According to this statement, Dallas is raisin some money to help finance Southern Methodist University and the Mayor was urgin the folks to shell out.

"What would Dallas be like without SMU?" the Mayor asked. "Why, it would set our city back more than half a century," he answered. "The culture and atmosphere derived from the university are what we need to build the great Southwestern city we are trying to build."

Well, up to there, what he said suited me all right. I'm in favor of all institutions of higher learning. There's a period in lots of young people's lives and most professors' when college is about the only handy place for em at the time. But the Dallas Mayor kept on talkin.

Texas schools have been asked to take part in the Twelfth National Children's Clothing Crusade to collect clothing to aid Korea, seven countries of Western Europe, two southwestern Indian Reservations. and isolated rural areas of eight southern states, it was announced by Leland D. Carmack National Representative of Save The Children Federation. Every family in Texas is beng asked to send a bundle of good, serviceable clothing to school during the week of the drive, March 22nd-March 27th. Universal participation of Texas schools is expected this year in the drive which is conducted under the auspices of a national committee of school superintendents. Federation officials report that there are nine million victims of communist aggression in Korea desperately in need of aid, as well as millions still in need in Europe where certain conditions are still tragic Thousands of children in handicapped rural areas of America are unable to attend school as a result of being inadequately clothed. Officials of Save The Children Federation, report that thousands of American children do not attend school as they lack sufficient clothing.

Besides the clothing distribution program, Save The Children Federation administers child and school sponsorship programs in America, overseas, and on Indian Reservations in the southwest. In these personalized program, individuals, schools organizations, and churches adopt a child or school through sponsorship and agree not only to furnish a specified amount of aid but also to correspond with the children or school that the have adopted. The sponsorship programs have been widely accepted as one of furthering mutual understanding and friendship between people of other countries and America.







Fort Worth-Receipts of cattle and calves were again heavy at all points on Monday, and the trade was inclined to weaken as a result of the heavier supplies.

The twelve markets reported about 30,000 more cattle and calves on Monday than a week ago.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings drew \$17 to \$23. Common and medium slaughter

and cutter grades sold from \$8 to \$10. Fat cows sold from \$10 to \$12, and some heiferettes higher. Canners and cutters cleared at \$6 to \$10. Bulls sold at \$8 to \$12.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold from \$14 to \$19, some 550-lb. calves at the higher price. Common and medium offerings cleared at \$10 to \$13, and culls cashed at \$7

Good and choice stocker steer calves drew \$14 to \$19, and stocker steer yearlings sold from \$18 down. Stocker cows cleared at \$8 to \$12.

The hog market was better again. with advances of 50 cents to \$1 per hundred. Good and choice butcher hogs sold at \$23 to \$23.50, the best prices here since the fifth day of October. Sows were strong to \$1 higher, selling at \$19 to \$21.

Shippers and small packers again completely dominated the trading on good hogs, major packers bidding mostly 50 cents to \$1 less than the bulk of the better hogs sold and not getting much done at these prices.

The sheep trade was uneven with most lambs inclined to weaken. Fat lambs were weak to 50 cents lower, and feeder lamb trade was rather dull and weak.

Old sheep were steady. Ewes sold from \$6 to \$7 for slaughter with some breeders from \$7 to \$10. Medium and low grade yearling muttons sold around \$10 to \$14. Old wethers drew \$7 to \$10. Old bucks sold for \$3 to \$3.50.

Potatoes head the supply list due to unusually large production in Maine and the Red River Valley Growers and sellers rate them of good quality, ideally suited for home

Pecans are being harvested in Georgia and Alabama, both native and paper shell varieties, and the prices are right. The Texas crop is light, however, and the paper shells are scarce which might be reflected in the price tag.

A lot of onions are going to market from the major eastern producpected to be the third largest on record. Texas grapefruit is coming again from the Rio Grande Valley about one million boxes of it, and total of 44.4 million boxes will be offered for sale this season.

Q-Is there any deadline for starting under the Korean GI Bill?

A-Yes. Veterans who left service before August 20, 1952, must start before August 20, 1954. Veterans separated after August 20, 1952 have two years from their separation date in which to begin.

Many masqueraded in gay cosumes. Friends exchanged gifts with one another. Such was the festival spirit of

his ancient land. These ancient festivals found their way westward to Greece and Rome. It was in Rome that the festival of the Saturnalia was conducted with

It began around the middle of December and lasted until January first. In the midst was December 25, the day when the sun was at its lowest ebb, but soon ready to increase again and send its rays of warmth and growth to the earth.

such boisterous rejoicing.

Saturnalia was a time of drunken revelry for many Romans. For others it was simpy a time of making merry. Jolly crowds masqueraded and visited their friends.

They exchanged gifts and wished one another good luck. Moreover, the Romans decorated their houses this time with boughs of laurel and green trees and with lighted candles and lamps.

Slaves and masters ate together, often exchanging places, the masters waiting on the slaves.

The early Christians tried to prevent the celebration of the Saturnalia, but in vain. What happened in history was that the festival was purged of its crude and immoral clements and made to honor the Christ-child of Bethehem.

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
