farmers from Jones County. Our main purpose was to impress upon the State PMA representative the necessity of including acreage in next year's quotas which was prepared for planting but not planted because of drought. The argument was also extended to cover wheat and peanuts.

As yet, the Department of Agriculture in Washington and the State PMA Committee of College Station has not instructed the County PMA Committees to include this acreage.

The law definitely contemplates that such acreage should be included, and it is my hope that every County PMA Committee and every farmer will insist that this be done. It was definitely the understanding of the Congress that "unusual wea ther conditions" be taken into con sideration.

In addition to this issue, the question arose as to how such acreage could be actually counted. The representative of the State PMA Committee stated at the meeting that they were not instructed to use funds for this purpose. We insisted that the farmers' estimates be accepted

We are also insisting that the figures of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics be disregarded because it has been proved they are inaccurate. If the report of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics is accepted, the acreage allotment for all crops will be far below the actual figures.

It is hoped that the State PMA Committee will fight for the rights of the farmers of Texas and insist that the Agricultural Department follow the intents of the Congress in allotting acreage to our State. which in turn will be allotted to the counties. Never before have we had to resort to the claim for "unusual

are we entitled to consideration because of "unusual weather conditions", but we are also at an unfair advantage because of the system of grading Spanish peanuts, as compared to the lower grades produced in States such as Georgia and Alabama. Numerous appeals have been made to the Department of Agriculture to correct this situation and every effort is being continued.
