Local Girls Capture District Cage Crown

Four free shots in a three-minute overtime earned Cross Plains High School Buffettes the District 10-A basketball championship Tuesday night of last week.

Cross Plains defeated Dublin 58-54 for the league crown in the playoff game at Ranger Junior College. The two squads ended regular conference campaign deadlocked with 9-1 records. Each team handed the other its only league loss in the double round robin set-up.

Cross Plains was to have clashed with Eldorado at Winters Tuesday night for bi-district championship. Winner advances to the regional tournament at Denton on Friday and Saturday.

Tuesday's battle was close all the way with largest margin by either unit, five points, being registered by Buffettes. Dublin led just twice, and its biggest bulge was three points. Local sextet held two-point advantages at end of first three quarters, but Dublin tied the score 54-54 at end of regulation play.

Dublin knotted the tally with 1:06 remaining, and regained possession on a turnover, stalling until 20 seconds were left on the clock. The unit called

time, then worked for a final shot which was missed. In the overtime Buffette forwards Terry Edington and Debbie Tyler both hit two points on one-on-one charity opportunities.

Cross Plains won the game at the free throw line, hitting 28 of 36 attempts. Dublin netted 20 of 26 tosses. Team fouls were even at 21 each. Local sextet bucketed 15 field goals, and losing squad canned 17.

Two Buffettes fouled out. Guard Robbie Harmon drew a fifth personal late in the third period, and forward Kathy Purvis was fouled out early in final stanza. Penny Odom and Sherry Ingram, respectively, replaced the pair, and neither drew a foul. Other guards Norma Merrill and Evelyn Kitchens committed one and four mistakes respectively. Edington was called on four personals, and Tyler had a pair.

Miss Edington paced all scorers with a sizzling 37 points, 25 of which came at the foul line in 31 attempts. Miss Tyler hooped 11 points. Miss Purvis netted eight markers, and Miss Ingram got two. Wendy Truesdale paced Dublin with 29, and Debbie Jo Weems counted 21.

Robbie Harmon Chosen Top CPHS Homemaker

Robbie Harmon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Harmon, has been named 1971 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Cross Plains High School. She was chosen on the basis of her score in a Dec. 1 written knowledge and attitude examination for which 650,000 senior girls throughout the country were enrolled. From General Mills, sponsor of the annual education program, she will receive a specially design-

ed award. Additionally, her selection makes her eligible for state and national honors, including one of 102 college scholarships totaling \$110,000.

The 1971 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow — the national winner — will be awarded a \$5,000 educational grant. She will be selected this spring from 51 senior girls representing each state and the District of Columbia during an expense-paid educational tour by these State Homemakers of Tomorrow — each accompanied by a school adviser — of Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. Second, third and fourth-place winners nationally will receive \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships. The other state winners will be awarded \$1,500 grants.

Only 1 Aspirant For City Council

With deadline for filing less than two weeks away, only one person has filed for a place on Cross Plains City Council. Three vacancies are to be filled. Terms of Jimmielee Payne, Oscar Koenig and Gerald Bowden are expiring. Only Payne has thus far signed a candidacy blank to stand for re-election.

Texas statutes require that candidates file 30 days prior to time of balloting. Election date is April 3.

3,000 Acres Under Irrigation Near City

Irrigation seems contagious among farmers of the Cross Plains area. Whereas 15 years ago virtually no commercial watering was done in this locality, there are now at least 40 local producers in the business on a sizeable scale. They irrigate about 3,000 acres. Most raise peanuts, however, at least six produce grasses or forage for livestock.

Estimates made by buyers are that the average acre of irrigated land produces \$375 worth of marketable peanuts. The cost, though, is reported to sometimes run \$100 per acre. It is not uncommon, some growers say, to have \$60 an acre in the crop before it comes up. All agree that peanut production has come of age; it is now definitely big business.

Exploration is constantly underway for underground water supplies to add more irrigation. Too, several lakes built by the Soil Conservation Service are being utilized.

Brief resumes of local people in the irrigation business and the sizes of their undertakings follow.

Cowan Hutton, who lives northeast of Pioneer, is believed to have been the first farmer to begin commercial irrigation in this area. He started about 12 years ago. Today he has 200 acres which he waters from 17 wells. He is presently negotiating for another 150-acre farm west of Cross Plains and plans to attempt irrigation there.

500 Acres Possible

Oscar and Edwin Schaefer have 90 acres under irrigation in the Sabanno sector, all of which was planted to peanuts last year. The father and son, though, have about 500 acres subject to watering from wells at a depth of from 50 to 86 feet. Six wells are presently being utilized.

Glenn Winfrey has 235 acres under irrigation, 135 of which are at his home place three miles north of Cross Plains. The acreage there is watered from wells which produce from stratas 60 to 114 feet deep. Then Winfrey has 100 acres irrigated from a lake on the property which he purchased from Damon D. Jones.

New Projects

Jones, who recently bought the 456-acre Arvin place west of Cottonwood and the 160-acre Bostick farm in the Nimrod locality, is putting in 50 acres of new irrigation. He is reported to have drilled some strong water wells on land acquired from Claude Joy and J. M. Greenwood.

Troy Lamb has 135 acres under irrigation on the tract which he bought from Dr. Weldon Varner in the Cottonwood community. This is watered from a lake on the property. In addition Lamb has 60 acres being irrigated in the Nimrod community.

Ike Hickman, who lives on State Highway 36 three miles east of Pioneer, has an estimated 65 acres under irrigation. He customarily leases much of this acreage.

W. D. Clark waters 45 acres from wells at his place just north of Cottonwood. It is planted to peanuts.

Waters 3 Tracts

Charlie Sowell waters a total of 170 acres. He has the Worthy place, two miles north of Cross Plains, and irrigates 43 acres of peanuts there from a Soil Conservation Lake on the property. Sowell irrigates 100 acres at his home place north of Cottonwood and also 27 acres southeast of Cottonwood.

Collis Eager has 43 acres of irrigated land at his place between Cross Plains and Cottonwood. It is customarily planted to peanuts. Water comes from an adjacent lake.

Kenneth Smith irrigates about 35 acres of peanuts on the Wayne May place in the Sabanno locality. Water comes from wells.

R. T. Ezell, who produced some prize peanuts last year on his land southwest of Rising Star, has about 150 acres under irrigation.

Clayton and Clinton Wilson have about 100 acres under irrigation at land they own northeast of Pioneer. The two are twin brothers.

Bill Dudley, who lives some three miles northeast of the Oscar Schaefer place, has about 80 acres of watered land, all of which is planted to peanuts.

New Wells Hit

Lewis Fortune is putting in some 40 acres of irrigation at a 100-acre tract he recently bought joining his home place, five miles west of Cross Plains. It will be watered from newly-drilled wells and planted to peanuts.

Dwayne Wilson has about 50 acres under irrigation at the place he bought from C. H. Dawson, three miles northeast of Pioneer.

M. H. Montfort irrigates two separate pieces which total about 45 acres. Both fields are in the Pioneer community, one north and the other east.

Bobby Dillard irrigates 20 acres of peanuts, one mile southwest of Cross Plains.

Goldie Lawson has about 25 acres being watered in the Sabanno area. It is irrigated from shallow wells.

Hovet Wilson irrigates an estimated 65 acres on the Roy Arrowood farm four miles southwest of town.

C. W. Richter, who lives some 10 miles northwest of Rising Star, has an estimated 75 acres under irrigation.

Elliott's Busy

Hulon and Mack Elliott have 125 acres under irrigation between Pioneer and Rising Star. They have a big, well-managed operation.

W. B. (Wes) Holcomb has 14 acres presently under irrigation, but plans to add additional land soon. Sufficient water is available from shallow wells.

Raymond Sprawls irrigates an estimated 25 acres in the Scranton community utilizing water from shallow wells.

G. V. (Mike) Cunningham and Oliver D. Worthy are applying for permit to irrigate 95 acres in three tracts, one mile north of town. Water would come from an SCS lake on property owned by the two men.

Joe Whittington has 14 acres under irrigation in the same vicinity of the Collis Eager place. He, too, utilizes lake water.

Pat McGough in the Nimrod community has 20 acres of irrigated land. It is customarily planted to peanuts. Water comes from wells.

Dan Childers, who farms west of Cottonwood, has 15 acres under irrigation.

Claude Joy, who also farms west of Cottonwood, has an estimated 25 acres of irrigation. Most of it is usually planted to peanuts.

R. H. Erwin, who lives in the Union Hill sector northwest of Rising Star, has about 125 acres of irrigated land. It is watered from wells.

Joe Butler, who farms between Pioneer and Rising Star, has about 200 acres under irrigation.

Driller Gets In

Lester King, who lives one mile east of the Sabanno community, has two tracts in irrigation totaling 49 acres. Both are watered by wells and will be planted to peanuts. King is a water well driller and also a farmer.

Dale Crawford is putting in five acres of irrigated Costal Bermuda at his place just outside of the eastern city limits of Cross Plains on State Highway 36.

Roy Stambaugh has 32 acres in irrigation in the Cross Cut vicinity. It is watered from a lake on the place and is planted to permanent grass.

A. L. (Pulley) Buchanan has an estimated 50 acres in irrigation two miles southwest of Rising Star.

Raymond DeBusk irrigates a 12-acre field of Costal Bermuda just west of Cross Plains city limits.

Dr. Raymond Tull of Abilene has six acres of irrigated forage for livestock on his place in the Burnt Branch community. It is land which he bought from Gwyn Childers.

Dave Lee has an estimated 30 acres in Costal Bermuda under irrigation at his place three miles south of town.

Drew Dan Jackson in the Nimrod community has about 100 acres being watered. All his acreage is planted to peanuts.

Luther (Pat) Shirley, who lives north of Pioneer, has 30 acres in irrigation. Shallow wells serve as his source water.

Sterling Tucker, who four miles southwest of Rising Star, has an estimated 60 in cultivation.

Joe Fraley, two miles of Rising Star, has about acres which he waters.

R. C. (Dick) Brown, Plains postmaster, has acres under irrigation. It is one mile north of State Highway 36, just west of Lakewood Recreation Center.

Arson Being Probed In Vacant House Burning

Arson was thought possible in the burning of an old frame dwelling at corner of West 6th Street and Avenue G here Saturday about 3:30 p.m.

The house, which was vacant and the owner of which is not known, was ignited by blazing tall grass. One person reported seeing two youths set the grass afire.

Local firemen battled the blaze, but could not control the fire before the house was destroyed. The Junior Baugh residence, across the street north, was threatened for a time as a south wind fanned heat and smoke onto the house. Paint on the Baugh dwelling was blistered despite watering-down efforts by firemen.

Several fire fighters suffered minor burns in combatting the inferno. After igniting the

structure was engulfed in a few minutes.

Two Enter Race For School Board Posts

Two candidates have filed for re-election to places on Cross Plains school board. They are Noah Johnson and Roy Neil Tatom.

Vernon Phillips, the other incumbent whose term is expiring, has not yet announced his plans.

Three trustees are to be chosen for three year terms at an election scheduled April 3. Aspirants must sign candidacy blanks by March 3 to have their names printed on the official election ballot for school trustees.

Joe Hanna Gives Report On Legislature's Activity

We are now in the fifth week of the current legislative session and it has been one of the busiest. To quote one member, "Never in my 10 years in the Texas House, have I seen members of the Legislature come to grips with major legislation this early in the session."

The following amendments to the constitution will be submitted to the people of Texas:

S.J.R. 5 — the "welfare amendment" — removes the ceiling from old age assistance and places a limit on aid to families with dependent children. The limit will not be stated on the ballot, but it is \$5 million.

H.J.R. 21 — allows the Legislature to take up Constitutional Amendments during special sessions. At this time proposed changes in the constitution can only be considered during the regular session.

S.J.R. 17 — allows for \$100 million in bonds to be issued for waste disposal and water development. This reduces the city's share to 20 per cent of the total cost with state and federal paying the balance.

S.J.R. 15 — authorizes a state commission to make rules and regulations concerning legislative ethics, and to recommend legislative salaries. This is the direct result of activities of late of some of the state's officials.

One of the proposed amendments that failed was to increase the Senate from a 31 to a 39 member body. This was opposed by labor and the large city members.

A proposed bill now in the Counties Committee, is to prohibit any county from paying a bounty on any animal. Actually this not any real concern to the counties, but in my opinion, it is an intrusion by the state in local government.

Another bill being considered in the Counties Committee, concerns salaries paid county employees where the salary is wholly paid by the county. In the past the Counties Commit-

tee has spent more time on this type of bill, than any other kind of legislation. In the past, the Legislature has not made it mandatory to pay a certain amount, but did set a ceiling on the salaries. The thinking on this bill by the author is that we in Austin should not have power. This responsibility belongs to the 254 counties. Furthermore, the county commissioners answer to the people, just as the legislators do, and they should know their situation better than anyone, therefore they should have this authority to set salaries.

I again encourage everyone to write me your thoughts and ideas on any of the above or any other legislation that you might be interested in.

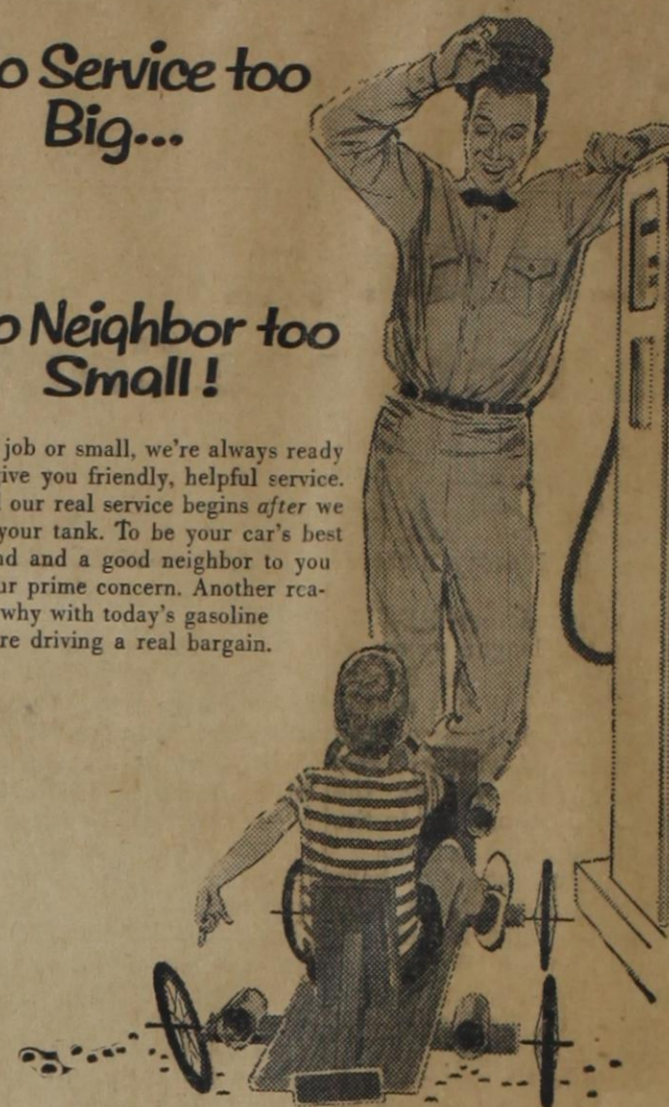

It is No. 1 James Snyder, located on a 160 acre lease. Drilling is 2,310 feet from the south and east lines of Section 114, BBB&C Survey.

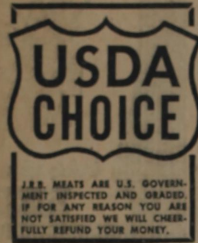

A Peanut Production Shortcourse will be held at Cross Plains and Clyde on Feb. 22 and 23 for all peanut producers in Callahan County.

Meetings will be held at Vocational Agriculture Buildings at each location beginning at 7:30 p.m. each night.

At Cross Plains on Monday night, Feb. 22, James Denton, area farm management specialist, and Dr. John Chapin, area agronomist, will be featured speakers. PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 15) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created as an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, three members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Judges serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission, of each group of three appointees no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the first day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a majority of the membership of each House for a term ending on the first day of the next Regular Session.

(2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and until his successor is appointed and has qualified. In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a period of two (2) years.

(3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

(4) The commission shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor

at an amount higher than that of other members notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary of Article IV, Section 17, of the Texas Constitution.

(5) The commission shall promulgate rules of ethics to govern the conduct of all legislators, legislative officers and all officeholders, appointive or elective, of any office, department, district agency, commission, board or any governmental unit or branch established by or under the authority of the constitution and laws of the State of Texas and all persons who shall use any privilege of the floor in either House of the Legislature. The Texas State Ethics Commission shall further promulgate rules providing that each member of the Legislature and each of the hereinabove named officeholders upon election and any appointee to any of these offices shall file with the State Ethics Commission a statement under oath setting out a complete financial statement in detail within 10 days after being elected or receiving an appointment. This information shall be privileged information to the State Ethics Commission to be used only by them to determine if there exists a conflict of interests or if there is or has been a violation of any of the rules of ethics promulgated by the Texas State Ethics Commission or any laws of the State of Texas. The Legislature shall enact statutes dealing with unauthorized disclosure or misuse of said privileged information.

(6) The commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet in Austin at least once each year to review existing rules of ethics, Legislative compensation rates, mileage allowances and per diem rates, and to make any changes deemed necessary.

(7) All rules of ethics, compensation rates, mileage allowances or per diem rates currently in force, as well as all changes and recommendations by the State Ethics Commission shall be promulgated before the convening of any session of the Legislature by filing a certified copy of the proclamation with the Secretary of State.

(a) Each rule of ethics or change thereof made by the commission shall take effect on the 15th day of the legislative session following the proclamation unless dis-

proved before that day by resolution of either House of the Legislature.

(b) All rates of compensation, mileage allowances or per diem rates and all changes and recommendations made by the commission thereof shall not take effect until approved section by section by resolution of both Houses of the Legislature.

"All votes on these resolutions or parts thereof shall show the individual votes in the respective journals of both Houses.

(8) The commission shall investigate any alleged violation of any rule of ethics promulgated by it and report its findings to the appropriate State agency, official, legislative body, grand jury or district attorney.

(9) Unless otherwise provided by the commission, each member of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury an annual salary of Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and per diem not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first 120 days only of each Regular Session and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than 140 days. In addition to the per diem, the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session.

(10) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 18th day of May, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such terms, in such denominations, form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize.

(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law.

(c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

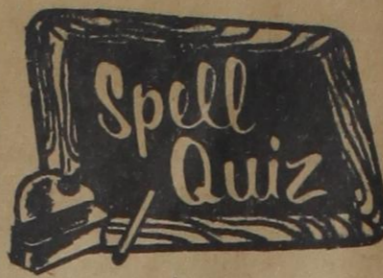
