Citizens Aid Lawmen In Search For Youths

Several law officers and numerous citizens combined forces Tuesday of last week in catching two Brownwood youths, 17 and 18 years old, accused of taking a tape player and tapes from a local youth's auto.

Buddy Dillard, local high school youth, discovered the theft of the musical apparatus early Tuesday morning and reported it to his father, Billy D. Dillard, who in turn, reported it to Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox of this city.

The car was parked near the R. C. Merryman, Jr. residence when the theft occurred. Merryman saw two youths drop a tape later Tuesday near the Ben Porter home, and happened to mention it to Billy Dillard. Merryman had not learned of the theft. The elder Dillard had been with Cox in an early morning preliminary investigation.

The two youths were spotted in the area of the city dump ground and a long hunt began by Cox, Dillard and Mack Kniffen, Public Safety Partolman of Clyde. No trace could be found and search had slowed when D. C. Jones reported to Cox that he had seen two youths at the bridge spanning Turkey Creek on Highway 206.

The hunt resumed and was by this time aided by Callahan County Sheriff Grayson Miller, and Deputies Luke Taylor of

Clyde and Bill Wright of Baird, an unidentified Cisco city policeman, and Drew Crain of Coleman. Coleman County authorities also, assisted.

As the two youths approached the Jim Dewbre home, in the area west of the creek and dump ground, R. D. Corley of this city remarked to Raymond Franke of this city that he figured those were the youths the law was hunting. Franke went to his father's home to warn his parents. As he did so the boys approached the Franke place and the younger Franke got an unloaded shotgun and he and his father gave chase in a pick-up.

After several minutes of dodging and doubling-back, the Frankes tught the youths in an old field.

Franke held the youths until lawmen could be notified and arrived.

The pair were tried in Callahan County Court on a charge of theft. The 17-year-old, Lonnie Goins, who according to Cox had been in Gatesville School for Boys twice, was fined \$25, plus \$52 costs, and given 30 days in jail. The 16-year-old was released to the custody of his mother.

Cox expressed appreciation to all who helped, and congratulated the citizens upon the responsibility displayed and help given.

103 Local Students Win Initial Honor Roll Status

One hundred and three students in Cross Plains schools earned honor roll status during the first six weeks of the 1971-72 school term, according to the list released Tuesday morning by school officials.

Sixty-four of the elite were in elementary school, and 39 were in the top four grades. The figure represents over 22 per cent of total enrollment at the school. Just over 20 per cent of the high-school pupils made a general average of 90 or above, and just over 24 percent of the students in the eight grammar school grades won places on the first list of the year.

Jack Watkins, elementary principal, reported 64 in that portion of the local school won the honor rating, and Scot Edington, high school principal, re-

ported 39 honor scholastics.

The senior class led all others in number of classroom stars with 16, which represents about 40 per cent of the class. Second grade was second overall with 12, followed closely by the fourth and third grades with 11 each.

Improvements and additions include remodeling of the lobby; adding new processing and "Kill Floor" quarters and equipment; holding pens; smoke curing room and equipment for cooking hams, all stainless steel, and scalding vat for hogs.

"We are now in position to offer most modern and efficient meat processing and storage available in this section of Texas," Hutchins stated.

Baird Bears Humble Bison

Baird Bears spotted Cross Plains Buffaloes a touchdown then roared back to trample the Herd 61-6 in a non-conference football game in Buffalo Stadium Friday night.

The score was the largest ever by either team in the long history of the two Callahan County Class A schools, surpassing even the 55-16 beating the Bears handed Bisons in 1970.

Only in first downs and passing yardage were the two units anywhere near even. Baird racked up 11 first downs to 12 for Cross Plains, and the Bears had 165 yards in the air to 151 for the Buffs. Baird swiped seven Bison aeriels and smothered three Buff fumbles. Cross Plains intercepted one Bear pass and recovered a pair of Baird bobbles.

The game began on breaks. Buff Ricky Kirkham was shaken loose from the ball on the kickoff return, but three plays later Kirkham intercepted a Bear pass.

Bisons Tally

From that point Cross Plains marched 84 yards in 12 plays before surrendering the ball on downs at the Bear three. First

Mites Rally To Nip Goldthwaite

Mighty Mite footballers of Cross Plains Junior High School rallied late in the game to defeat host Goldthwaite 18-16 Tuesday of last week.

Eaglets scored first for an 8-0 lead, but Mites marched 60 yards to cut the deficit to 8-6 at halftime. Greg Turner scored on a 10-yard run around end. As first half ended Cross Plains was on the hosts two.

Goldthwaite upped the margin to 16-6 in the third quarter.

With three and one-half minutes left in the game, Ken Hunter went off tackle for 50 yards, cutting the deficit to 12-6. Mites held on the kickoff and blocked a Goldthwaite punt on the Eagle 10-yard line. On first play Jimmy Crawford skirted left end for six points and the 18-16 triumph.

Many Mites came in for praise both offensively and defensively by coaches Mack McConal and Jim Birkhimer.

Blanket will be here Oct. 19 in the home finale for the Mites.

Baird play resulted in a fumble, and Buff Jackie Thomas pounced on the loose pigskin for the Cross Plains tally with 5:40 left in the first quarter. Halfback Rodney Renfro was stopped in a two-point conversion try.

Bruce Johnson recovered a Baird fumble on the kick, but Buffs had to punt, and then Bears began their scoring onslaught.

Baird took over in the 10 and moved 90 yards to paydirt after an 84-yard gallop by Quarterback Gary Goble was nullified by a penalty. Score came on a 51-yard pass play from Goble to Halfback David Strickland. Jay Reeves kicked the point and Baird led 7-6 with 43 seconds left in the initial period.

Baird's Brian Hughes intercepted a Buff pass a few seconds later and in two play Fullback Cecil Faircloth scored on a seven-yard run. Reeves added the point as he did after the next five touchdowns. Faircloth intercepted a Buff pass and got the final first half tally on a one-yard spurt with 8:55 left in the second period.

Bisons mounted a drive late in the period, covering 36 yards, to the Baird nine before a fumble stopped the threat.

Four Touchdowns

The Baird scoring machine got into high gear in the third quarter, and even after leading by more than four touchdowns, Baird Coach Bo Wilson still didn't call off his first-line Bears.
