Accordin to this article, a man over in England has been bafflin scientists with his ability to do figures in his head faster than an addin machine. A bunch of these British scientists asked him to multiply 854,736 by 395,627 and he got the correct answer in five seconds. It took the scientists twenty seconds to get the same answer on a calculating machine, although of course them scientists may not have even known how to use an addin machine.

Now some people seem to get a delight out of this, arguin the machine will never replace the human brain. I don't look at it that way. There ain't no race, as far as I'm concerned.

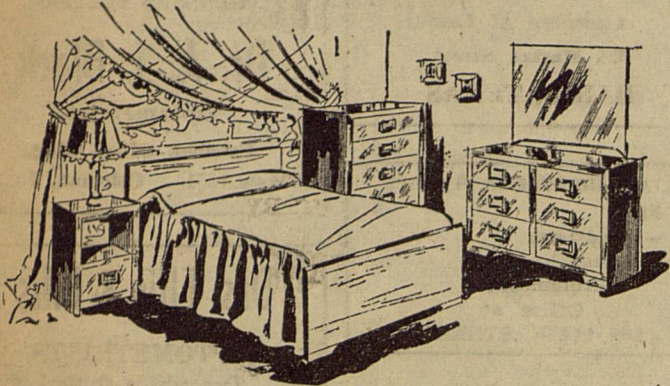

"As It Looks From Here"

Gorman, Texas—The scene of this week's newsletter is Gorman, where I have stopped on my way back from Temple after attending a meeting with State PMA officials. The meeting was also attended by Congressman Bob Poage of Waco. With us were representatives of farmers from Jones County.

Our main purpose was to impress upon the State PMA representative the necessity of including acreage in next year's quotas which was prepared for planting but not planted because of drought. The argument was also extended to cover wheat and peanuts.

As yet, the Department of Agriculture in Washington and the State PMA Committee of College Station has not instructed the County PMA Committees to include this acreage.

The law definitely contemplates that such acreage should be included, and it is my hope that every County PMA Committee and every farmer will insist that this be done. It was definitely the understanding of the Congress that "unusual weather conditions" be taken into consideration.

In addition to this issue, the question arose as to how such acreage could be actually counted. The representative of the State PMA Committee stated at the meeting that they were not instructed to use funds for this purpose. We insisted that the farmers' estimates be accepted.

We are also insisting that the figures of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics be disregarded because it has been proved they are inaccurate. If the report of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics is accepted, the acreage allotment for all crops will be far below the actual figures.

It is hoped that the State PMA Committee will fight for the rights of the farmers of Texas and insist that the Agricultural Department follow the intents of the Congress in allotting acreage to our State, which in turn will be allotted to the counties. Never before have we had to resort to the claim for "unusual

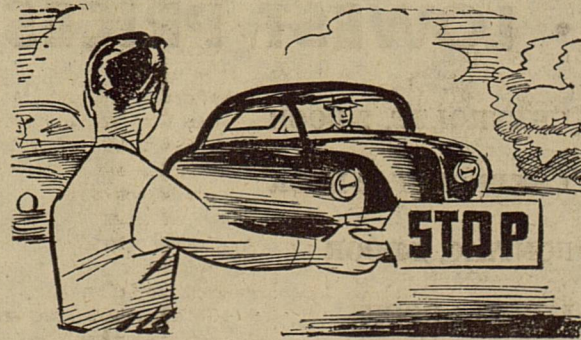

BIBLE Question BOX

QUESTION: Do the signs mentioned in Matthew 24 prove that the end of the world is near?

ANSWER: This chapter, a favorite of "sensationalists" for years does not refer to Christ's return at the end of time as your question suggests, but rather to His coming in judgement in the Jewish nation by means of the armies of Rome in 70 A. D., at the destruction of Jerusalem. In verse 2 Christ tells the disciples that "there shall not be left here one stone upon another" in speaking of the temple, and the disciples ask "When shall these things be?" Christ gives them various signs of the times and tells them that when this occurs "then let them which be in Judea flee into the mountains: Let him which is on the house top not come down to take anything out of his house: Neither let him which is in the field return back to take his clothes." (Matt. 24:16-17).

Such advice would be foolish and useless when Christ returns at the end of time, but most appropriate for those trying to escape the invading armies of Rome. In verse 19 he says, "Woe unto them that are with child, and to them that give suck in those days." The disadvantage of trying to escape an invading army in such circumstances is readily seen, but no one could imagine why these should be placed at any disadvantage for the return of the Lord at the end of time. Verse 20 says, "Pray ye that your flight be not in the winter, neither on the Sabbath day." Having to flee an invading army and hide in the caves and mountains in winter would be disastrous, but how could the weather or time of year effect us in any way when Christ returns. Furthermore, the Jews were permitted by law to travel only a short distance on the Sabbath and by custom all the gates of the city of Jerusalem were closed on that day making escape impossible. Thus we see that Christ was not referring to his return at the end of time but rather to the time when "not one stone would be left upon another" at the destruction of Jerusalem and of the Jewish national life.
