.

Rising Star got a quick first down, but Buffs held for downs Wildcat Johnny Cook covered a Bison fumble at the Rising Star 12 after Fortune had moved the ball to that point in two tries.

Rising Star was forced to punt, first of the game, and Cross Plains began its final scoring push.

Final Tally

Renfro and Fortune combined to cover the 48 yards in nine runs. Crawford got the score on a short-yardage keeper with 1:15 left in the game. Crawford then passed to Kirkham for the two-point conversion.

Rising Star mounted a passing attack, but Buffs held for downs on the Cross Plains 38 and Crawford kept the ball to run the final four seconds off the clock.

Herd Tests Potent Baird In Contest Here Friday

The annual Cross Plains Buffalo-Baird Bear gridiron clash will unfold for the fortieth time in Buffalo Stadium Friday night at 8 o'clock.

Last year the Herd saw a four-year win string broken when the potent Bears slugged the Bisons 55-16. No team has won more than four years in a row. The game in 1969 was washed out by a rainstorm.

Baird again poses as the strongest team the Thundering Herd has faced this season. The Bears have romped through four opponents undefeated this year while the Buffaloes have broken even in four outings.

Both Callahan County elevens have faced Santa Anna Mountaineers and the Rising Star Wildcats. Baird defeated both, bopping Santa Anna 20-6 and boxing Rising Star 44-0. Cross Plains bowed to the Mountaineers 6-0, but finally conquered the Wildcats 28-16 last week end.

The clash Friday will be a non-conference affair. Baird is a member of District 7-A and Cross Plains is a 10-A league member.

Head Coach Bo Wilson lost only four starters off last year's 7-3 squad, and has experience and good size and or speed at almost every position.

Heading the bear attack is Cecil Faircloth, a rapid all-district and all-area pick. The 180-pound senior scored 14 touchdowns last year. Senior Gary Noble, 150-pound senior, returns as quarterback, and at runningback 145-pound senior David Strickland returns.

Leading a solid forward wall are Butch Barron, 220 junior, Bryan Hughes, 160 junior, Billy Denman, 170 senior.

Story Re-Told Of Spectacular Early-Day Promotion By Katy Railroad

Editor's Note: The following story, taken from an article by Sam Acheson in the Dallas Morning News of Sept. 6, 1971, describes possibly the most spectacular promotion in the history of railroads. The Katy line served Cross Plains many years with a spur line from De Leon. It was discontinued just prior to World War II. The following article was submitted by S. F. Bond of this city.

William G. Crum, passenger traffic manager for the Katy Lines, which he joined in the early part of the 1890's and served until his retirement in 1940, gained nationwide renown among railroad men for what has been termed his "keen exploration sense."

The most startling and successful of his publicity promotions was the spectacular exhibition train wreck which the Katy Railroad staged on the afternoon of Wednesday, Sept. 16, 1896, at a point on its line 14 miles north of Waco in McLennan County and 3 miles south of the town of West.

The Site of the collision bore the temporary station name of Crush. The Dallas News, devoting five columns on its front page the next morning to the staged event, reported that 30,000 persons witnessed "the Crash at Crush."

"No such crowd has ever been seen in Texas," the newspaper added, "with one exception, which was the Tennessee Day at the State Fair of Texas at Dallas several years ago."

The two engines, both aging Baldwin locomotives drawing six empty passenger cars behind, were started toward each other more than a mile apart. After reaching a speed of 15 miles an hour, the only persons on the two trains, the engineers, pulled the throttles wide open, then jumped from the cabs before much additional speed had been gained. The engines, meanwhile, were running over and exploding 1,000 torpedoes that had been placed on the tracks.

By the time the two engines neared the collision point they were racing at mile-a-minute speeds. As they crashed, the two locomotives telescoped, "and in spite of all precautions" promptly exploded, hurling a shower of iron and steel several hundred yards around, "injuring

five persons, two seriously, and two perhaps fatally."

Thirty special trains brought the spectators to the jousting field from distant parts of the state. Eight tank cars of drinking water with pipe line, spigots and drinking cups helped allay the thirst of the crowds. The railroad dining served sandwiches and other snack foods to the hungry thousands.

W. G. Crush, astride "a prancing charger," served as Grand Marshall of the event, assisted by 200 special constables.

It is significant, however, that the railroad company never repeated the exhibition train wreck. It was, admittedly, an arresting event, but was branded as "a liability insurance agent's nightmare."

Crush began his railroad

career in 1890 in the auditor's office of the Chicago, Indianapolis and Louisville at Louisville. In 1893 he joined the Katy as general passenger agent far Texas at Denison, being transferred to Dallas two years later. He was named general passenger agent for the entire system in 1914, and passenger traffic manager in 1919. He retired in 1940 after 46 years with the Katy Railroad.

In 1925 the Katy inaugurated at Crush's suggestion the suburban, ground-level passenger station in Highland Park. The basic idea was to provide a boarding and debarking point for Katy trains in Dallas which would not require passengers to climb or descend and stairs such as were required when the Union Station opened in

downtown Dallas in 1917.

The Highland Park station also appealed to travelers living in the Park Cities and the northern and northeastern sections of Dallas. At the time Crush joined the railroad in the 1890s, the railroad's one fast train was its historic Katy Flyer, dating from Chicago World Fair, 1893.

By 1925 the Katy had inaugurated two other fast trains from Texas to Kansas City and St. Louis, the Texas Special and the Bluebonnet.

Before air travel supplanted most interregional transportation in the United States, the deluxe, limited-scheduled trains such as the Texas Special and the Bluebonnet were immensely popular.

Several generations of Dallas and Texas travelers look back

fondly on the high-speed train service of those days.

In planning and staging the historic collision at Crush in 1896, the ingenious passenger traffic official had the assistance and cooperation of the other operating officers of the line. They included General Superintendent J. W. Maxwell, Division Superintendent T. S. McDowell, Chief Engineer J. W. Petheram, Master Mechanic McElvaney, Superintendent of Bridges and Buildings Doyle and Eating House Service Manager Miller, all of whom were stationed at Denison or Dallas.

According to plans worked out well in advance, the debris left by the collision was promptly cleared away, with only a minimum delay in the regularly scheduled use of the rail line.

HOME AND FAMILY HINTS

FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

Mirrors have been used in decorating for well over two thousand years. The mirror of the ancient Egyptians, Greeks, Etruscans, and Romans was a thin disk of metal, usually bronze, slightly convex and polished on one side for viewing. Many of these metal mirrors - - their Latin name is *speculum* - - still exist and can be seen in museums.

Backing a piece of glass with a metallic film, our method of making mirrors today, was also known to the Romans, but such mirrors were rare. It was not until the fourteenth century that technology advanced enough to produce glass mirrors in any significant quantity, and then they were only available to the very rich.

In the fourteenth century, in Nuremberg, Germany, a guild of glass mirror makers was formed, and their speciality, in blown glass, was the convex little mirror sometimes called a bull's-eye. These are still in use in traditional rooms, especially of the Federal period, and are charming playful reflectors that distort the mage with their extreme curvature.

It was in the fifteenth century in Venice that the making of flat glass mirrors began on a commercial scale, and the Venetians keep a monopoly on the craft for a good hundred and fifty years. They guarded the secret of manufacturing under pain of death for the betrayer and imprisonment for his family, but nevertheless the secret spread to France. In France the craft became even more refined than that of the Venetians.

The method of manufacturing was complicated. Hollow cylinders of glass were blown first. These were split, flattened, polished, and the backs coated with a silvery amalgam. The

glass that survived these stages was remarkably pure and flawless, although limited in dimension to that which blowing could produce.

A good measure of the value place in the Venetian mirror is an extant inventory of a seventeenth-century nobleman's estate in which a 26 by 46-inch mirror brought a greater price than a Raphael painting.

Plate glass was invented in 1691 in France, thereby opening the possibilities for variety of size and far greater availability.

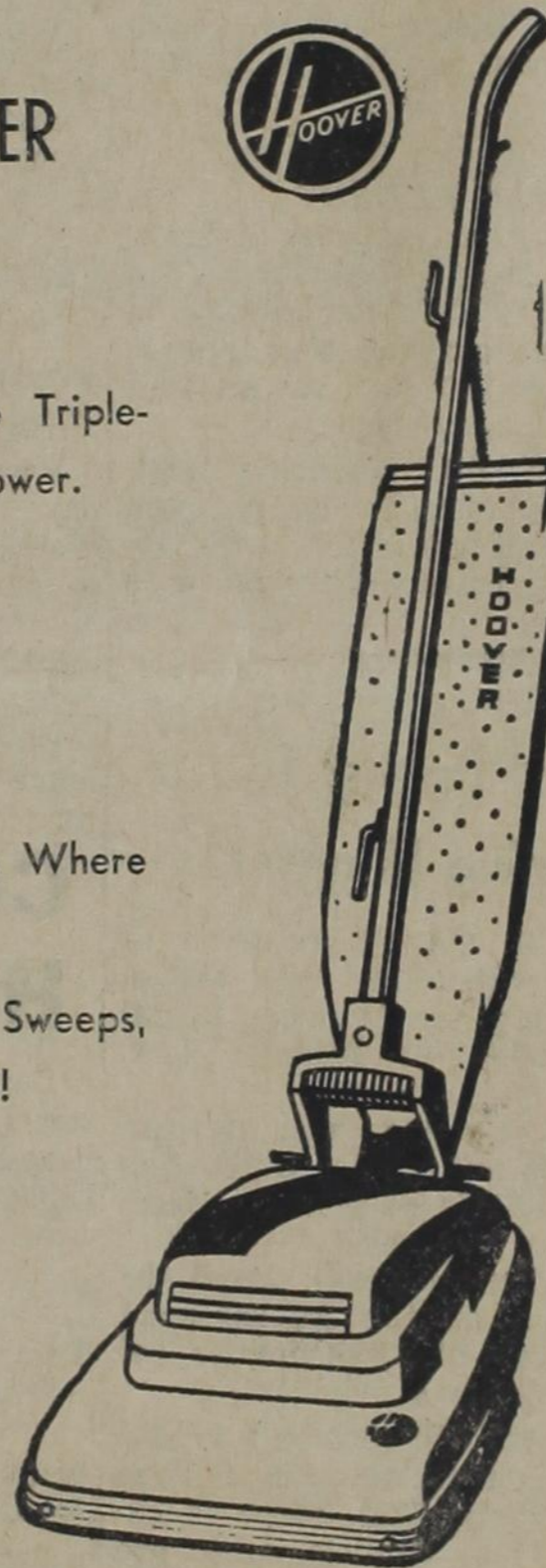

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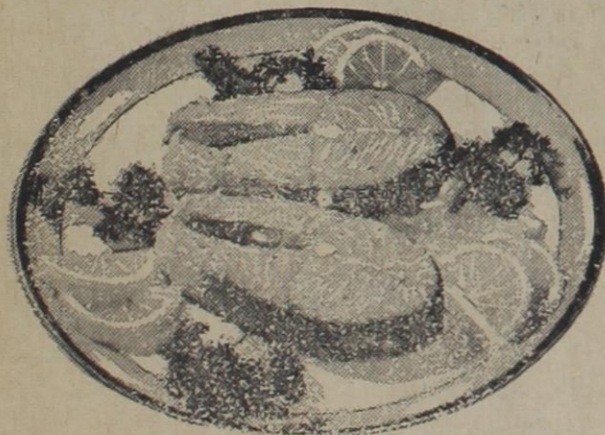
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
