Notices of extension through Dec. 31, 1971, of the livestock feed, hay transportation and seasonal haying and grazing of CAP acreages. No request need be made when grazing or haying own set-aside acreage, but a request is required when charging another party.

Also noted was a change in livestock feed program concerning undue financial hardship. J. C. Earp, ASCS director, stated that "undue financial hardship" shall mean that in judgment of county committee the producer derives major portions of income from farm and will be unable to obtain through normal channels without undue hardship, sufficient feed for livestock.

Rain Brightens Crop Prospects

Slow, soaking rain fell over this area Sunday brightening prospects for all phases of agriculture.

Official National Weather Service gauge, maintained in Cross Plains by F. C. Newton, registered 1.47 inches of rain Sunday. Combined with showers during the last six days of July, which totaled 1.40 inches, 2.87 inches have been received here in eight days. Total rainfall in July was 2.26 inches, second wettest month in 1971 with the exception of May when 3.75 inches were recorded.

Farmers and ranchers were delighted with the moisture. Outlook for cotton, peanut and sorghums were greatly improved. Pastures also benefitted greatly from the slow rains.

Ranchers and stockmen welcomed the rains, but some lamented the fact that the moisture came too late because some had already cut size of their herds due to lack of pasturage and water. One opined, however, that the rain will provide late summer pasture and possibly help grazing into early Fall.

Prospects for cash crops were enhanced, but it was noted that additional moisture will be needed later this month to insure maturing crops.

Some farmers who had not planted their peanut acreage due to lack of moisture were considering planting late after last week's showers.

Through late Monday 10.83 inches of rain had been measured in Cross Plains thus far in 1971 by Newton. Normal rainfall for a full year here is 24.54 inches, and the average for the past 23 years has been 24.24 inches.

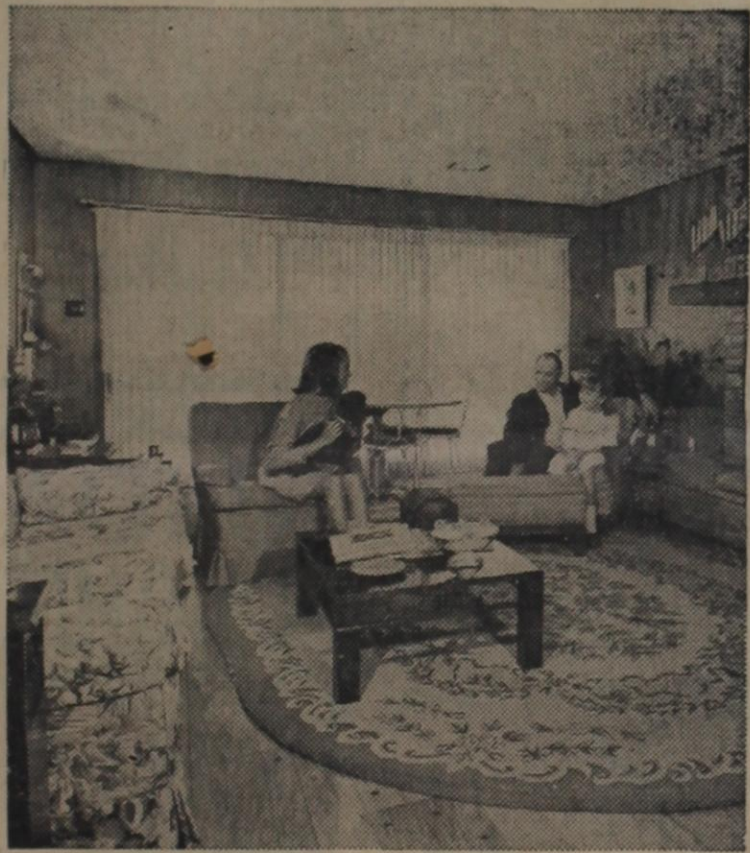

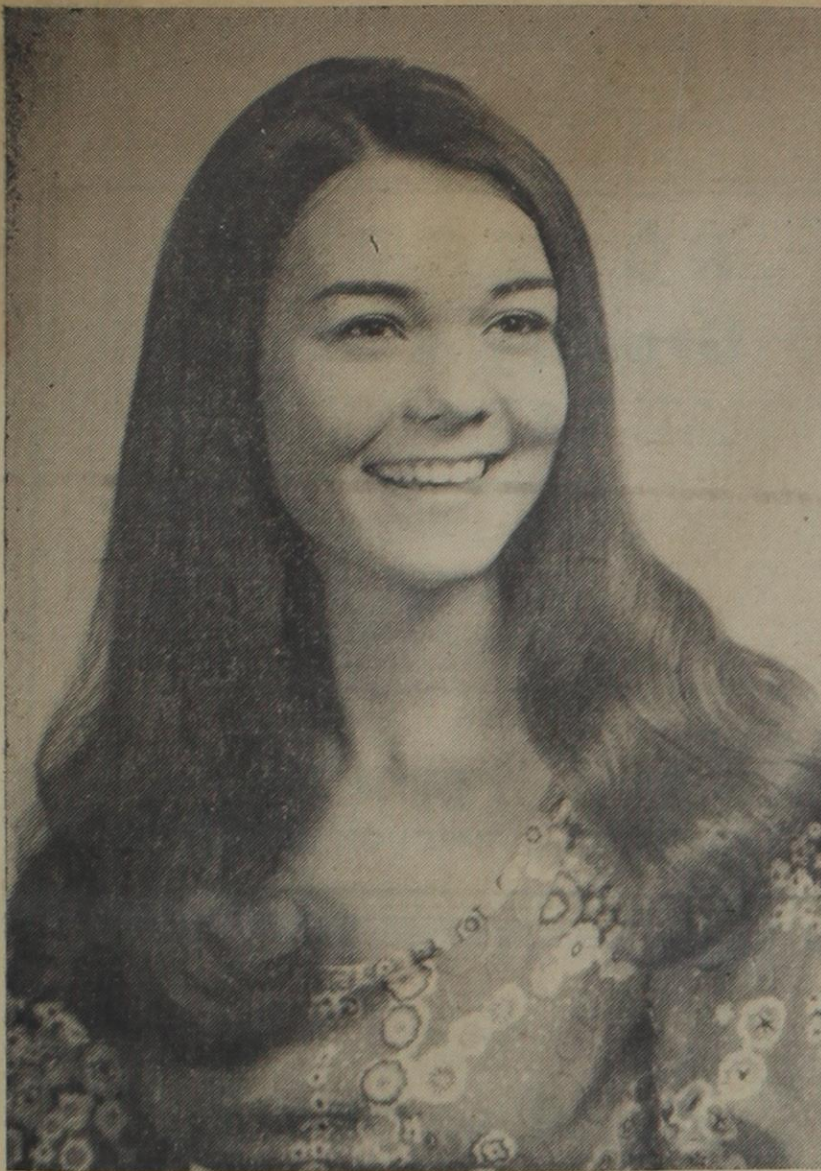

HINTS

FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

We have been talking about home sewing, one of the ways the creative woman adds to her wardrobe for all occasions. Remember that you are not just sewing to be making something, ladies. You are sewing TO ADD TO YOUR WARDROBE. So

don't forget wardrobe planning before you shop. Take time to look in your closet and see what you will be wearing WITH what you make. Go to the fabric counter armed with notes about colors and kinds of fabric which will best suit your needs. Take items with you that you wish to match or coordinate with. And before you buy be sure that the fabric and pattern that caught your eye are within your abilities as a seamstress; otherwise you may join the ranks of the frustrated women who tried and gave up because they tried to begin with the complicated.

Before you buy, examine fabrics carefully, remember to read those hangtags and bolt ends, and ask the sales clerk any question that comes to mind (Please be patient when she has to search out an answer for you. It's not easy to keep up with ALL the new fabrics!)

Before you cut, be sure to preshrink anything that may cause a problem. Assemble

your sewing aids, remembering that sharp scissors, sharp dressmaker pins, and sharp machine needles will prevent snags and pulls in your beautiful new garment.

Most of today's seamstresses know the wonderful qualities of knit fabrics. In most cases, they don't ravel, require stay-stitching, tape or seam finishing. Fullness is easy to manage and lining and interfacings are seldom needed. Polyester double-knits are washable, while many textured acetate and triacetate knits retain their appearance best if dry cleaned.

Use a fine needle and cotton-covered polyester thread, and guide the fabric gently. With acetates and triacetates, use stay-stitching around armholes and stress points, use woven seam tape to stabilize structural points such as waistline and shoulders. Let full garments hang a day before hemming. And watch that hot iron! These fabrics melt.

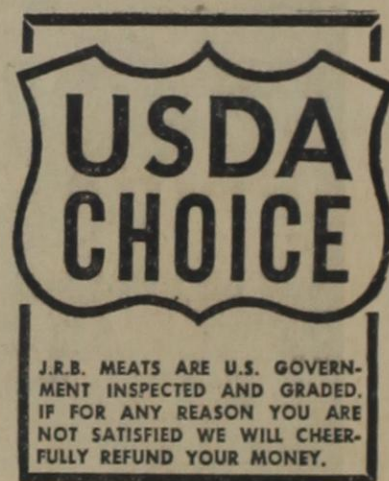

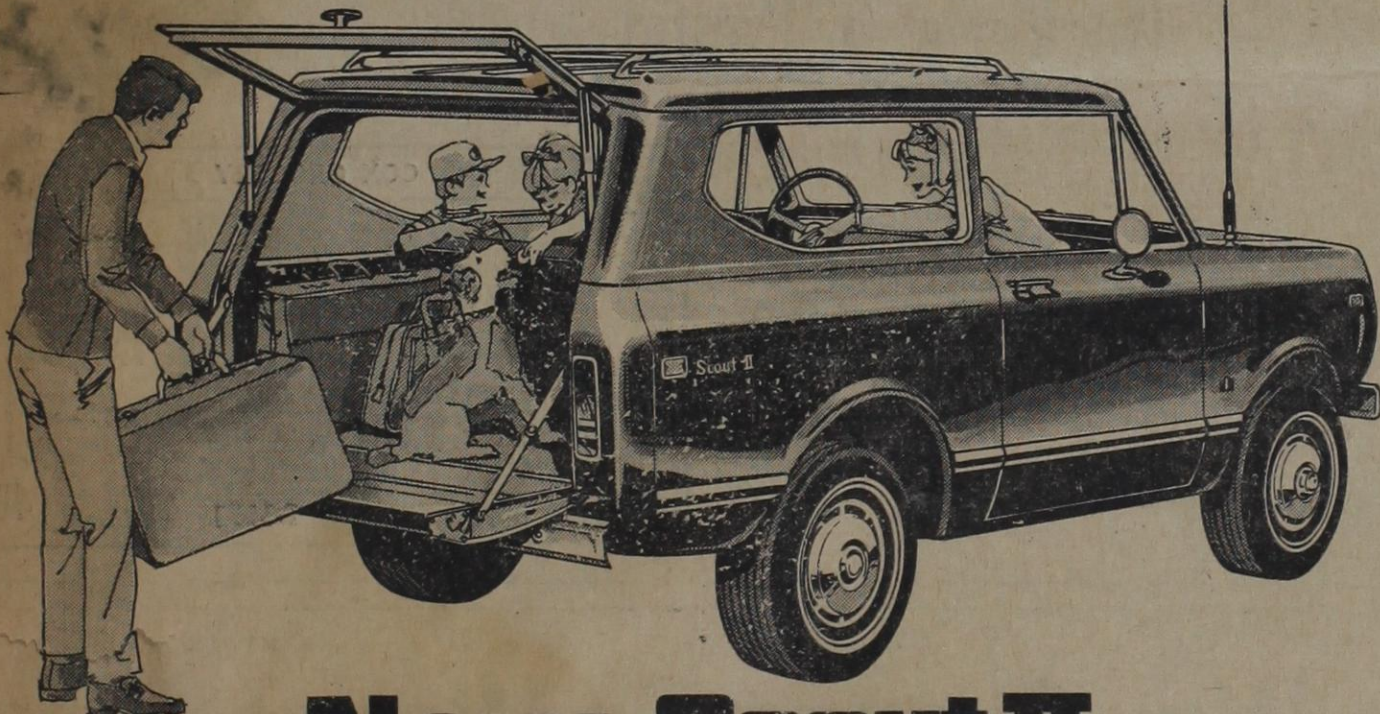
