

6 Oil Ventures Set In Field At Putnam

Cope-Shahan Corp. of Abilene completed six regular field wells five miles northwest of Putnam. All are on the Neuman 118 acre lease and producing from the Frye Sand. They were completed on pumps.

No. 2 well spots 835 feet from the north and 480 feet from the east lines of Section 133, University Lands Survey.

Daily potential was 17 barrels of 43 gravity oil, with a trace of water. It is pumping from perforations at 260 to 270 feet with the 4 1/2 -inch casing set at 340 feet, total depth.

Location for No. 3 is 535 feet from the north and 480 feet from the east lines of Section 133. Daily potential was 19 barrels of water. Production is from perforations at 249 to 259 feet with the 4 1/2 -inch casing set at 318 feet, total depth.

No. 4 spots 460 feet from the north and 190 feet from the east lines of Section 133. The well had a daily potential of 19 barrels of 43 gravity oil, with a trace of water. The 4 1/2 -inch casing, set at 314 feet, was perforated at 249 to 259 feet. Total depth was 318 feet, plugged back to 314 feet.

Location for No. 5 well is 760 feet from the north and 190 feet from the east lines of Section 133. It had a daily potential of 19 barrels of 43 gravity oil, with a trace of water, from perforations at 250 to 259 feet. The 4 1/2 -inch casing is set at 318 feet, total depth.

Site for No. 6 is 1,265 feet from the north and 480 feet from the east lines of Section 133. Daily potential was 17 barrels of 43 gravity oil, with a trace of water.

No. 7 well spots 1,340 feet from the north and 190 feet from the east lines of Section 133. It had a daily potential of 19 barrels of 43 gravity oil, with a trace of water.

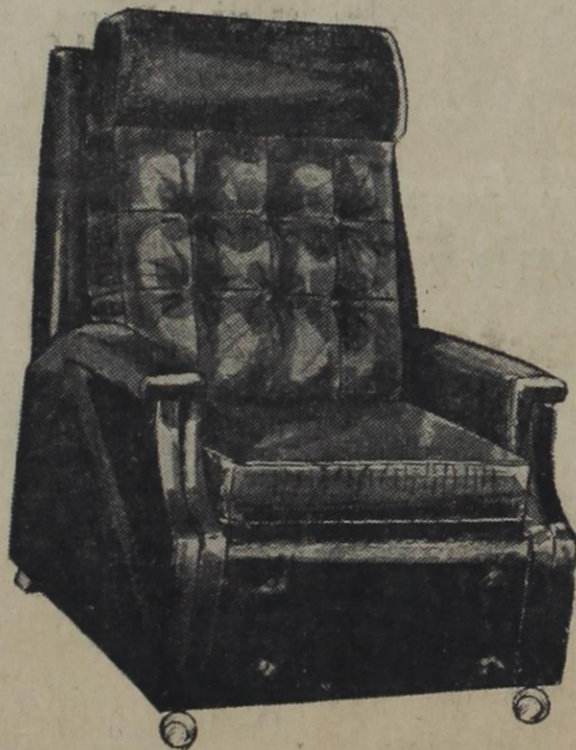

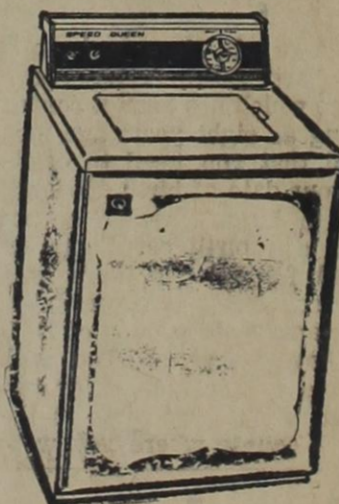

Social security protection for young workers and their families is described in detail in a new edition of a booklet available at the Abilene social security office at Room 2321, Federal Office Building, North Third and Pine Streets, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager.

The 24-page booklet is called "Social Security Information for Young Families." It explains how young workers may get monthly social security benefits if they become severely disabled -- and how their families may get benefits if the worker dies prematurely.

HOME HINTS

FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

Have you ever rummaged through your recipes and rediscovered an old family favorite that has somehow gotten laid aside and gone unused for months — or years? I have. And so has Mrs. Betty Jones of Comanche. She recently unearthed a forgotten favorite for Linda Relish. It's a good one for it with fresh peppers in garden and market:

LINDA RELISH

1 medium head of cabbage
12 medium onions

12 medium red peppers
12 medium green peppers

Grind the above in food chopper with medium cutter or put through blender. Add ½ cup salt. Let stand 2 hours. Drain well. Mix with:

3 pints vinegar
6 cups sugar
1 tsp. mustard seed
1 tsp. celery seed

Put in jars and close tightly. No cooking or sealing required. Need not refrigerate relish.

When you finish your relish, pop those dishes into your Kitchenaid dishwasher (the one with movable dividers because every load you wash is as varied as the foods you fix.) Easy relish! Easy clean-up!

HINT: Filming or spotting in a dishwasher is usually caused by one or more of the following:

- low water pressure and consequent low fill of dishwasher
- low water temperature (140-160 degree is recommended)
- hard water (use a water softener of the non-precipitating type with detergent)
- use of improper or very old detergent
- too much or too little detergent
- over loading the dishwasher

NORTHWEST EULA AREA SCHEDULED FOR WILDCAT

Chaparral Exploration Co. of Abilene will drill No. 1 O. D. Gist as a proposed 1,950-foot Cook and Hope Sand wildcat two miles northwest of Eula.

Drill site is 2,312 feet north, east corner of Section 14, Block thence 592 feet east of the north-8, SP Survey, but in fractional Section 34, T&P (E. D. Weinert) Survey.

Location is 300 feet northeast of an abandoned 1,933-foot producer and ¼-mile east of the Eula, North (Cook Sand) Field.

1972 Cotton Program Details Are Revealed

Information has been received by the Callahan County ASCS office which indicates that next year's cotton program will be practically the same as this year.

Allotments will be approximately the same as they were in 1971. The national average loan rate of 19.5c per pound and payment rate per acre of 15c per pound times the farm yield remains the same. Also, the required 20 per cent set-aside will be the same as last year.

As in 1971, the farm allotment will not limit the acreage of cotton a cooperating farmer can plant. A cotton farmer who sets aside the required acreage to conserving uses can plant all of the cotton he wishes — without penalty — and receive the full payment on his farm base acreage allotment. Failure to plant at least 90 per cent of the farm's allotment will result in a reduction in payment. It could also result in a reduction in the 1973 allotment as much as 20 per cent. If no cotton is planted for three consecutive years, the entire allotment can be lost. The same skin-row planting rules which were in effect for the 1971 crop will be applicable to the 1972 crop. Skips of two or more rows will be eligible for designation as set-aside acreage. Skips of one row or more will count toward the conserving base requirement for the farm.

The sale lease, release and re-portionment of the allotment will also be permitted.

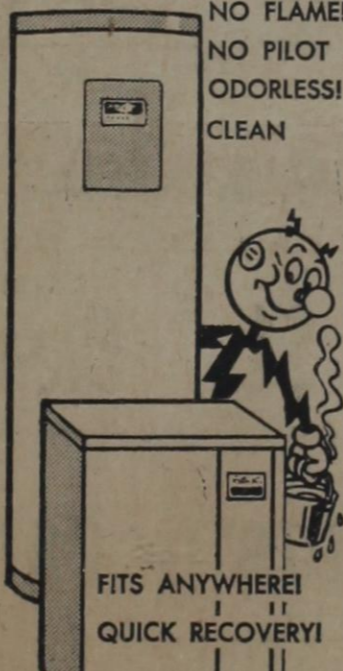

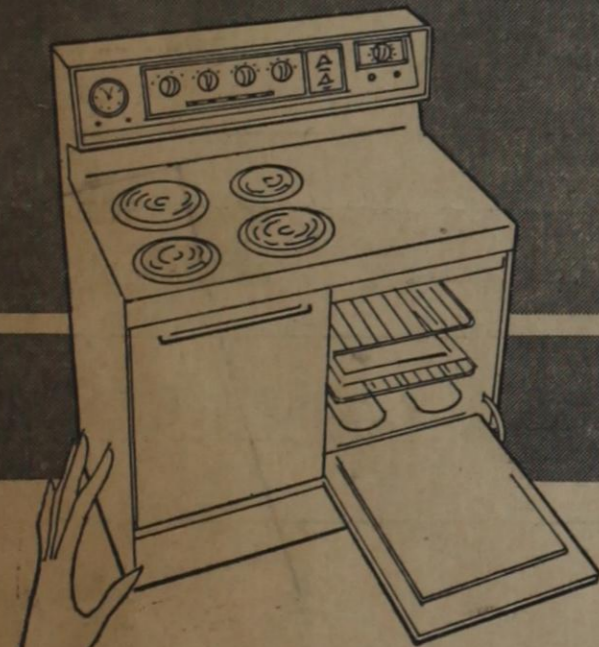

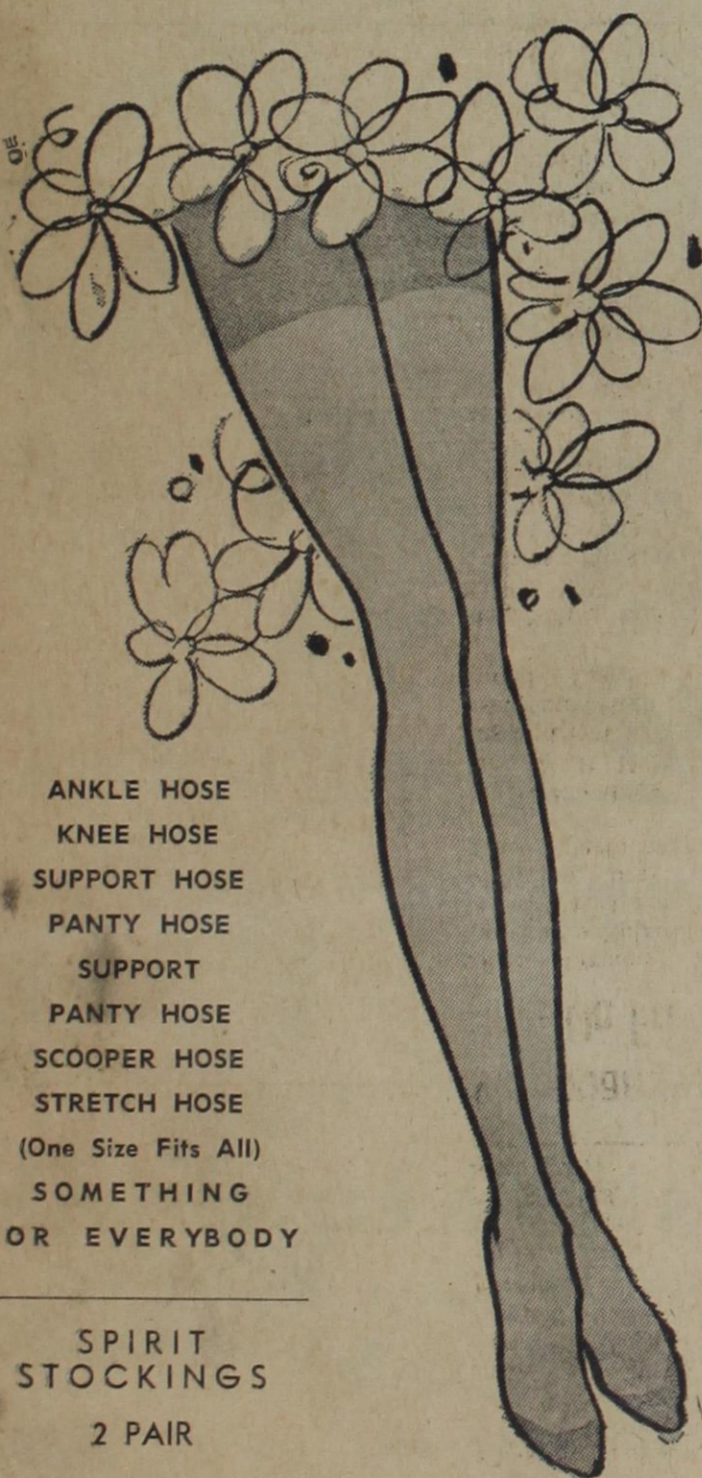
